Ithaka 2016: Journey Within 8th, 9th and 10th December

Every year as winter approaches and the sweltering heat of the city makes way for chilly mornings, the students of St. Xavier's College, Mumbai gear up to organise and participate in 'Ithaka', the annual theatre festival spearheaded by the English Literature department of the college. Ithaka is a respite for all those who have fallen in love with the English Language and all that it has given the world in the form of passionate tales of romance, tragedy and many more. Ithaka invites aspiring playwrights to submit their own literary masterpieces pertaining to an overarching theme that this festival diligently stands by. Scripts are selected with a view to capture the ethos of the festival and reflect creativity with a touch of novelty. These scripts are further set into motion with the help of directors, actors and a workforce that works tirelessly, around the clock for three months to ensure that the productions have all they need to ensure smooth sailing performances on the days of Ithaka.

The past themes of Ithaka have celebrated the timeless literary works of playwrights such as Shakespeare himself and have succeeded in reproducing adaptations of classics in a way that revived the magic of these forgotten and often overlooked masterpieces of literature. This year, Ithaka aimed to raise awareness about environmental conservation through its chosen medium of play. 'Elysium Lost' and 'Amaterasu', written and directed by Sunaina Menzes and Divyansh Singh respectively, explored the theme of nature and destruction and put forth pertinent dilemmas of choosing progress and development at the expense of the environment. Meanwhile, 'Deathtrap' and 'The Holden Caulfield Phenomenon' written and directed by Chinmayi Pilgaonkar and Sasha Mahuli respectively, were adaptations of 'Deathrap' written by Ira Levin in 1978 and the cult classic 'The Catcher in the Rye' written by J.D. Salinger. Every production had two shows each, with tickets being sold in the foyer, two weeks in advance. That the Public Relations team of Ithaka ran out of tickets to sell on the second day of the festival is testament to the fact that all productions were very well received.

The theme, 'Journey Within', intimated the ethos of Ithaka which is to explore the process of creation accompanied by a vision that every artist harbours for his or her handiwork. The workforce of Ithaka started working months in advance in order to ensure that the directors and actors have everything they need to put up stellar performances of their plays. The Creatives team was responsible for the designs of the logo, tickets and merchandise. The idea was to immortalise Ithaka 2016 through intricately designed memorabilia and thus make it possible for the festival to create an identity for itself which wouldn't be overshadowed by its equally vibrant and successful history. After the scripts were selected in the last week of August 2016, where every writer had to incorporate the theme of conservation, audition for prospective actors were conducted over a period of two days and thus Ithaka began to take form. Rehearsals began in the month of October and characters and stories, previously etched on paper and traced by ink alone, now started coming to life. Endless publicity of the festival on various social media platforms announced the arrival of a much beloved theatre festival.

Volunteers sewed together flowers of myriad colours to make crowns for Persephone to adorn her hair with. A fireplace built for 'Deathtrap' served as a symbol for art that had the potential to radiate joy, laughter, warmth, empathy and love, all in the same breath, in the span of three days.

On the morning of the first day of Ithaka, 8th of December, the college hall was aglow with light that would soon illuminate the stage and transport the audience into a world that the festival had cocooned itself in, for the past three months. There was a certain kind of feverish excitement that had overcome one and all. Ithaka after all is no ordinary festival. It celebrates theatre. It's a genuine, raw and one of the most honest forms of expression and catharsis known to mankind. Actors stopped in their tracks to take a look at the stage built for them, the stage that allowed them to forget who they were and let them be people who were carved from figments and insanities of ambitious imagination. Directors rushed about, straightening props and going over stage directions with actors and production volunteers alike who were tactful enough not to remind this novice story tellers that they already knew all the instructions like the back of their hands. Lights, blue, green, red and orange lights, spilled onto the stage. The directors conducted this magnificent orchestra of colours and sounds, oblivious to the outside world, which lined up outside the doors, waiting to be let in, waiting to hear a story that had never been told before.

Volunteers ensured that the chairs were in place and aisles were unblocked. Ten minutes to three, the doors opened and the crowd started filling in. There was a palpable tension in the air. Actors were transformed. Some became writers, some became myths while some became conflicted protagonists of novels that no one could understand but only ever experience. The principal of St. Xavier's College declared the festival open followed by the release of 'Ithaka', the annual journal of the literature department, carefully curated and edited by a team that was characterised by its unanimous love for literature. The audience settled down into their seats. Not a word was whispered or heard. Actors were rushed from the green room to the wings. Directors took a deep breath and nodded at the technicians who dimmed out all the lights. Actors steadied themselves. Holden smiled at Persephone who smoothened her dress and looked over at Sidney who stared at the audience, tall and unwavering as Amaterasu, the benevolent Goddess of the Sun took to stage, one step at a time, and one incredible story at a time.



### 2016 REPORT: HINDI DEPARTMENT ANNUAL FESTIVAL

This year, the Hindi Literature, Music and Drama Academy completed thirty years. The celebration of this thirtieth anniversary began with the election of office-bearers. Harita Balakrishnan (Secretary), Martin Chiriankandath (Cashier), Harsh (Marketing Secretary), Pooja Roy (Co-secretary Marketing), Aanchal Sharma (Drama Secretary), Palash Shakiya (Co-secretary Drama), Jyoti Nayak (Music Secretary) Pranjali Magar (Co-secretary Music), Hatavi Dhimar (literature secretary), Dhruvan Sharma (co-secretary literature), Kripa Nishar (publicity secretary) and Richa Nair (co-secretary publicity) were selected for this year's working Committee. A program of literature was presented on 29th November. The program was divided into two parts, the first being creative writing, which tested the creative style of the competitions. Second, the speech competition (Topic-How to control rising crimes against the children?), was conducted with the support of Hindustani Prachar Sabha, Mumbai.

This year, the drama department was given the responsibility of four plays I.e., 'Parinde' directed by Visheshika Bahoti, 'Aakhri Daastan' directed by Shivam Arora, 'Cupcake' presented by Snehal Khandekar and 'Andha Yug' directed by Shivani Patekar. They were well appreciated by all the viewers.

**Antas** presented the flagship program on 1 December. As we were celebrating the 30th anniversary this year, the orchestra was held in the First Quadrangle. For the first time, the singers of the last 30 years entertained the audience. The journey of the **Antas** orchestra started with 'Ek Omkar'. 





WINNERS-INTERCLASS BOYS RINK FOOTBALL-SYBA


