#### 15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

St. Xavier's College (an autonomous institution, affiliated with the University of Mumbai), conducts the B.A., B.Sc., and BCom. Government Aided Degree Courses on campus along with self-financed

B.A.-M.C.J., B.M.S., B.Sc. I.T. and BCom-BAF Degree Courses. Aided Masters Courses in Botany, Geology, Life Science, Microbiology and Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology, M.Sc. (Self-Financing) in Biotechnology, Physics, Big Data Analytics and M.A (Self-Financing) in Public Policy. Psychology and Economics are also conducted. The University of Mumbai awards degrees for the programmes mentioned above. Diploma / Certificate courses in Bioinformatics,

Clinical Research, Forensic Science and Criminal Law, Gemology and Gem Appreciation, Applied Philosophy and Ethics, Counselling Psychology, Expressive Arts Therapy and Aspects of Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology are also held in collaboration with other Institutions and Groups. Statistics is offered to Arts students and Economics is offered to science students. The college has been offering cross-faculty courses since 2012. A 3-credit compulsory Science and Arts/MM/MS course and vice versa. A cocurricular Honours certificate programme (HCP) also involves hubs such as Lingua-Humanities-Social Sciences, Physical-Biological Sciences and Music-Philosophy-History from which students can choose courses to secure the HCP certificate. Social Involvement Programme (SIP): For Community engagement, more than 200 NGOs are associated. 'Students work economically and physically underprivileged children as well as mentally challenged individuals, domestic workers, hospital patients, and senior citizens. Students must invest 45 hours of service with an NGO and 5 hours of social activities connected with any academic discipline the college offers. Value-added courses called special courses (Giving Voice to Values, Environmental Studies, Human Rights, Cross Faculty Courses) have been compulsory for all students since 2010. The Honours Certificate Programme promotes cross-hub (Lingua/Humanities/Social Science and Physical Science and Biological Science) activities. A

basket of courses for OE, VEC and SEC will be offered by SXCM that align with NEP 2020.

#### 16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

We have UG and PG students registered on the UGC-ABC portal. The Institute is also registered under ABC. We have the Council for International Programmes (CIP), as an educational link between SXCM and Universities across the globe. CIP facilitates short-term and long-term exchange programs for in-house and foreign students.

#### 17.Skill development:

Many courses in Science, Arts and Commerce curricula focus on the skill development of students at the UG and PG levels, for example, English communication, scientific communication, experiential learning through projects, and hands-on skill courses. Certificate and Diploma Courses such as Forensic Science, Clinical Research, Bioinformatics, Expressive Arts Therapy, Counselling Psychology, Python, Gemology, IPR, etc. are also offered. Under the Honours Certificate Programme, many departments conducted activities over and above the regular curricula focus on skill development such as gardening, soft skill development, applications of biostatistics, coding, bioinformatics etc. Under NEP 2020, many more skill development courses will be introduced.

### 18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

St. Xavier's College has also embraced the National Education Policy 2020 emphasizes the inclusion of Indian knowledge systems (IKS) in core courses. This move reflects the institution's commitment to holistic education and a deeper understanding of India's rich cultural heritage. Honours Certificate Programme, Department of Inter-Religious Courses. Ancient Indian Culture/ History/ Heras Institutes offer courses aligned to IKS. Hindi Sahitya Mandal, Indian Musical group, Yoga Committee, and Marathi Vangmay Mandal have IKS integrated into their activities. Under NEP 2020, IKS will also be offered in Science courses.

#### 2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

St. Xavier's College in Mumbai (SXCM) offers various programs for students with different backgrounds, including undergraduate, postgraduate, and PhD programs. The college aims to meet students' intellectual needs and equip them with effective teaching techniques. To support this, a dedicated language lab is available on campus to assist students, particularly those who are shy, through classroom interactions and observations. The language lab facilitates several activities for students in science writing and Indian and foreign language skills.

The college also offers an Honours certificate program for students who demonstrate academic excellence, defined as achieving 70% or a CGPA of 7. This program is an additional co-curricular activity, allowing eligible students to enroll. More than 30 short-term Honours courses are offered across different departments, each course carries one to three credits, with one credit awarded for

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every 15 hours of coursework. A total of 696 (FY = 390; SY = 210; TY = 96) students enrolled for the activity during 2022-23. The Honours Certificate was awarded to 77 TY students across all undergraduate programmes. In addition, individual credit cards for all Honors activities were given to the participants.

2.3.1 - Student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:

SXCM is dedicated to fostering an enriching teaching-learning process using diverse student-centred approaches such as participatory learning, experiential learning, and problem-solving methodologies. Throughout the 2022-23 academic year, faculty members engaged students through various tools and techniques. Project-based learning, survey-based projects, field projects, MOOCs, debates, assignments, talks, and inquiry-based learning were also used to enhance learning outcomes. #### 2.3.2 - Teachers use ICT-enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning

In the 2022-23 academic year, the commitment to effective teaching methods at SXCM was evident in the fitted approach to diverse learners. Faculty members continuously adapted their instructional methodologies to cater to the needs of students with different learning styles and preferences. Faculty members ensured students had access to a plethora of learning resources through platforms such as Google Classroom, Canvas, Microsoft Teams, and Moodle. Faculty members also created content through YouTube videos and electronic resources to supplement traditional teaching methods. All the students were encouraged to expand their knowledge through MOOC courses offered by platforms such as Swayam, NPTEL, and PGPathshala. Quality control measures, including originality checker Turnitin software, ensured academic integrity during the corrections of assignments and reports.

SXCM provided a technology-rich learning environment with fully ICT-enabled classrooms, cutting-edge labs with projectors and smart boards, and campus-wide Wi-Fi connectivity. Campus computer centers and departmental computer labs helped supplement classroom learning. Students had access to state-of-the-art computer facilities for research and assignment writing.

## 2.5.3 - IT integration and reforms in the examination procedures and processes including Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) have brought in considerable improvement in the Examination Management System (EMS) of the Institution

In the academic year 2022-23, SXCM implemented the Software as a Service model for the ERP program, PEDegree, to manage all examination-related tasks. PEDegree efficiently handled the tasks from mark entry to generating mark sheets and other reports. The subject-wise reports, including course-wise graphical charts, were prepared for all the courses. Utilizing cloud-based servers, the ERP system ensures easy access to data, facilitating smooth execution of examination tasks and timely release of results. Through PEDegree, students securely access their attendance records and grade reports. Graduated students received a passing certificate and a high-security convocation mark sheet. These mark sheets are printed on non-tearable paper and incorporate several security features, including invisible logos and main signatures visible only under UV light, custom borders, ghost marking, and a unique fluorescent logo that cannot be replicated.

Departmental Boards of Studies (BOS) play a crucial role in this process, convening to discuss and determine these outcomes. Suggestions from both the BOS and departmental staff are incorporated. COs and PSOs are reviewed whenever a syllabus is revised and passed by their BOS. These revisions are then approved at the College Academic Council meeting. This systematic approach ensures that the college educational objectives are effectively translated into specific learning outcomes at both program and course levels, enhancing the quality and relevance of the education provided.

To ensure fairness, a balanced mix of assessment techniques are used. Assessment grids are employed for grading assignments, presentations, and projects. Pedagogical methods have led to revisions in the marking scheme. Regular feedback from students on course curricula, syllabi, and evaluation procedures is sought. The Board of Studies (BOS) examines evaluation procedures and test questions. Student progress is closely monitored and departments have access to analysis and course adjustments when necessary.

3.1.1 - The institution's research facilities are frequently updated and there is a well-defined policy for promotion of research which is uploaded on the institutional website and implemented

The college has a well-defined policy for seed money for research and research grants Ph.D. programmes in various disciplines namely: Ancient Indian Culture, History, Economics, Botany, Chemistry, Geology, Life Science, Microbiology, and Zoology are recognized by MU. In addition to these departments, there are other research centres on campus such as Blatter Herbarium, Caius Research Laboratory, Heras Institute for History and Culture, and Nadkarny Sacasa Research Laboratory that provide the infrastructure and facilities for research. Faculty members recognized as Ph.D. guides in these subjects encourage student and faculty research activities. The infrastructure/equipment in the departments, as well as centres, get frequently upgraded through various grants from government agencies such as DBT and RUSA. Faculty apply and receive research grants for their projects from government funding agencies like DBT, UGC, and Mumbai University.

Multidisciplinary research activities are nurtured by encouraging inter-departmental collaboration among faculty members. SXCM has commenced offering seed funding to faculty to enhance their initial research endeavours, paving the way for additional funding from national and international agencies. Papers originating from such work are published in Xavier's Research Journal 'Xplore,' (under UGC-Care). High-quality research undertaken by undergraduate and postgraduate students is also featured in 'Xplore.'

Blatter Herbarium: The herbarium, established in 1906 is internationally recognized for Taxonomic studies and allied branches in Botany.

Caius Research Laboratory: Founded in 1947, the laboratory initiated research work on medicinal plants in India. It facilitates various research projects in Biology, Chemistry, and Geology.

Central Instrumentation Facility: The facility was established in 2006 under the DST-FIST grant houses state-of-the-art equipment used for research in college.

Heras Institute of Indian History and Culture: Founded in 1926, the institute provides support for research in the field of History, Archaeology, and Indian Art and publishes the half-yearly journal Indica.

Nadkarny-Sacasa Research Laboratory: It is one of the oldest research laboratories since 1932. It facilitates research in Organic and Inorganic Chemistry.

The departments of Botany and Microbiology (Palacios Research Laboratory) also have established research laboratories.

New Research Center - established in 2021-22 under the aegis of RUSA. The focus of the research involves rural activities beneficial to farmers.

#### 4.1 - Physical Facilities

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4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, etc.

SXCM has a well-maintained, user-friendly, and excellent infrastructure that exceeds statutory requirements for effective teaching and learning.

#### Classrooms and studios:

Spacious, well-equipped classrooms, conference-seminar rooms, and multimedia facilities feature full ICT integration, including LCD projectors, LAN, Wi-Fi, and audio systems for several activities like classes, seminars, and workshops. Additionally, the facility offers audio and video recording studios, with two new studios inaugurated this academic year.

#### Science Laboratories:

The laboratories are designed to facilitate experimental learning. For instance, the Blatter Herbarium boasts the largest collection of plants in Western India. The Caius Research Laboratory for Biological Sciences and the Nadkarny-Sacasa Research Laboratory for Physical Sciences also bridge academic research with industry.

#### New Research Center:

The RUSA-sponsored Research Center for Rural and Agricultural Studies has been effective since April 2022.

#### Computer Laboratories:

The fully-furnished computer labs feature LAN, Wi-Fi, high-speed internet, and video conferencing facilities. Fr. Bonnet Lab was inaugurated in June 2023.

#### Additional Infrastructure:

The college has a library, gymkhana, auditorium, language lab, hostel, canteen, separate common room for girls and boys, staff room, administrative offices, small health center, first aid box, photocopy center, lift, ramp for physically challenged students, UV water purifiers, etc.

#### Facilities for Cultural Activities:

Fully furnished and well-equipped, the Palacios Hall is a spacious auditorium with a seating capacity of 500 people, available for cultural, co-curricular, and recreational activities. It serves as the main site for events - College Day, Ithaka, and the graduation ceremonies. Additionally, open-air stages in the first and third quadrangles host diverse events, including Jan Fest, the Indian Music Group's flagship event, in the first quadrangle, and poetry readings and street plays in the third quadrangle.

#### Facilities for Sports and Games:

The college Gymkhana, known as the Fell Gymkhana, offers comprehensive sports facilities, including indoor training, recreation areas and a gymnasium. Moreover, it provides outdoor amenities such as full-size basketball and volleyball courts. In addition, Xavier's Cricket Pitch, located at the North End of Azad Maidan, spans 40 meters by 40 meters.

#### Facilities for Yoga:

The Palacios Hall and the Fell Gymkhana serve as venues for yoga and fitness sessions at the college. Additionally, the institution actively participates in International Yoga Day celebrations each year.

The extensive IT infrastructure includes thirteen fully equipped computer labs across the campus. Among these, the Big Data Analytics Lab started in the academic year 2021-2022, followed by the Fr. Bonnet Lab in 2022-2023, both designed to support teaching, research and innovation initiatives.

Xavier's Resource Centre for the Visually Challenged (XRCVC) is well-equipped with essential tools like screen readers, text-to-speech converters, and Braille machines. Also, Xavier's Language Lab has state-of-the-art language technology that caters to learners to gain proficiency in English, Hindi, French, and Marathi.

In the library, computers are available for student use and managing an Online Public Access Catalog (OPAC). Furthermore, Scan Craft scanners are utilized in the Blatter, Heras, and Library sections to preserve and digitize valuable resources like herbaria, heritage items, and rare books.

IT facilities streamline office operations, admissions processing and transcript generation. Through fiber optics connectivity and oncampus servers, departments collaborate seamlessly. Additionally,

CCTV cameras ensure campus security, while digital signage TVs broadcast vital information across.

Since 2010, the college has partnered with Google and Microsoft Teams. Our IT facilities are mainly funded by the Department of Biotechnology (DBT) and the Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA).

St. Xavier's College acknowledges that participative management and decentralization of power in everyday activities are important. SXC has over forty two committees to ensure the smooth running of the college. These include areas such as academics/ administration/ cultural development/ social involvement/ inclusion. Each committee is appointed by the Principal, according to the interests and competence of the faculty members. The committees draw on the expertise of the Principal and the Vice-Principal, who themselves function as convenors of statutory committees, academic councils, and governing bodies.   - To promote research activities science laboratories CRL, NSRL, and CIF facilities were upgraded using DBT-Builder, RUSA, and BPCL- CSR funds. Eight students and one faculty member are pursuing PhD in these laboratories. The facilities help in consultancy projects and add-on programs.
  - 2. The college partners with government and NGOs, Indian and foreign educational institutes, and companies. MOUs were signed with 6 educational institutes and 2 industries to promote research, education, and skill development among students and faculty.
  - 3. As part of social outreach 852 SY students worked in online mode in various NGOs. Around 497 FY students worked for 119 NGOs offline in diverse fields like health, education, etc. SSL conducted rural camps, blood drives, and team-building activities. Student Inclusion Cell helped in digitizing the canteen menu for differently abled students. Xavier's Environmental Committee conducted various awareness programs, e-waste collection drives workshops, competitions, and webinars.

6.2.2 - The functioning of the various institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from the policies, administrative set-up, appointment and service rules, procedures, etc.

The functioning of SXC is based on a hierarchy that is evident in the organogram. At the top is the governing body (GB) of the Trust SXC. The GB of the college reports to the Trust on key issues and forms the link between the Trust, GB, and the college officials. The Principal forms the connecting link between various statutory bodies on campus and the GB of the college. The Treasurer, Registrar, Head of departments, and convenors of key committees directly report to him. However, as decentralization plays a significant part in the operation of the college, SXC appoints 3 Vice Principals (VP) to oversee the daily administrative issues on campus and an Academic VP (usually the IQAC coordinator) to take care of all academic matters. The Registrar is overall in charge of the non-teaching staff. Faculty and non-teaching staff of a department/library and others report to the Head/In-charge. All the Statutory bodies on-campus function as per the norms set down by the UGC / University of Mumbai. The Academic Board, a non-statutory body was constituted to assist the Principal in tackling issues that may come up in the dayto-day operation of the college.

#### 6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

#### 6.4.1 - Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

The Bursar of the Parent Trust conducts internal auditsand the data is collated in preparation for the statutory audit. Every year, two internal reviews are part of this process in August/September and January/February. The audit examines the revenues generated in terms of fees, grants, donations, and rents from the use of space as against the expenses incurred and the assets purchased or written off. It also ensures the timely preparation of the budgets for the different units and reviews the variances that have occurred during the time of inspection, twice a year.

The college, registered under the Maharashtra Public Trust Act, 1950 conducts a statutory External audit by Chhotalal H. Shah and Company. The bank and fee reconciliation statements and the utilization of grants received are verified. Expenses incurred on infrastructure improvement are verified against quotations invited and resolutions passed. Physical verification of the assets declared is conducted during the audit. The Statutory audit for 2022-2023 was completed by July 2023. We are also subject to annual scrutiny by the IT Department, a statutory GST Audit, and the State Senior Auditor. The audited financial statements are submitted to the JD office and the Accountant General (AG) office, Mumbai.

Government Funds: The institution is vigilant in mobilizing funds from various Government schemes and has received Central Government funds such as the U RUSA, DBT Builder.

#### Non-Government Funds:

The institutional leadership and various stakeholders take initiative to mobilize various resources as and when required for the effective functioning of the College. The college Student Beneficiary and dedicated Scholarship Funds take care of students who have extremely limited financial resources. - 1) Gearing up for National Education Policy (NEP) The NEP cell was formed in 2022-2023 comprising a Nodal Officer, Principal, Vice Principals, and a few senior faculty members for curating plans and implementing NEP from 2023-2024 onwards. NEP cell after studying the infographics and grasping relevant information decided on a uniform credit framework for college. Orientations, presentations, deliberations, and interactions with faculty members were conducted from time to time. A basket of courses and subject combinations to be offered was thus finalized so that the courses could be designed by departments as per the credit framework. Interactions with other stakeholders' students of senior as well as junior college, parents, and non-teaching staff, were conducted to orient them about NEP.
- 2) Seed Money for Research: To encourage research among faculty members, seed money was given to faculty members to start working on their research projects after scrutinizing each project proposal. A presentation at a Conference or a publication is expected as an outcome of the research. In 2022-2023, seed money for six research projects (Mathematics-1, Microbiology-2, Zoology-1, Geology-Ancient Indian Culture-1, Life Science-1) involving 10 faculty members as PIs and Co-PIs.

SXC, Mumbai is strongly committed to caring for the environment. Segregation of dry and wet waste facilitates efficient composting and recycling of biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste. Solid waste management is done through a vermin-composting bin to compost leafy material. With packaged products on the rise, tetra-pack recycling was taken up along with RUR. Multi-layered plastic (MLP) waste is collected and handed over to Safai Bank of India which uses MLP in road building material. Recycling of broken glassware, newspapers and waste paper is undertaken.

The Xavier's Environmental Committee (XEC) instituted in November 2019 looks at the challenge of sustainable campus management through an environmental policy document and guidelines to reduce and manage waste and energy usage during campus festivals.

By XEC an e-waste collection drive was organized and collected e-waste was from college to be sent for recycling to e-Incarnation Recycling Pvt Ltd. A Tanzaku activity was organized with waste recycled paper in college. The waste paper generated during festivals was taken to recycling centers thereby ensuring zero waste fests. XEC also conducted a waste segregation awareness drive.

The student admissions in various streams reflect the intake of students from all over the country, on average 20% of students are from outside the state. The Language Lab helps students from rural and non-English speaking backgrounds to adjust to college life on campus. Socio-economic inclusion is upheld by the Student Beneficiary Fund which offers freeships and scholarships to deserving students from lower-income households to help consolidate their education.

Department of the Inter-Religious Studies. DIRS in its journal Sangam spoke of the theme Ekam of cultural unity and harmony amongst global polarization. DIRS organized a National Conference on 'Being Interconnected' in February 2023. Marathi Vangmay Mandal organised a series of events highlighting rich linguistic culture. On St. Francis Xavier's Feast, a vibrant cultural program was held with the theme 'Indian Tradition: Unity in Diversity' celebrating the richness and unity found within India and its diverse cultural heritage. A tribal mask-making workshop: Mukhota and 'Paint it Red', a workshop on the evolution of tribal laws and displacement of tribals was organized in December 2022.

Title: The Blatter Herbarium is an internationally recognized Herbarium for Taxonomic studies and allied branches in Botany.

#### Objectives

To offer special services in the vascular plants of western India and economically important plants of Maharashtra from the largest botanical collection in western India. (22/20 words)

Rev. Fr. Ethelbert Blatter S. J., the founder and Rev. Fr. Hermenegild Santapau S. J., regarded as pioneers in Indian plant taxonomy, contributed to the establishment and extension of the Blatter Herbarium. (30/30 words)

Plants collections ranging from the year 1816 onwards, and over 1,30,000 plant specimens collectedfrom various parts of India are housed in this Herbarium. #### 2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

St. Xavier's College in Mumbai (SXCM) offers various programs for students with different backgrounds, including undergraduate, postgraduate, and PhD programs. The college aims to meet students' intellectual needs and equip them with effective teaching techniques. To support this, a dedicated language lab is available on campus to assist students, particularly those who are shy, through classroom interactions and observations. The language lab facilitates several activities for students in science writing and Indian and foreign language skills.

The college also offers an Honours certificate program for students who demonstrate academic excellence, defined as achieving 70% or a CGPA of 7. This program is an additional cocurricular activity, allowing eligible students to enroll. More than 30 short-term Honours courses are offered across different departments, each course carries one to three credits, with one credit awarded for every 15 hours of coursework. A total of 696 (FY = 390; SY = 210; TY = 96) students enrolled for the activity during 2022-23. The Honours Certificate was awarded to 77 TY students across all undergraduate programmes. In addition, individual credit cards for all Honors activities were given to the participants.

In the academic year 2022-23, SXCM implemented the Software as a Service model for the ERP program, PEDegree, to manage all examination-related tasks. PEDegree efficiently handled the tasks from mark entry to generating mark sheets and other reports. Utilizing cloud-based servers, the ERP system ensures easy access to data, facilitating smooth execution of examination tasks and timely release of results. Through PEDegree, students securely access their attendance records and grade reports. Graduated students received a passing certificate and a high-security convocation mark sheet. These mark sheets are printed on non-tearable paper and incorporate several security features, including invisible logos and main signatures visible only under UV light, custom borders, ghost marking, and a unique fluorescent logo that cannot be replicated.

In addition to these departments, there are other research centres on campus such as Blatter Herbarium, Caius Research Laboratory, Heras Institute for History and Culture, and Nadkarny Sacasa Research Laboratory that provide the infrastructure and facilities for research. Faculty members recognized as Ph.D. guides in these subjects encourage student and faculty research activities. The infrastructure/equipment in the departments, as well as centres, get frequently upgraded through various grants from government agencies such as DBT and RUSA. Faculty apply and receive research grants for their projects from government funding agencies like DBT, UGC, and

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Mumbai University.

Multidisciplinary research activities are nurtured by encouraging inter-departmental collaboration among faculty members. SXCM has commenced offering seed funding to faculty to enhance their initial research endeavours, paving the way for additional funding from national and international agencies. Papers originating from such work are published in Xavier's Research Journal 'Xplore,' (under UGC-Care). High-quality research undertaken by undergraduate and postgraduate students is also featured in 'Xplore.'

Central Instrumentation Facility: The facility was established in 2006 under the DST-FIST grant houses state-of-the-art equipment used for research in college.

Heras Institute of Indian History and Culture: Founded in 1926, the institute provides support for research in the field of History, Archaeology, and Indian Art and publishes the half-yearly journal Indica.

Nadkarny-Sacasa Research Laboratory: It is one of the oldest research laboratories since 1932. It facilitates research in Organic and Inorganic Chemistry.

SXCM has a well-maintained, user-friendly, and excellent infrastructure that exceeds statutory requirements for effective teaching and learning.

#### Classrooms and studios:

Spacious, well-equipped classrooms, conference-seminar rooms, and multimedia facilities feature full ICT integration, including LCD projectors, LAN, Wi-Fi, and audio systems for several activities like classes, seminars, and workshops. Additionally, the facility offers audio and video recording studios, with two new studios inaugurated this academic year.

#### Science Laboratories:

The laboratories are designed to facilitate experimental learning. For instance, the Blatter Herbarium boasts the largest collection of plants in Western India. The Caius Research Laboratory for Biological Sciences and the Nadkarny-Sacasa Research Laboratory for Physical Sciences also bridge academic research with industry.

#### New Research Center:

The RUSA-sponsored Research Center for Rural and Agricultural

Studies has been effective since April 2022.

#### Computer Laboratories:

The fully-furnished computer labs feature LAN, Wi-Fi, high-speed internet, and video conferencing facilities. Fr. Bonnet Lab was inaugurated in June 2023.

#### Additional Infrastructure:

The college has a library, gymkhana, auditorium, language lab, hostel, canteen, separate common room for girls and boys, staff room, administrative offices, small health center, first aid box, photocopy center, lift, ramp for physically challenged students, UV water purifiers, etc.

#### Facilities for Cultural Activities:

Fully furnished and well-equipped, the Palacios Hall is a spacious auditorium with a seating capacity of 500 people, available for cultural, co-curricular, and recreational activities. It serves as the main site for events - College Day, Ithaka, and the graduation ceremonies. Additionally, open-air stages in the first and third quadrangles host diverse events, including Jan Fest, the Indian Music Group's flagship event, in the first quadrangle, and poetry readings and street plays in the third quadrangle.

Facilities for Sports and Games:

The college Gymkhana, known as the Fell Gymkhana, offers comprehensive sports facilities, including indoor training, recreation areas and a gymnasium. Moreover, it provides outdoor amenities such as full-size basketball and volleyball courts. In addition, Xavier's Cricket Pitch, located at the North End of Azad Maidan, spans 40 meters by 40 meters.

#### Facilities for Yoga:

The Palacios Hall and the Fell Gymkhana serve as venues for yoga and fitness sessions at the college. Additionally, the institution actively participates in International Yoga Day celebrations each year.

The extensive IT infrastructure includes thirteen fully equipped computer labs across the campus. Among these, the Big Data Analytics Lab started in the academic year 2021-2022, followed by the Fr. Bonnet Lab in 2022-2023, both designed to support teaching, research and innovation initiatives.

Xavier's Resource Centre for the Visually Challenged (XRCVC) is well-equipped with essential tools like screen readers, text-to-speech converters, and Braille machines. Also, Xavier's Language Lab has state-of-the-art language technology that caters to learners to gain proficiency in English, Hindi, French, and Marathi.

In the library, computers are available for student use and managing an Online Public Access Catalog (OPAC). Furthermore, Scan Craft scanners are utilized in the Blatter, Heras, and Library sections to preserve and digitize valuable resources like herbaria, heritage items, and rare books.

IT facilities streamline office operations, admissions processing and transcript generation. Through fiber optics connectivity and on-campus servers, departments collaborate seamlessly.

Additionally, CCTV cameras ensure campus security, while digital signage TVs broadcast vital information across.

Since 2010, the college has partnered with Google and Microsoft Teams. Our IT facilities are mainly funded by the Department of Biotechnology (DBT) and the Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA).

St. Xavier's College acknowledges that participative management and decentralization of power in everyday activities are important. SXC has over forty two committees to ensure the smooth running of the college. These include areas such as academics/ administration/ cultural development/ social involvement/ inclusion. Each committee is appointed by the Principal, according to the interests and competence of the faculty members. The committees draw on the expertise of the Principal and the Vice-Principal, who themselves function as convenors of statutory committees, academic councils, and governing bodies.   - To promote research activities science laboratories CRL, NSRL, and CIF facilities were upgraded using DBT-Builder, RUSA, and BPCL- CSR funds. Eight students and one faculty member are pursuing PhD in these laboratories. The facilities help in consultancy projects and add-on programs.
  - 2. The college partners with government and NGOs, Indian and foreign educational institutes, and companies. MOUs were signed with 6 educational institutes and 2 industries to promote research, education, and skill development among students and faculty.
  - 3. As part of social outreach 852 SY students worked in online mode in various NGOs. Around 497 FY students worked for 119 NGOs offline in diverse fields like health, education, etc. SSL conducted rural camps, blood drives, and team-building activities. Student Inclusion Cell helped in digitizing the canteen menu for differently abled students. Xavier's Environmental Committee conducted various awareness programs, e-waste collection drives

- workshops, competitions, and webinars.

6.2.2 - The functioning of the various institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from the policies, administrative set-up, appointment and service rules, procedures, etc.

The functioning of SXC is based on a hierarchy that is evident in the organogram. At the top is the governing body (GB) of the Trust SXC. The GB of the college reports to the Trust on key issues and forms the link between the Trust, GB, and the college officials. The Principal forms the connecting link between various statutory bodies on campus and the GB of the college. The Treasurer, Registrar, Head of departments, and convenors of key committees directly report to him. However, as decentralization plays a significant part in the operation of the college, SXC appoints 3 Vice Principals (VP) to oversee the daily administrative issues on campus and an Academic VP (usually the IQAC coordinator) to take care of all academic matters. The Registrar is overall in charge of the non-teaching staff. Faculty and non-teaching staff of a department/library and others report to the Head/In-charge. All the Statutory bodies on-campus function as per the norms set down by the UGC / University of Mumbai. The Academic Board, a non-statutory body was constituted to assist the Principal in tackling issues that may come up in the day-to-day operation of the college.

#### 6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

#### 6.4.1 - Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

The Bursar of the Parent Trust conducts internal auditsand the data is collated in preparation for the statutory audit. Every year, two internal reviews are part of this process in August/September and January/February. The audit examines the revenues generated in terms of fees, grants, donations, and rents from the use of space as against the expenses incurred and the assets purchased or written off. It also ensures the timely preparation of the budgets for the different units and reviews the variances that have occurred during the time of inspection, twice a year.

The college, registered under the Maharashtra Public Trust Act, 1950 conducts a statutory External audit by Chhotalal H. Shah and Company. The bank and fee reconciliation statements and the utilization of grants received are verified. Expenses incurred on infrastructure improvement are verified against quotations invited and resolutions passed. Physical verification of the assets declared is conducted during the audit. The Statutory audit for 2022-2023 was completed by July 2023. We are also

subject to annual scrutiny by the IT Department, a statutory GST Audit, and the State Senior Auditor. The audited financial statements are submitted to the JD office and the Accountant General (AG) office, Mumbai.

- 1) Gearing up for National Education Policy (NEP) The NEP cell was formed in 2022-2023 comprising a Nodal Officer, Principal, Vice Principals, and a few senior faculty members for curating plans and implementing NEP from 2023-2024 onwards. NEP cell after studying the infographics and grasping relevant information decided on a uniform credit framework for college. Orientations, presentations, deliberations, and interactions with faculty members were conducted from time to time. A basket of courses and subject combinations to be offered was thus finalized so that the courses could be designed by departments as per the credit framework. Interactions with other stakeholders' students of senior as well as junior college, parents, and non-teaching staff, were conducted to orient them about NEP.

A presentation at a Conference or a publication is expected as an outcome of the research. SXC, Mumbai is strongly committed to caring for the environment. Segregation of dry and wet waste facilitates efficient composting and recycling of biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste. Solid waste management is done through a vermin-composting bin to compost leafy material. With packaged products on the rise, tetrapack recycling was taken up along with RUR. Multi-layered plastic (MLP) waste is collected and handed over to Safai Bank of India which uses MLP in road building material. Recycling of broken glassware, newspapers and waste paper is undertaken.

The Xavier's Environmental Committee (XEC) instituted in November 2019 looks at the challenge of sustainable campus management through an environmental policy document and guidelines to reduce and manage waste and energy usage during campus festivals.

By XEC an e-waste collection drive was organized and collected e-waste was from college to be sent for recycling to e-Incarnation Recycling Pvt Ltd. A Tanzaku activity was organized with waste

recycled paper in college. The waste paper generated during festivals was taken to recycling centers thereby ensuring zero waste fests. XEC also conducted a waste segregation awareness drive.

SXCM believes in inclusive education focusing on regional, linguistic, secular, and economic inclusion. The student admissions in various streams reflect the intake of students from all over the country, on average 20% of students are from outside the state. The Language Lab helps students from rural and non-English speaking backgrounds to adjust to college life on campus. Socio-economic inclusion is upheld by the Student Beneficiary Fund which offers freeships and scholarships to deserving students from lower-income households to help consolidate their education.

Title: The Blatter Herbarium is an internationally recognized Herbarium for Taxonomic studies and allied branches in Botany.

#### **Objectives**

To offer special services in the vascular plants of western India and economically important plants of Maharashtra from the largest botanical collection in western India. (22/20 words)

#### Context

Rev. Fr. Ethelbert Blatter S. J., the founder and Rev. Fr. Hermenegild Santapau S. J., regarded as pioneers in Indian plant taxonomy, contributed to the establishment and extension of the Blatter Herbarium. (30/30 words)

#### Practice:

Plants collections ranging from the year 1816 onwards, and over 1,30,000 plant specimens collectedfrom various parts of India are housed in this Herbarium. More than 400 types of plants discovered as new species are maintained in this herbarium. All these form reference materials for research and other studies. (49/50 words)

Evidence of Success:

About 300 scientific articles and a large number of scientific books are some of the contributions of Rev. Fr. E. Blatter and Rev. Fr. H. Santapau. More than 50 people have received their M.Sc. and Ph.D. degrees from this institution.(40/40 words)

#### Problems

Maintaining proper storage conditions like humidity and light exposure throughout the year is demanding. Specimen preservation supplies, equipment maintenance and facility upkeep are tough. Herbarium collections require sufficient space and physical constraints within the campus make the expansion challenging. (39/40 words)

Thus the Blatter Herbarium is a unique resource of SXCM which is also used by research scholars from Botany departments of various colleges under Mumbai University and other universities.
