

Three activity-filled years at the Office of the Vice Principal – Academics have been packed with schedules, meetings, seminars, tough decisions, proud moments, happiness and above all much cherished support from the faculty and students’ of St. Xavier’s College! As I take a year’s leave for my post-doc, there are many to thank and much to be grateful for. A big word of thanks to the support and effort of the Academic Council which met nearly every week, Principal Dr. Agnelo Menezes, Vice-Principal (Science) Dr. Rajendra Shinde, Vice-Principal (Arts) Dr. Asha Naithani Dayama, Vice-Principal (Junior College) Ms. Vaishali Mohoni. Thanks also to the Rector, Dr. Fr. Anthony J. Dsouza whose presence brought an external perspective to all our deliberations. And special thanks to Profs. Pushpa Sinkar, Madhuri Rajjada (incoming Vice Principal Arts) and Gulshan Shaikh (incoming Vice Principal Academics) who were always available to help.

As the Honours Programme falls under my purview, it gives me great privilege to see the increase in number of students qualifying for the Honours Certificate. This year the Honours Convocation was held along with the Graduation Ceremony where students qualifying for the programme were awarded the Honours Certificate along with their Consolidated Marksheets and passing certificates. A big thanks to Dr. Gulshan Shaikh for her work in the Honours Programme. A total of approximately 250 students registered for the Honours Programme Certificate for the year 2015-16 and 70 students received their Honours Certificates at their Graduation Ceremony held faculty wise. The departments offered a variety of activities that included lecture series, workshops, research projects, review of research articles, literature survey, book reviews, Summer School and even Khandala seminars where papers were presented. The objective of involvement in the subject beyond the regular curriculum was definitely met. A big thank you to all the Honours Coordinators from the various Departments, Mr. Joseph

Aloysius and Mr. Subhash Kumar for the software work, layouts and printing of certificates. The Honours Programme has been in existence for the last thirty years here at Xavier’s. More recently, after Xavier’s got Autonomy many of the courses offered in the Honours Programme moved to mainstream classes. This took the overall academics of the College to a higher level. However, there is always that segment of students who can handle bigger challenges. Hence, the Honours Programme continued to be offered by a few faculty stalwarts. Over a period of time more departments are rejoining the Honours Programme and this year we also had students from AIC, Life Science, Zoology and Physics receiving their certificates. The programmes provides for five core credits offered by the department, two transfer credits and one Social Involvement Programme credit which is strongly encouraged. The departments that offer transfer credits include the Council of International Programmes (CIP), French, Psychology, Indian Music Group (IMG), Heras Institute, Department of Inter- religious studies (DIRS), the Language Lab and XIC. Next year we anticipate a huge number of students availing of the prestigious Honours Certificate.

The Teacher Assessment Questionnaire (TAQ) was instituted at Xavier’s in 1969 before it became mandatory for an educational institution. For the academic year 2015-16, the total number of courses which were administered were 221. The teaching assessment of 94 unconfirmed Arts and Science Faculty was conducted. 2 Science courses of the confirmed Science Faculty were done. We also administered 116 Arts Courses of the Confirmed faculty which includes the self financing courses of Management and Mass Media Studies. A big thank you to the Committee for their painstaking work- Prof. Pushpa Sinkar, Prof. Dionysia Coutinho, Prof. Seema Das, Prof. Sangeeta Chavan and Prof. Saju George.

A sincere appreciation to all the faculty who participated in the seminars organized as part of human resource development. We conducted four New Teachers’ Seminars during the academic year. On 10th August, 2015 a seminar on *Ethos and Teaching-Learning Experience in Xavier’s* was conducted and talks were given by Dr. (Fr) Arun Desouza, S.J, Dr. Radiya Pacha Gupta, Prof. Madhuri Rajjada and Dr. Hoshang Master. On 9th September, 2015, Dr. Elaine Charles, the former Principal of St. Xavier’s Institute of Education conducted a seminar on *5 habits of highly successful teachers* for our young teachers. As we moved into the second half of the Academic year, we invited Fr Gordon Daniels, S.J, the Deputy Director of the Xavier’s Institute of Communications, to conduct a seminar on *Effective Communication* on 9th December, 2015. On 27th January, 2016, the fourth New Teachers Seminar, *Educational Pedagogies: Experiments in inquiry based learning* was conducted by Prof.





Marazban Kotwal of the Chemistry Department at St. Xavier's College. IQAC Xaviers helped IQAC Nirmala Niketan to organize a New teachers' Seminar *Educational Paradigms in a Globalized world* at Nirmala Niketan College of Home Science for South Mumbai colleges. Dr.(Fr.) Roy Pereira, S.J., Dr. Radiya Pacha Gupta and Prof. Marazban Kotwal were the resource persons.

Two faculty seminars, one in each semester was conducted. On 1st October, 2015, Mr. Suresh Lulla engaged the faculty on the topic *Quality Enhancement*. He is the founder of Qimpro Consultants Pvt. Ltd. which is a focused quality management consultancy based on The Juran Trilogy: quality planning, quality control, and quality improvement. We are grateful to Dr. Rajendra Shinde. On 13th January, 2016, the college staff got together under the direction of the Principal Dr. Agnelo Menezes and held discussions and debates on *Autonomy*

in Review. We were divided into different groups and each department had to write their review of the past 6 years of autonomy.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the College, aimed at fostering academic and all round development of the staff and students conducted workshops and programmes during the year. The IQAC conducted a workshop on 10th February, 2016 on *Soft Skills and Curriculum Building* for the second and third year students. The resource person was Dr. Pankaj Chipalkatti, Liaison Officer, Mumbai International School of Business (MISB) and Bocconi University, Italy. On 20th and 22nd January, 2016, a Twin Lecture series was organized. *Be Well, Lead Well* by Dr. Luce De Buitleir Andrews, Director - The Academy Western Sydney University, Australia and *Mental Health* by Dr. Ajlina Karamelic-Muratovic, Department of Sociology and Anthropology, Saint Louis University, USA. These were in collaboration with Dr. Radiya Pacha- Gupta, Director of the Council for International Programmes. Dr.(Fr.) Roy Pereira, S.J and Prof. Marazban Kotwal were the principal resource persons at the IQAC Seminar on *Strategies for change in the new Teaching Learning environment* organized by The Parvatibai Chowgule College, Goa on 7th April, 2016 for all

South Goa colleges.

In June 2016, the third autonomous batch was treated to a grand Graduation Ceremony spread over three days. A big word of thanks to Dr. Rajendra Shinde and Dr. Gulshan Shaikh who took complete charge. We had one from Science receiving their Doctorate in Philosophy (Ph.D.) from the College. We had the B.Sc. I.T graduating along with the Commerce, B.M.M., B.M.S. on 16th June. On 17th June, we had the B.Sc., M.Sc., and Ph.D. Graduation Ceremony and on 18th June, the B.A. and M.A. students receiving their certificates. Thanks to the dedication, time and hard work put in by the Faculty on the respective days, the Head of Departments, Dr. Geeta and the Scholarship committee, Bipin, Anand, Shiny, Shefali, Maria and the General Office, Dr. Hoshang, Fiona, Lenox and the Exam Committee, Dr.(Fr.) THE VALEDICTORY SPEECH

Respected Fr. Rector, Principal Dr. Menezes, vice-principals, Vice-principal Science dept, Dr Shinde, HOD Microbiology Vivian Mm, HOD BIO-Chem Nandita Mme, other respected HOD's, esteemed members of the St Xavier's faculty, distinguished guests, parents and my fellow graduates, a very good evening to everyone assembled here.

This is the Palacios Hall where it all began. A three year blink -of -an eye ago ,we were all scribbling away furiously filling in our three preferred subject combinations on yellow sheets and waiting patiently for the interview which would hand us the key to Hogwarts, I mean St Xavier's College Mumbai. At first look, the college's

edifice seemed surreal. It was as if I had walked into a live scene from a Harry Potter Movie. As I stepped on the stairs I half-expected them to start revolving and take me to the potions class or the defence against the dark magic class.

It has taken us three years to reach this hall once again with our parents. As we all stand /sit here today that sense of awe which we had experienced on the first day is not there anymore. 

CONTINUATION OF STAR COLLEGE STATUS

Botany, Microbiology, Life Science, Zoology, Chemistry, and Physics are six departments in the Star College scheme since 2012. After three years, they have been awarded star status. Under this programme, each department was given 5 lakhs non-recurring (instruments) as one-time grant and 2 Lakhs / department / year for three years. 

COUNCIL FOR INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMMES

“We live in a world that is full of beauty, charm and adventure. As one of the premier institutes in the nation, St. Xavier’s firmly stands for this postulate. Providing exposure to education in a foreign land has not only significantly contributed to the academic development of students, but also has given impetus to overall intellectual progression and has fostered interpersonal and leadership skills in our students. The Council for International Programmes plays an active role in providing students with an opportunity to experience education and culture at institutes around the globe in nations displaying cultural diversity. Furthermore, the CIP also facilitates students from international institutes to have a pleasant feel of Indian culture and to our advanced education system.

Read on to learn about the various programmes organized by the CIP at St. Xavier’s in the academic year 2015 – 2016:

INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMMES FOR STUDENTS OF ST. XAVIER’S:

There are a variety of programmes organized for the students of St. Xavier’s by the Council for International Programmes. These range from short-term programmes of a week to two months, to long-term programmes of one semester to one year. This year, forty four Xavier’s students took the opportunity to study abroad and experience varied cultures. These were:

University of California, Berkeley, USA: Six of our students enrolled in various courses offered by the University of California, Berkeley, USA, in their summer programme from May to June 2016. In reciprocity, eighteen students of Berkeley visited St. Xavier’s for two months from June to August 2015 to study courses in Globalization and Economics.

Ecole de Management de Normandie, France: Nezhat Fouzdar was selected to go to E.M. Normandie, France for a year to study Management Studies. In reciprocity, two students from E.M. Normandie visited St. Xavier’s for one semester from June to October 2015 in the BMM department.

Comillas Pontifical University, Spain: Maria Kuriakose, Rhea Naik and Sefhra Abraham were selected to study for a year at the Faculty of Economics and Business Administration with a full tuition waiver at Comillas Pontifical University, Spain. In reciprocity, one student of Comillas visited St. Xavier’s for one semester from June to October 2015 in the BMM department.

IESEG School of Management, France: Shalmali Ghaisas and Hana Ali enrolled at the IESEG School of Management, France, with a full tuition waiver. In reciprocity, three students from IESEG visited St. Xavier’s for a year to study in the BMM department.

Sciences Po, France: Andrea D’Souza, Samyukta Venkatraman and Pranav Kuttaiah were selected to study for a year at Sciences Po, France. Andrea D’Souza was awarded the prestigious Charpak Scholarship from the French Embassy to cover her tuition fees at Sciences Po. Three students from Sciences Po visited St. Xavier’s to study courses in Management Studies.

Harvard University, USA: The ‘Harvard College in Asia Programme’ (HCAP) is one of the most competitive and sought after programmes for students of St. Xavier’s. This year, eight students were selected to participate in a nine-day conference themed “Equality, Tolerance and Freedom: The Effect of Culture and Policy on a Globalized World”, at Harvard University, USA from 15th to 24th January 2016. Ten students from Harvard University did the honors by selecting St. Xavier’s College as their school of choice.

University of Stuttgart, St. Louis University, Stellenbosch University and St. Xavier’s College Department of English Collaborative Programme:

The Indian chapter of the online course - In Conversation with Globalization, was held from 17th to 24th January 2016. There were 24 students from participating foreign universities. Several Xavier’s students also participated in the course.

St. Louis University, USA: Anand Padmanabhan and Saloni Bhatia proudly made their way to St. Louis University, USA for a year. As stated in the MOU between the two institutes, they received a full tuition waiver.

Universities in Ontario, Canada: Zahra Mitra, Sanuli Parulkar and Fatema Kakal were selected to study in Ontario, Canada, for a year, with a full

tuition waiver, as part of the Ontario-Maharashtra-Goa (OMG) programme.

Yale University: Varada Shrotri was selected to study various courses at Yale University, USA, for two months as part of their summer programme, May-June 2016.

University of Dundee, Scotland: Rajas Shinde availed of the opportunity to pursue a two-month research internship under the supervision of Dr. Gordon Simpson, at the College of Life Sciences, University of Dundee, Scotland from 23rd April to 19th June 2016.

St. Catherine's College, University of Oxford, UK: Shubham Pansare was selected to study at St. Catherine's College, University of Oxford, UK, for their Trinity term, for a period of two months, May-June 2016. He was awarded the prestigious Betty and Donald Keating scholarship to cover for his tuition as well as accommodation, travel and stipend in UK.

Scottsdale Community College, USA: Ishita Bhawe was awarded a full scholarship from the US Consulate to study at Scottsdale Community College, USA, for 10 months.

The University of Tokyo, Japan: Zoe Daruwalla and Gaurishankar Gupta attended the 'Global Next Leaders Forum 2015' (GNLF) Conference at the University of Tokyo, Japan for one week. They were accompanied by Dr. Pearl Pastakia.

PROGRAMMES FOR INCOMING INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS: These range from short term programmes of two weeks to two months or for one to two semesters. During the year we hosted on our campus 103 foreign students from countries such as Japan, USA, Australia, Spain and France.

Intensive English Language Course: For the third consecutive year we had students from Soka University, Japan, participating in the specialized, intensive short term English language course. Nine students accompanied by their professor were on our campus from 9th to 20th February, 2016. At the end of the course the students in

groups of two and three performed an oral presentation for their evaluation. A certificate of participation was given to all the students.

India Studies Programme: Twelve students from Western Sydney University, Australia, visited St. Xavier's for a short programme on "Art, History, and Culture of India" between June and July 2015. The programme was offered for 2 credits with ten Xavier's faculty and four guest lecturers conducting the course. Students of Xavier's College also participated in this programme. The programme had an eclectic mix of lectures, heritage walk, museum and Mani Bhavan visits. This programme was conducted once again for nine students from Western Sydney University, Australia, from 8th January to 5th February 2016.

Xavier's - Berkeley Summer Programme: For the third consecutive year we organized a programme for students from the University of California, Berkeley, USA. This two credit course "Globalization, Capital Flows and Development" was fully developed and hosted by St. Xavier's College. Eighteen students from the UC Berkeley participated in this course. The Berkeley students also interned with various NGOs as a service-learning component, followed by a reflection at the end of the program. The students were also taken on a field visit to gentrified spaces.

Semester / One year Programmes: Eleven students from Soka University, Japan enrolled for courses in SYBA for one semester. International students from Universities with which Xavier's has an MOUs signed enrolled in Xavier's for a semester or one year, with a full tuition waiver. Six French students from IESEG and Science Po, along with one Spanish student from Comillas availed of this exchange. In addition, two French students from E.M. Normandie spent the third semester at St. Xavier's.

Memoranda of Understanding signed in the academic year 2015 - 2016:

Memoranda of Understanding was signed with eight new universities to encourage the development of

visits and informal exchanges of faculty, scholars and administrators in education, research and outreach, to organize joint conferences, to develop joint research programs and exchange of students during the academic year or summer terms. These institutes include: (1) Trinity Western University, Canada, (2) EDHEC Business School, France, (3) Daegu Haany University, South Korea, (4) St. John's College, University of Cambridge, UK, (5) University of California, Berkeley, USA, (6) Harvard University, USA (signed every year in renewal of the HCAP agreement), (7) Regents of the University of California, USA (for their Education Abroad Programme), and (8) University of Sydney, Australia (for the Offshore Programme). Currently Xavier's has a total of twenty seven MOUs signed with various international universities which are valid and functional.

New initiatives of the CIP: The academic year 2015 - 2016 brought forward some new beginnings. Three new endeavours were initiated by the Council for International Programmes. These were: (1) St. John's College, University of Cambridge, UK a 2 week short-term exchange programme between the two institutes on a full scholarship given by Cambridge Univ, (2) University of Sydney, Australia, the Sydney Offshore Programme entailing a new course on the History of India developed by St. Xavier's College and (3) Regents of the University of California for lectures conducted by the members of faculty of both, the University of California as well as St. Xavier's College.

Visits by International Institutes in 2015 - 2016: Numerous representatives and members of faculty from reputed foreign universities visited St. Xavier's College in the academic year 2015 - 2016 and interacted with our students and faculty members. These were:


“That is the magic of travel. You leave your home secure in your own knowledge and identity. But as you travel, the world in all its richness intervenes. You meet people you could not invent; you see scenes you could not imagine. You return a different person.”

In this global village, the eternal quest for one’s identity often takes people to foreign lands. It’s frequently during these journeys that one finds bits and pieces of one’s soul in territories previously unexplored and people formerly strangers. Our 10 day trip to Mumbai’s sister-city Stuttgart in Germany, a result of our participation in the online course “In Conversation with Globalization”, allowed us to experience a culture very different from our own.

Our journey to Stuttgart began from Mumbai. After almost a day in various flights and airports, we reached the city on Sunday morning only to find it eerily quiet. For us, the fact that everything from banks and offices to shopping malls and grocery stores remains shut on Sundays was difficult to grasp due to the stark contrast with India. Since we were invited by the University of Stuttgart, the students who had taken the course offered to host us in home stays. This arrangement, according to us, was instrumental in making the visit an extremely enjoyable one since we were treated to the absolute best of German hospitality. Not only did we get to spend more time with our fellow students, the stay also offered us insights into aspects of German culture and lifestyle – a fitting conclusion to the course. The rest of our first day was spent in settling in, catching up and taking a short tour around the city’s bustling main street. We were lucky to catch the last event of the international film festival taking place on the open green lawns of the Schlossplatz (Palace Square) which also offered us a glimpse into the vibrant community life in Stuttgart.

The beautiful weather allowed us to walk around the city for hours, exploring

the various buildings, monuments and churches. We had the opportunity to stroll through the Markthalle, Stuttgart’s 100 year old market that even houses an Indian section! The city’s old and new castles, despite being located in the city Centre, managed to take us back to another century, with their intricate architecture and beautiful gardens. Stuttgart’s famous “White Library” another architectural marvel, was where we spent hours flipping through the various books in different languages.

After having sauntered on the cobbled streets about the city, we stepped on to the smooth pathways of the University of Stuttgart. The pleasant campus greeted us with luscious green lawns where students sprawled in the sun. On our first visit to the university, the students showed us around. We were taken to the library where there was a distinction prevalent between the noisy and the very quiet section, much similar to our reference and honor’s sections in the library. Following our exploration of the university we assembled for Professor Wolfgang Holtkamp’s lecture wherein he provided a short introduction to American literature. His students presented on the topic of architecture and design which flowed into a fruitful discussion about the elements of space and social class that managed to engage the entire class. A succeeding seminar, equally interesting, took place in an underground auditorium. Dr Priewe took us through the developments

of Modernism, Bergson’s Creative Evolution, Picasso’s Cubism and Einstein’s theory of Relativity.

On our second visit to the University, we had Dr. Wolfgang illustrate to us the differences encountered in Hawthorne’s, Irwin’s and Poe’s style of writing. Subsequently, we were allowed to showcase our own short video and a presentation on St. Xavier’s college and Mumbai. We also had the chance to listen to Mr. Powers, considered to be the favorite among all the professors. He had us hooked onto Modern poetry with his enthusiasm and anecdotes from Eliot’s life. We were fortunate enough to attend a Poetry Slam organized by the University. Seeing so much of young talent, including some Indian voices, thriving in such a welcoming and positive atmosphere was extremely inspiring.

Our schedule had been very precisely planned out, giving us an immense amount of time to explore the city as well as its neighbouring sites. We spent an entire day at the magnificent Ludwigsburg Castle, with its fairytale gardens and grand palace rooms. Our German hosts also arranged to take us to the Mercedes Benz Museum. We journeyed back in time as we walked around the museum, following a perfectly presented timeline of the automobile sector, along with its historical, economic and social significance. We were fortunate enough to visit the UNESCO World Heritage Site, the Maulbronn Monastery that

reminded us of a quaint German village of the past. We got a taste of a very important piece of German culture, their spring festivals, when we visited a very vibrant one near Stuttgart.

Most of the evenings were spent in visiting one of the many cafes and eateries in the city centre or preparing food at one of the students' houses. The culinary experience was very enriching and we got to try various authentic German dishes. Thanks to the expertise of the German students, we could eat at many lesser known but excellent restaurants not usually featured on tourist itineraries. Using the public transport for going about the city, we realized the true meaning of 'German Time'. Being used to the jostling of Mumbai locals, the convenience and comfort of buses and trains was a pleasant surprise.

The city, very well planned and green, presented to us a perfect blend of modern knowledge used to enhance well preserved history and balanced with environment friendly technology. We were just in time to catch the first summer days of the season. A week before our arrival, Stuttgart was experiencing snowfall and rain. Thus, according to our German friends, we brought in some of the sun from Mumbai. After a long winter, we saw people rush to nearby lakes and parks to soak in all the sun they could get – a stark contrast from India where summers tend to be unwelcome and tedious.

In Stuttgart, we saw a city trying very hard to come to terms with the inevitable burden history has placed upon it. From heritage buildings like the Old Castle being rebuilt after the

war to names of the people who were sent to extermination camps being carved into bronze plaques or fitted into the cobblestones in front of their erstwhile residences, we saw a city that pulled itself through despite the odds and emerged successful. Thus, this trip gave us memories that will definitely last a lifetime. We met some amazing people whom we will stay in touch with for a long time. Moreover, we got to experience a different approach to education at the University of Stuttgart. Leaving Stuttgart was an incredibly hard thing to do, since the city had come to become our second home in the matter of a few days.

The ninth online course '*In Conversation with Globalization*' was held from November to March 2015-16. With the addition of St. Petersburg Polytechnic University, Russia into the existing group comprising the University of Stuttgart, Germany, St. Louis University, USA, Stellenbosch University, South Africa and St. Xavier's College (Autonomous), Mumbai, the online course expanded to illuminate the globalization spirit. Seven faculty members and 24 students from the foreign universities engaged with the students of St. Xavier's College thus enlivening the concept of education transcending borders. Baptista) combined with a series of lectures maintained the balance between delightful explorations and earnest academics. Novel experiences are always welcome, but what we make of these experiences, how we imbibe them and assimilate them into a cohesive whole, ultimately defines the worthiness of the journey.

Our visit to Stuttgart in Germany, as part of a cultural exchange program will always be something we will fondly cherish for the rest of our lives. Not only did we openly engage with a culture that was astonishingly novel to our own, but we were also fortunate enough to meet a host of other individuals from diverse backgrounds and exciting experiences.

Our little coterie of friends became an ever widening cultural magnet, pulling in Bolivians, South Africans, Indians, Turkish, Vietnamese and American individuals alike. Truly, with the overarching theme of Human Rights, transcending borders was not such a distant dream anymore. In lieu of this fact, the assimilative value of these diverse cultures cannot be understated.

There was also a lot to imbibe and ponder over, given the stark differences that exist between our countries and cities. Despite the fact that Mumbai and Stuttgart are sister cities, we could not help but marvel at the range of their expertise and awareness as citizens of a city that was ravaged during the Second World War.

Of the places we visited, some of the most memorable were the Mercedes Benz Museum, the Hohenzollern Castle and the Ludwigsburg Castle. The Benz Museum not only had models of iconic cars that they have produced since the company's conception, but a history of the development of cars, and socio-political events that dominated Europe since the early 1900s.

The Hohenzollern Castle was a long trek up a mountain, which left most of us breathless- but not just because we weren't as fit as we thought. The view from up there was stunning. The students themselves had organized these visits, so they were always with us, providing us with detailed explanations of the history behind the Castle.

The Ludwigsburg Castle was magnificent. It had gardens which stretched for miles, which were three times larger when the Castle was originally built. It also had a theme park, which was designed along the lines of European fairy tales, including structures like Rapunzel's tower and Red Riding Hood's grandmother's house. It was like stepping into a book by the Brothers Grimm.

No trip to Germany is complete without the delicious Swabian food we sampled. We were staying with German students so we often ate lunch at home-things like spaetzle, schnitzel, and of course, sausages. The Wasen, their beer festival was another once in a lifetime experience, filled with people singing and dancing on benches as one large group.

The open fields, pastures and vineyards harmoniously co-exist with the bustling hub of the city downtown, boasting of crowded student pubs, universities, cafes, shopping malls, theatres, museums and castles (with more castles). The infrastructure allows one to commute swiftly via bus, road or train. This amazing syncretism of natural beauty and urban busyness was something that compelled us to reflect on the state of our own city.

Our visit to the rural areas of Germany just outside of Stuttgart was an

experience in itself. Beyond the bucolic setting of animal rearing, historical mills and cozy cottages, one could detect the hint of a population that was hard at work but at peace with itself, unlike the rural population in most other developing countries. Of course, with charmingly wondrous weather and a light breeze caressing the hand that holds your glass of wine/beer, the villagers have little to complain about.

Beautiful barbecues, impromptu adventures, long, purposeless walks and remarkable encounters with vivacious souls are what characterized our visit to Stuttgart.

All in all, it was a rather fulfilling cultural exchange, leading us to push the boundaries of what we know and to think globally. We will always be indebted to the Literature Department, and to our German hosts for having been so incredibly hospitable and accommodating. We can only hope that we did justice to this valuable program as students and look forward to hosting more friends from across the globe again.

AT THE CITY OF DREAMING SPIRES

Education has the power to break social barriers and shake the social strata by providing access to various opportunities. However, there are times when this very education is a dream too sweet to be true and thus it itself forms a social barrier between haves and have-nots. Just like many other students, I too could not apply for big universities abroad for undergraduate courses as the expenses are impossible or infeasible to meet. Short term courses are often even more expensive and thus inaccessible to most students in India.

However, I consider myself lucky to have been awarded an opportunity to study Economics and Philosophy at Oxford University for a term through Betty and Donald Keating Scholarship. Sponsored by benevolent Mr. Giles Keating, provided through St. Catherine's College to visiting students at Oxford University, this was a once in a lifetime opportunity which helped me live my dream of studying abroad in a premiere university. Being a Keating scholar I could live the life of an Oxford student without sharing a financial load of even a pence on my pocket.

After going through a compelling selection process which involved application and then two rounds of online interviews; Oxford makes sure that they select not only financially deserving and academically bright students but also an overall outgoing student, which from my experience was very crucial to survive in Oxford. Despite my CGPA being comparatively just okay in front of the other shortlisted applicants' CGPA, surprisingly I was the only one who got selected. I believe the two most important things which helped me get an edge over the other applicants were my academic assignment and my overall performance in extra-curricular activities. Now, after my stay at Oxford, I know that these two things are essentially the determinants for how one will live at Oxford later on.

This being my first time travelling abroad, the experience was a complete eye opener for me. There was certainly a culture shock which made me a bit

uncomfortable at start but Oxford is such a diverse place that no matter from where you are, you soon find yourself at home. My stay there can be summarised as a continuous active effort to seamlessly gel into a foreign culture which has actually taught me more about "What is culture?" than all my CIA's on Culture in Sociology Course. Oxford University to start with, functions really different than the Universities I have seen in India. While the University deals with all the Academic matters like lectures, exams, submissions etc, College looks after your accommodation, food, welfare and other Activities. Lectures were not compulsory and often used as only a supplementary aide for which lecture notes and few recorded lectures are available on online resource centre. As it was non-restrictive, all the students attending lectures were very attentive and interested in it. Apart from economics, I would often go sit for random lectures I found interest in. Tutorials was the most academically intense part of the Oxford and also it is what makes it stand out. In my term of 8 weeks I had 8 tutorials of 'Behavioural Economics' with Dr. Silvia Palano and 4 tutorials of 'Knowledge and Reality' with Dr. Andrea Christofidou, both of them are very well renowned in their field of work. A tutorial was a 1 hour one-on-one interaction with the tutor. At every tutorial I would present an essay based on the topic & the reading list given to me and the tutors would discuss it with me. These discussions were very interesting and often involved all colours of assertion, negation, arguments and talks about recent happenings. The tutors were really supportive and were determined to ensure I had a holistic and critical understanding of the topic. Post the tutorial, the rest of the week was typically spent in grabbing the books from various historic and magnificent libraries of Oxford and trying to break through the technical language of readings to write my next tutorial. Surrounded by millions of books, tall carved ceilings and smell of ageing old paper, studying in these gigantic libraries was a different experience

in itself. Oxford focusses a lot on self-learning and then reflecting on whatever is learnt. Being critical is the most essential part of academics.

Busy with activities throughout the day I did not have even a single moment when I felt isolated or uncomfortable.

new friends and learn new things by discussing various interesting topics with people in the college bar and table pool room, which often led to debates and discussions. Obviously, this scholarship is not a golden ticket to fortune, but this experience has reassured me that I can dream, work hard and achieve it. I am humbled by this opportunity, and would be forever grateful to Mr. Keating, Oxford University and St. Xavier's College without whom this would not have been possible. During the application process a year back I had many queries and wished somebody could help me and thus I would like to help the CIP centre in college by providing assistance to Keating Scholarship Applicants by solving their queries, helping out in interviews and post selection process.

CREATIVE WRITING WORKSHOP - UNIVERSITY OF IOWA

A summer course Creative Writing Workshop, led by the University of Iowa's International Writing Program (IWP) delegates, organized by the U.S. Consulate General, Mumbai and the Department of English, St. Xavier's College, Mumbai, was held on the 31st of March 2016. The workshop was conducted by professor Lincoln Paine, professor Sandra A., professor Sandra L. and Ms. Rochelle. Ms. Kelly and Ms. Ashima Chakravorty, working for the Cultural Affairs office of the U.S. Consulate in Mumbai, were among the others who were part of the team.

Prof. Pearl Pastakia, head of the Department of English, St. Xavier's College, introduced the professors who were going to conduct the respective workshops followed by a short reading of their published work, respectively. The entire workshop included creative writing in Non-fiction, Fiction, Poetry and Screenplay. The students were allowed to choose the area of their liking in order to develop their skills and learn the various technicalities of creative writing.

After the brief introductions the

students were asked to segregate themselves into their respective groups. Prof. Sandra L., conducted the creative writing in Screenplay workshop, an area she is known for. She spoke to the students about how one must write; to not follow a particular structure at the very beginning itself, but to put down whatever comes to one's mind at the moment and at the end gather all the pieces together, putting them into a well established structure. She spoke about the importance of having a good knowledge of our basics, that could be being well versed with our classics because it does play a significant role in what we choose to write, that one should draw from one's day to day experiences. She gave the students a writing assignment, asking each one to put down an experience which changed their life entirely, after which everyone could share it with the rest of the group. She did give her suggestions as to how one should present their story on screen and highlighted on how it's always easy to write down the workings of a character's mind, but while on screen it could be shown through the character's behaviour. 



SGNP Communication Activity

The first year BMM students of St. Xavier's College were exposed to a critical concern of man-animal conflict reportage in the mainstream media with a special focus on the issue of leopard attacks. Mr. Nikit Surve, a wildlife researcher associated with the Sanjay Gandhi National Park and an alumnus gave the students insight to understanding the wildlife and the reasons for why the animal attack happens. Along with a series of lectures on wild life the students were also exposed to the mainstream media coverage by Mr. Virat Singh, DNA, and environmental journalist. The students were also taken to the national park for a field visit. Based on these lessons, the students were asked to design and execute ideas to generate awareness programs using various media platforms. The groups came up with interesting concepts - earnest blogs were written, creative info graphics were made, informative newsletters got generated, This paved the way for a two day exhibition and street play in the Sanjay Gandhi National Park, Borivali on the 9th and 10th April 2016. A program was designed to campaign in the form of posters and a street play 'Jungle Ki Jung' was performed over two days with an overwhelming response of the visitors and staff in charge of SGNP.





International Yoga Day Celebration in the college hall

SOCIAL INVOLVEMENT PROGRAMME

St. Xavier's College- Autonomous, Mumbai has always endeavored to change the paradigms of education. Since 1996 it has been providing students with beyond the classroom and campus learning opportunities through the **Social Involvement Programme (S.I.P.)** This programme fundamentally aspires towards a holistic education by focusing on:

1. The creation of social awareness and sensitization, both among students and citizens at large.
2. The motivation of students to explore and engage with India's socio-economic realities to raise vital questions and make meaningful interventions.

In the academic year 2015-16, 877 students participated in the obligatory component and 84 students participated in the voluntary Honors Programme component of the S.I.P. The classwise distribution is shown in the following figure.



Activities in the following genres were undertaken by the students for the completion of SIP credit.

I) HEALTH

a. Medical Camp: Students participated in the free medical health camp organized by the Inter-Religious Department. Prior to the Health Camp students were asked to mobilize and motivate the underprivileged sections of the society especially women and

children residing on the pavement in and around the Churchgate and Reay Road area. On the day of the medical camp the volunteer's role was to scrutinize the medicines and provide it to the patients under the guidance of the doctors. They also had to keep the children engaged by playing games.

- b. Genetic Disorder:** Students volunteered to create awareness about genetic disorders among the general public. As part of this programme, students were asked to visit special schools to introduce the organisation and their work in the area of facilitating children who are suffering from genetic disorder. Some students also participated in the NGO's "Medical Community Survey" with an aim to understand the current status of genetic disorders in different parts of Mumbai. In addition to this, students interviewed doctors to collate their opinions about genetic disorders.

c. Hospital Intervention: Students worked in the area of health. The work involved visiting patients suffering from the Parkinson Disease, engaging with health



issues in slums and interacting with patients in hospitals. They also participated in the cleanliness drive at Mulund Municipal Maternity Ward.

II) LITERACY AND LIVELIHOOD



a. School Interventions: Student-volunteers assisted the educational efforts of economically vulnerable children by helping in both informal schools and formal schools. Some volunteers conducted language enhancement classes for underprivileged vernacular medium students in the college itself.

b. Work with Destitutes: Students volunteered with the NGO "Pehchan" which works for the rights and identity of homeless people. The students work involved conducting income generation activities for women. Here they taught women how to prepare





coasters as well as bows for hair bands. They also conducted drawing competitions among children and taught them basic English.

c. Generating Educational Databases: Students volunteered at 'Freakademics', an online facility for generating academic material for school children. It involved selecting relevant videos related to the Maharashtra Board syllabus and uploading them on Freakademics website. This material was used by organisations working with underprivileged children.

III) DIFFERENTLY-ABLED:

Students assisted the visually challenged and those with physical and intellectual disabilities by being 'shadow-teachers' and interacting with them. They also participated in the 'Safety walk' organized by Point of View to create disability awareness and sensitivity.

IV) ELDERLY: Students worked with



the elderly wherein they spent time with them and conducted indoor activities for them.

V) WOMEN: The students work involved creating awareness about dowry deaths in local communities and ensuring the smooth functioning of SHGs.

It is with activities like the above, that Xavierites' hearts are touched by direct experiences, thus compelling their minds to be challenged to change.

SOCIAL SERVICE LEAGUE

Each year, we at the SSL try to change something about ourselves- how we work, the projects we work with or even doing what we've been doing, better. And in terms of all this, 2015-16 was a spectacular year. We managed to add not one but two new projects, took in a bigger team, collaborated with several NGOs and even had an SSL alumni event.

The year started off with a Project Paint visit, one of the new projects we took up. Project Paint involved painting walls of municipality schools to make them look less washed out and drab, using colours, cartoons and

learning aids. A few of our visits were done in collaboration with the Gandhi Fellowship, and as the year went by, our artworks grew better and so did the way we organized it. One of the most popular projects in the SSL, it left all those who volunteered for it with painted pants and, warm hearts. Bloomerang, the other new initiative we took up was the brainchild of a student who decided to combine her two passions- dancing

and teaching, and came up with a novel idea. Bloomerang worked in collaboration with the NGO Apne Aap, wherein we conducted weekly visits and taught the girls the centre worked with, Bharatnatyam. Apne Aap is an NGO based in Kamathipura that works with the children of sex workers and working with them was a truly moving experience for us.

Blood Drive, one of our longest



running projects hit a new donor count milestone last year, with us reaching 430 donors, indicating a greater awareness and a greater willingness to donate. Each pint of blood goes to 3 people with most of it going to Thalassaemic children, definitely not a contribution that can be ignored!

Rural Camp is the 10 days that most of us wait for throughout the year. Last year was quite different from the previous camps. We worked on chilli fields, learned to pick weeds, dug pits, and even learnt a bit about farming techniques. Armed with guitars, playing cards and tools, sans our phones and consuming a daily diet of daal-rice, rural camp left an indelible mark upon us.

January was a busy month with another Blood Drive, an Exhibition and Project Care Mela. Project Care Mela is a two day event organised in college wherein we get the children from our centres in Byculia and Mahalakshmi. These centres are located in slums where we work throughout the year. The team went big this year with a bouncy castle and the usual games, dancing and children full of laughter. Exhibition too, decided to focus on children last year. It chose to collaborate with two NGOs; Bookwallahs and St. Jude's (a centre for children with cancer) and even with the Hindi Theatre Society in college. It garnered a lot of positive response and was the result of immense hard work by the volunteers as well as the project secretaries.

Apart from this, we continued to have weekly Project Care visits; we also had an E-Waste and a Book collection drive. While some of our risks paid off, some didn't go off as well as we expected them too; like our initiative to change how plates in the foyer are segregated.

All in all, it was an eventful year and we didn't shy away from doing new things, learnt from our mistakes and met a lot of wonderful volunteers who were the reason why we ultimately managed to get all of it done! Here's to hoping that this year too, will be just as exciting and eventful.

DEPARTMENT OF INTER-RELIGIOUS STUDIES

1. Minorities and Civil Society: Understanding and Responding to the Socio-Political Situation

The DIRS collaborated with XISR in organizing Minorities and Civil Society: Understanding and Responding to the Socio-Political Situation at XIMR on 29th August 2015 from 2 to 6 pm. The main speakers Irfan Engineer and Teesta Setalvad, who are committed activists, shared their unique perspectives based on their struggles. 10 participants volunteered to be on a Core Committee to draw up an action plans. As a follow up there have been regular Core Committee meetings once a month.

2. International Yoga Day



The DIRS organised the International Yoga Day celebration for the college on Wed. 24 June from 3 to 5 pm. A sizeable number of staff and students thoroughly enjoyed this session led by Frs. Roy and Prashant.

3. Honours Courses

a. JOY of SELF DISCOVERY by Prashant

There was a series of meditation workshops for those doing the Honours course on 'Joy in Self Discovery' from 7-9 Sept. from 2 to 5 pm. The participants appreciated the healthy integration of eastern and western forms of meditation.

b. AWAKENING to COSMIC COMPASSION by Dr. Orla Hazra, Prashant and Candice Menezes



The FY BA 'A' students were fortunate to have the team of Dr. Orla Hazra and Prashant, assisted by Ms Candice Menezes to teach the SPC courses on Environment and Giving Voice to Values. They tried various creative initiatives to provide an integrated perspective based on the overarching context of the universe story and the universal values of the Earth Charter.

The team also co-facilitated a weekend retreat at St. Xavier's villa, Khandala from 11-13 Sept. 2016 for selected Honours students of the FYBA 'A' SPC Environment class. The methodology of the Ignatian Pedagogical Paradigm (IPP) was conducive to explore creative forms of art, music, movement and meditation thus giving a new flavour to the theme: Awakening to Cosmic Compassion. The culmination of the retreat was a meditative cosmic walk pausing at the 8 thresholds of the 13.8 billion year universe story.

To foster an integral ecological approach the students were first given an exposure on 31 August to the Pardhi tribe at the Reay Rd. slum, where the XISR has an ongoing social project. They were struck by the environmental garbage dumped in front of the Pardhi huts and also witnessed how the Pardhis are considered as human garbage.

c. HINDUISM - HONOURS COURSE by Dr. Noel Sheth

The DIRS organized an Honours Course on 'Hinduism' from 30th November to 8th December, 2015. This course facilitated by Dr. Noel

Sheth SJ. It was quite enlightening and well appreciated.

4. Film Discussion – PK

On 14 Sept. from 2 to 5 pm there was a film screening of the controversial film 'PK' and a stimulating discussion on 'Commercialisation of Religion.'

5. Creativity Workshop

On 16th Sept from 2.30 to 5.30 pm there was a highly appreciated 'Creativity Workshop' facilitated by Terry Q SJ in his own inimitable style.

6. Integral Ecology: CRY of the EARTH, CRY of the POOR

a. CRY of the EARTH: Triple C to Celebrate Care for the Cosmos

Inspired by the message of Pope Francis to have special prayers to foster 'Care for Creation', three groups namely Department of Interreligious Studies (DIRS), Marathi Vangmay Mandal (MVM) and United Religions Initiative (URI) collaborated to organize TRIPLE C to Celebrate Care for the Cosmos. It was held on 16th Sept from 1 to 1.50 pm in the Multimedia Room.

After an Indian creation of dance and interreligious prayers for peace and creation several enlightening insights on the ecological significance of Ganapati (18 Sept) and Bakri Id (25 Sept.) were shared. There was also a brief presentation on the global events connected with International Peace Day (21 Sept.) by a representative of the URI, an international NGO. This was followed by a procession to the DIRS office where we had the blessing of the herbal garden followed by the installation of Ganapati. At the Visarjan (return to Mother Earth) on 18 Sept. the statue made from clay was immersed in water and will eventually be used for the herbal garden thus providing healing for humans and the planet. In the spirit of Lokmanya Tilak who popularized this festival by using it as a public protest against British rule we hope to promote advocates for communal harmony, ecological concern and world peace. Dr. Rajendra Shinde, the Vice-Principal, in his brief

message encouraged the students to have similar interreligious and eco-friendly festivals that avoid noise, air and water pollution.

b. CRY of the POOR: MEDICAL CAMP for the MARGINALISED



The DIRS in its attempt to foster an integral ecology besides listening to the cry of the earth is also listening to the cry of the poor. On Sunday, 20 Sept from 10 am to 3 pm the DIRS collaborated with XISR to host a Medical Camp in the foyer at Xavier's. The doctors of St. Elizabeth's hospital and GT hospital as well as more than 50 DIRS volunteers were given this opportunity to connect with the poor. This was a small attempt to get students of all faiths to reach out to the marginalized groups like the Pardhis from Reay Rd and street dwellers in the vicinity.

7. National Tribal Festival at Ranchi – 21-28 Oct. 2015



9 of us from Xaviers were the only non-tribals who were privileged to attend the JEMAI Jesuit national tribal festival at Ranchi from 23-27 October and participate in the soul stirring, communitarian dances of a variety of tribes from all over India. Their interconnection with each other and creation was symbolized in their dances.

The topic of the festival was "Promoting Livelihood of Tribals in India." There were animated discussions on how the tribal resources of land, forest, water, food, labour are being exploited in the

name of development.

The visit to a nearby village gave us a glimpse of the empowerment of women through projects of organic farming, poultry, and fishing. The meditation with the Ranchi Jesuit novices was quite refreshing.

What struck us most was the trip to the coal mine and the cost that the tribals are paying to provide electricity for urban areas. What was even more shocking was the discovery that the same corporates that fund our prestigious institutions are the ones that are raping Mother Earth and the tribals.

This experience made us more passionate about taking a stand on climate change and being a voice for the voiceless.

8. Digital Morcha for Climate Justice

We are delighted to report that the Mumbai's Digital Climate March has made a significant difference! With an outreach of more than 6 lakh digital marchers from Mumbai, we, along with other marchers worldwide, have succeeded in convincing leaders of nations who had gathered for the COP21 Paris talks (30 Nov -12 Dec) to take concrete steps towards climate justice.

St. Xavier's College, Mumbai was privileged to be a pocket for the Digital Climate Morcha on Nov. 29 from 5 to 7.30 pm. We felt connected through the online live streaming with worldwide protest marches taking place on that day. The enterprising compere, Anoushka Dutta, enthused the crowd by getting them to join in the video "Sing for the Climate". The input by alumna Rashida Atthar, an environmental researcher and activist, focused on the impact of Climate Change on Mumbai. The AICUF choir presented 'Be The Change' a moving song composed by Rachel D'Souza. Rev. Matt Cobb from Kansas, a committed collaborator and frequent visitor to Xaviers, while sharing his indigenous wisdom through a recorded interview pleaded that we beg for pardon from the land, air, water and fire for the abuse of these natural resources. Fr. Prashant in

his presentation on the National Jesuit Tribal Festival at Ranchi spoke about the exposure trip to a coal mine which was a living hell. The brief meditation stirred up pangs of conscience as the energy and resources in places like Xavier's are being consumed at the cost of the lives of poor tribals and the rape of Mother Earth. Students of the FYBA staged a lively street play on Waste Management. Labdhi Vora and Anushka Hirvani presented an Indian fusion dance on climate change and finally Janhvi Pandya (Indian Music Group) accompanied by Karan D'Silva enthralled the crowd with the popular "Heal the World."

9. Interfaith Meditation

a. InterFaith Prayer Service: Be the Voice of Mother Earth

For the first time a new tradition was set by holding an InterFaith Prayer service at 9 am on 3 December 2015, the feast of St. Francis Xavier, the patron of our college.

Both Fr. Prashant, who gave a brief background to the theme: Be The Voice of Mother Earth as well as Fr. Tony J. D'Souza, the rector, challenged us to explore new frontiers following in the footsteps of Xavier and the contemporary Jesuit mission. The intercessory prayers on the burning issues of communal harmony and climate change, both new frontiers, were led by Gulshan Shaikh. The hall was enthralled by the evocative 'Heal the World' sung by Frs. Terry and Roy and an enchanting fusion Indian dance on climate change by Labdhi and Anoushka. The provocative youtube 'BOI' by the Sufi Gospel singer, Sonam Kalra, encouraged us to speak out on issues at a time when prophetic voices are being silenced. Susanne Rodrigues shared her heart-rending experience of the visit to the coal mines at Ranchi as part of the National Jesuit Tribal festival. This raised questions about India's insistence at the Paris talks on continuing with use of coal for energy. After the Prayers for Creation' from various faith traditions the AICUF choir created a devotional mood of interfaith harmony and peace by singing "Be Faithful".

Anoushka Dutta, the spirited compere, enthused the crowd and got all of us moving together to "Sing for the Climate." This new venture was highly appreciated by those staff and students who actively participated in it.

b. We had brief interfaith meditation services on the first Wednesdays of July and August during the breaks at 8.50, 9.40, 10.30, 11.20, 12.10 and 1 pm to cater to various streams. Those who attended found them helpful to foster communal harmony.

c. Instead of having the interfaith service for January in the college on 23 January we visited Niramay Niketan, a leprosy cum AIDS rehabilitation centre at Trombay. The service began with a classical Indian prayer dance by Labdhi and Anoushka. The action songs helped to create an atmosphere of joy and peace. The special blessing prayer was very moving for all of us. One of the inmates shared that he saw Durga ma in the dance. Another shared that he is usually preoccupied with anxieties about his health but the prayer session gave him an hour of peace.

Lay collaborators Brinelle D'Souza and Candice Menezes joined us for this venture. Clare Menezes celebrated her birthday by distributing snacks for all.

10. Cosmic Crib

In keeping with the "Out of the Box" programmes held in 2015 we hit upon the idea of having a Cosmic Crib. The Paris COP 21 international conference on Climate Change and the Pope's Encyclical 'Laudato Si' offering a challenge to the leaders of nations gathered there prompted us to widen our horizons.

At the centre of the Cosmic Crib is the earth which is plagued by climate change, communal violence etc. Visitors pinned their stars on the cosmic backdrop with the awareness that they too are STARS.

Where is Christ in all this? Those familiar with the Jesuit mantra of "finding God in all things" will be struck with awe and reverence at contemplating God who has been labouring from the Big Bang onwards and invites us to be cocreators today

The quotes that form part of the backdrop are quite appropriate

1. "Someday, after mastering the winds, the waves, the tides and gravity, we shall harness for God the energies of love, and then, for a second time in the history of the world, man will have discovered fire." (Pierre Teilhard de Chardin)

2. Stop acting so small. You are the universe in ecstatic motion. (Rumi)

11. RELIGIONS: Liberative or Oppressive for LGBT?

The noted transgender activist, Laxmi Narayan Tripathi, who had represented Asia-Pacific at the UN, kept the Xavier's college staff and students enthralled for more than two hours with her lively stories and unique insights on Religions: Liberative or Oppressive for LGBT? Her liberal interpretation of the scriptures of various faiths is a challenge to religious leaders and believers to widen their limited horizons and become more inclusive in the spirit of their founders Prof. Ms Pranoti Chirmuley skilfully facilitated the session held on 15 February 2016 from 2 to 4 pm.

While some were not so comfortable with her atypical style and controversial remarks, which ranged from the personal to the political, quite a few were touched by her free, frank and fearless sharing at a time when respectable people dare not speak out. This novel programme was an apt culmination to the various "out of the box" activities organised by the DIRS during the academic year. The first ever DIRS magazine was inaugurated by the Principal, Dr. Agnelo Menezes, on this auspicious occasion.

12. SAMANVAYA: Collaboration For Communal Harmony

SAMANVAYA, the recently formed group to foster Communal Harmony, had its inaugural workshop on

31 March 2016 from 3.30 to 6.30 pm at the XIMR Assembly hall, St. Xavier's college. Ashokji of Lok Raj Sanghatan made an enlightening presentation on "Building Grassroots Democracy for Communal Harmony"

which highlighted the strategic policy of “divide and rule” employed by all those who have governed the country for the last 300 years. Irfan Engineer in his brief response complemented this perspective by demonstrating the steps taken in recent times to foster communal violence. There was a growing awareness that the appropriate answer lies in empowering people at the grassroots and uniting for change. Attempts to network with progressive groups striving for communal harmony and the fruitful collaboration of XIC, XISR, XIMR, SXC and DIRS were distinctive features of this workshop.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR CREDIT COMMITTEE

A. Hindi Theatre Society(Fitoor)

Structure: The society modified the hierarchy structure this year by forming 4 departments- Events, Management, Creatives and Publicity.

Events: The events conducted this year included a crowd-pleasing event called Dubmaster, which witnessed 25 participating teams and an audience of 20 people. Jashn-E-Fitoor, at the Carnival, attracted an audience of around 150 people, apart from giving a platform to the talent discovered in the past year. The 4 plays presented included actors, directors and musicians across all streams.

Outside College: The society also participated in various intercollegiate theatre events this year such as Kaleidoscope and Kshitij. We also put up street plays-at The Hive(Bandra)

and in college as an awareness initiative in collaboration with SSL. These events attracted loads of new artists who were given an opportunity to take part in these events.

B. English Theatre Society:

Activities and events: The main activity of the society was regular meetings on Mondays. This happened almost every Monday of the first semester. The attendance fizzled out after the first two meetings to just one four or five participants. The events that did get participants were the workshops, those conducted by professionals as well as the ones conducted by me. It might be better to replace regular meetings with regular workshops, mostly with professionals, as they attract a lot more crowd.

Contingent: None of the contingents besides Malhar came from this society, because people just didn’t turn up

regularly enough to be considered permanent members. It might be better just to conduct auditions and announce them publicly than to expect in house actors to turn up.

C. Film Society(Film Countdown)

Objectives and initiatives:

1. To show cinema that is not popular but still worthy of recognition
2. To inculcate an appreciation of cinema that goes beyond viewing
3. To discuss why classics are considered so - more film theory based sessions
4. To gain insights from people in the industry and organise workshops by the same
5. To set up a blog that would not only provide insight into the FC’s yearly activities but also invite members to write reviews/express opinions.

Events: Screenings thrice a month, sometimes twice. Screenings for international indie films that won awards seem to be most popular. Indian cinema and classics suffered, the main reasons for which were easy availability online or a bias against content. I would suggest that the future team pander to the choices of its audience and conduct more feedback sessions to ensure that both parties are satisfied with the choice of films.

II. THE FORUMS

A. Indian Performing Arts(Ipa):

The India Performing Arts forum has under it two societies, The Dance Troupe and Swaranjali, representing Indian classical dance and music respectively.

The Dance Troupe: The events

conducted by our society this year were: A workshop on the Maharashtrian folk dance- Lavni, conducted by Chetan Shigwan. We got a good response for this, 20 participants.

Nrityangan is St. Xavier's College's classical dance competition, under the ECC Carnival. We received 12 participants for this competition and the winners were awarded with trophies as well as cash prizes. The judges for this event were Tina Tambe and Shashi Ramesh.

B. Western Performing Arts(Wpa):

Unlike past years, the WPA forum initiated the formation of a new society called the International Dance Society (IDS).

C. FINE ARTS(FA):

The Fine Arts forum actively helped with the art and decor of the various ECC activities, as well as publicity (both online and on-campus) for the same. The two sub-departments of FA viz. Creatives and Documentation, with their respective heads were quite efficient throughout the year; especially during Carnival.

The FA forum also conducted a Charcoal Painting workshop which received great participation and feedback. It also helped in sending a good-quality contingent to college festivals. It held a relay painting event during the Carnival.

D. Literary Arts(LA):

The LA forum is in-charge of promoting the talent in Literary Arts in the college. Accordingly the English Theatre Society (ETS), Hindi Theatre Society (Fitoor) and the Debate Society (Deb Soc) come under the LA forum. There were no volunteers selected for the forum.

Activities by the Forum: The LA forum conducted the first workshop of the academic year. On 7th July 2015, Sherna Khambatta conducted a Creative Writing Workshop. The few attendees gave mixed reviews but were happy for the platform to have a discussion with a professional book agent. On the 10th of July 2015, Thespo, the youth theatre initiative conducted their orientation meeting, giving insight into their work and prospects for young theatre aspirants. This was followed

by a workshop on Improv Comedy by Shaun Williams. The workshop was fun and enriching and led to a contented group of participants. The forum aided the CLs of Vaayu and Kshitij to send contingents for the same. During the ECC Carnival, the forum conducted a Taboo Tournament named Guess What!

E. Administration And Logistics:

Administration and Logistics efficiently ran a lot of errands for the entire committee- from the booking of rooms to arranging the venue. As such, recruitment of volunteers to do the same, year-round proves beneficial.

III. OUTSIDE COLLEGE PARTICIPATION

We sent contingents to Malhar 2015, where we won the runners-up trophy and the Conclave trophy. In Kshitij 2015(Mithibai), we won the Fine Arts trophy. We also sent a good number of participants to Vaayu 2015(NMIMS), Kaleidoscope 2015(Sophia's) and UA 2016(Ruia). Media and management festivals like Cutting Chai and Panaah also saw great participation from Xavier's, and Xavier's placed second in the latter.

Besides, solo participants were encouraged and a fruitful result was seen in the case of MS. Sharlene Lobo '16, who won the national finale of the talent hunt conducted JOSH(NAEMD).

IV. CARNIVAL

ECC Carnival in its second year was a far better feature than in the first year. Organised efforts on part of the forums, and the societies as well as an added team of volunteers led to better publicity and creative events and workshops. Departments and sub-departments were formed to deal with the demands of the event- Publicity, Finance, Marketing, Administration, Logistics and Creatives, headed by either the forum coordinators or the heads of the society or the Cultural Secretary directly. This year Carnival had a total of 9 events, with moderate to fair participation in these. Cash prizes were given to winners, and the judges were felicitated with a token of gratitude each.

LANGUAGE LAB

St. Xavier's Language Laboratory: Language Lab is equipped with the latest in Language Acquisition Technology. It caters to both new learners of a language and those doing advanced courses in English, Hindi, French and Marathi. Students get the freedom to learn at their own pace with the help of language learning software installed on 25 computers in the spacious air conditioned lab and the most recent books on soft skills. Instructional assistance is provided to the students individually and collectively based on the required area of improvement. The sessions focus on modeled strategies for students with a holistic bank of skills to draw upon. This includes group reading sessions where students choose from an exciting array of reading material: newspapers, classic texts and reference books from the college library as well as their own write ups. This extends into speech activities and vocabulary exercises closing with peer and self assessment. Additionally, grammar and punctuation rules and techniques are drawn from the above shared texts. We believe that students begin to understand grammar concepts, and start to apply them in their own writing, when they start to read with a writer's mind.

English Language Courses for a Semester

The first year students from B.A., B.Sc. and IT were shortlisted post the diverse diagnostic tests and registered for a special course in Language Lab for one semester. The course for science streams included reading and writing skills for CIA I focusing on descriptive and opinion writing style. CIA II covered listening and speaking skills with an essential focus on PowerPoint presentation skills. The course for FYBA included critical reading thinking and writing for CIA I and interview skills for CIA II. The interview modules were customized per each student's tentative career road map which included Civil Services, Actuarial Science, Animation, Business Administration, Teaching and college admission for Masters Degree.

Additionally, three students from Soka

University, J a p a n enrolled for a 4 month course in the English Language through CIP. The

course objective was to help them with expressing themselves and their knowledge efficiently through spoken English practice along the lines of neutral accent.

English Language Courses for a Year

Modified tutorials were conducted at the Language Lab parallel to Business Communication lectures for students of Vocational courses of Tourism and Software Development all through the academic year. The sessions comprised of interactive components based on the syllabus of Business Communication Skills prescribed for F.Y.B.VOC. The diverse strategies of office communication were shared as a lecture session, and the same was assessed in guided reading and listening activities in the Language Lab tutorials.

Short Term Courses

For the third consecutive year Language Lab had students from Soka University, Japan, participating in the specialized, intensive short term English Language Course in the month of February. The course modules included lectures, role plays, group activities and individual power point presentations by the participants. The vastly interactive audio visual sessions held in the Language Lab also provided a platform to the participants for interacting with St. Xavier's students from Arts, Science and Management faculties.

Ongoing Remedial Sessions

The academic year 2015-16 saw a remarkable rise in students voluntarily walking into the Language Lab for enhancing their communication skills. Groups were formed based on common areas of language improvement and sessions were scheduled per the



student's available hours in his or her timetable. The sessions were modeled around listening, speaking, reading and writing skills.

Special Hindi Sessions

In addition to regular courses in English language and soft skills, Language Lab has been conducting short term Conversational Hindi classes for our outstationed and visiting students who attend regular classes. 





OUR ALUMNI



TO FORM OR BE FORMED: THAT IS THE QUESTION



Ameya Pratap Singh

To form or be formed: that is the question.

“I’m sure we all have great ideas, but no medium to fructify them”, quips Ameya.

Haunted with revolutionary questions, his mind abuzz with a myriad of innovative ideas, the Political Science student could hardly contain his restlessness. After all, he had answers to be acquired, goals to be met, dreams to be fulfilled. Like many young graduates, Ameya Pratap Singh was bursting with a long-developed enthusiasm towards making a difference, bringing change in the society’s status quo.

Of course one could ask what fuelled his hunger. Well, it was nothing but his belief in the youth’s capacity to make a mark that kept him motivated. “We’re about 65% of India’s population. But where is our voice?” he asks. “If there is one demographical sect that has the ability to exercise the power of democracy in India; it is the youth.

His greatest weapon, one he recommends to this generation as well, is the evergreen concept of putting pen to paper. People today opine as effortlessly as they form them. They write about trivia and then they write about watershed moments in national and global politics, society etc. Ameya stresses upon the importance of written expression for he is of the strong conviction that a student is at his relevant best when he is participating in dialogue.

His undergraduate years as a Political Science student pushed him in the natural direction of research study, policy making etc. In the quest of experience, the spirited young man applied to several Think tanks.

And that’s where he hit the brick wall. “We don’t take undergraduates”, they said. “How was I to put all my textual understanding into practice? How was I to learn without interaction? The broader question was, how was anyone to do so?”

And that’s why ‘Young Bhartiya’ came into being. More than the need to stand out, it was the urgency of what was necessary. Some of its major objectives were (and remain to be so) providing a platform for students to write, participate in dialogue and in the process grow an affinity to learning. It also aims at encouraging students to be more research-oriented and through it, shed the conditioning of conformism and attempt uninhibited innovations.

Regardless of their field of geneses, it is only through research that an opportunity to create may emerge. He explains, “We have a section on our website that allows students to come and start movements, for any cause of their choice. It’s essentially to create social entrepreneurship. By the time we were done conceptualizing, we had perhaps moved away from the Idea of a think tank to something more tailor made for our needs.”

Following is the transcript of an interview with Ameya:

1) How challenging was it to put together thoughts, find people who actually believed in them and finally bring the initiative to palpable reality?

It took me about three months to get the organization off the ground. The eventual structure that we came to was a culmination of numerous brainstorming sessions that I had with my peers. The journey was great fun. It

was tough to have a permanent set of people working with me as most of my friends were leaving after graduation. But we pulled through it. The most important aspect of a start up is that you understand the entire of chain things; from the ground up. Although at times inexperience is time consuming, you’re constantly learning.

2) How important do you think it is for today’s youth to be aware, alert and writing?

I can’t stress the importance of that enough. Our education system doesn’t challenge us. It caters to the masses. If we want to push ourselves into productivity the greatest medium we have as students is writing. Plus once you write, you question and you find answers. A great part of the youth today supplements its information base to hearsay. Writing gives you an opportunity to understand, and more importantly it gives you an opportunity to apply yourself to that understanding. And I think it’s this power of analysis that helps you in the larger picture, in making the right life decisions. Also, from a career standpoint, literary work plays a fundamental work for college applications, Internship opportunities and jobs.

3) ‘Young Bhartiya’ is raw and new. Do you plan to expand it in any way in the near future?

We’ve just started with Mumbai. So right now our main focus is to try and expand our base to as many colleges here. Once we’ve made considerable strides with social change or academic innovation it will attract more students. We want to then expand to cities with larger student populations. In the long term I also want to expand to the rural sections of our country. The urban model that we currently use would have to change, but it’s important to provide a voice to them. In all honesty, no body has a more accurate understanding of the grassroot problems of India

then they do. If we can get them to perhaps raise the more pertinent issues impeding our growth then it can help generate a popular movement for their cause.

4) Has it received the necessary attraction with the student body you aim to address and empower?

I've honestly been overwhelmed by the response students have given. We already had about a 100 articles before our launch. And this is only going to grow. At face value the organization seems quite academic in nature, but its really not. It's a forum for dialogue for the things that interest you. Once students see this side to it, Things will be getting even better.

5) Deviating a little, I'm sure you're a well-read person. What readings would you recommend for hungry minds?

I used to hate reading. I think most students would understand where I'm coming from. I just saw no end product to it. Then I started with things that interested me, that played a more dominant role in my everyday life. Books on politics, diplomacy, travel, sports etc. I think it's a gradual process. We all eventually learn to fall in love with books, some sooner than

others. For people that like reading, I'd recommend the works of Henry Kissinger or Noam Chomsky or even William Darlymple. Their analytical skills are exceptional. Some of the books I've read recently are 'Alibaba', 'Black swan', 'Turn of the tortoise' and 'the man who knew infinity'. There's always so much great literature being written, you can pick and choose for things that grab your imagination. But the one thing id recommend for everyone would be reading the newspaper.

6) How did you come to be an intern at the Hon'ble President's office?

It's not an everyday opportunity is it? I think all the research, internships, and academic repertoire that I had played a part in me getting this opportunity. But most of it was just dumb luck. I happened to apply to the presidential secretariat and I was called for an interview. I can't thank Mrs. Omita Paul (Secretary to the president) Mr. Ashok Mehta (Private secretary to the president) and Dr. Thomas Mathew (Additional secretary to the president) for deeming me worthy of such an honor. I'm a national athlete, I faired reasonably well in academics, I'm the founder of a think tank, and I've worked in the offices of Leader of oppositions and state commissions before. But this

has been the most challenging affair I've ever been party to. The exposure and the responsibilities have almost been over-whelming at times. My essential job profile here is research. I was initially helping with a section of the Hon'ble President's autobiography. Now I'm working with a smart village initiative that is being formulated for 5 villages in Haryana.

7) Lastly, what are your plans for the future?

I'm going to be pursuing my masters in International relations from LSE this year. Thanks to the great support and guidance I received from Pratibhama'am and Shazia ma'am during my final year I was successful in my applications to every university I applied to, including Oxford. After my masters I expect to complete my MPhil and Phd. As a career path I most definitely want to be an entrepreneur. I'm greatly inspired by the work that Elon Musk has carried out. I believe that entrepreneurship is the ideal avenue to create something and revolutionize society along with it. And I hope more and more people do the same so we can transform ourselves from being conformists of global practices and constructs to innovators and contributors.

OF DELICACIES AND MORE...



Siddharth Sarpate at the My Mithaiwala Team

He didn't care for the studies. A student he undeniably was, in the city's most acclaimed college at that, but there was something in him that made him stand out from the crowd of academics-

oriented youngsters. People pointed him out to his juniors, "that's Siddharth, head of..." because he always headed something or the other. Enthusiastic and a natural leader, Siddharth Sarpate

took St. Xavier's extra-curricular arena by storm. What he looked for, says he, was exposure, ability to make tough decisions; something books cannot offer. "But, we always managed to do fairly well in academics too", quips the founder-CEO of My Mithaiwala- an online shopping portal for a variety of Indian sweetmeats.

Predictably, Siddharth and his friends wanted to give the 9-5 job profile a miss and yearned to live out of the box. Always an active part of organisations and fests, be it Malhar, Marathi Vangmay Mandal, ECC etc, the nagging idea of an independent venture

had enraptured them irrevocably. Ideas led to discussions and it was in one such brainstorming session that the young 20-year old hit gold. He wanted to do something in the food industry, specifically Indian sweets, since it hadn't been tapped as a niche market yet.

Working only over weekends with new-found jobs to keep them busy, gradually a list of potential business partners (read: sweetmeat shops) was formed. The difficult part was not getting their attention but rather harnessing it into an affirmative for the enterprise. While some joined hands, others ridiculed on the basis of doubt. Taking the rejection in its stride, the group motored on with their initial posse of supporters and it was that moment when Siddharth realised he had something real on his hands. Not only was he going to own and direct something, employing himself in the process, he was going to create jobs for others while at it.

It took gumption to quit hard-earned jobs but as he puts it, My Mithaiwala "was more than just an idea on paper". Knowing it demanded undivided dedication, it was only a matter of time till the website was created. An innovative, mouth-watering enterprise was born.

Here is a written account of a tête à tête with Siddharth and his team:

1) What kind of preparation and logistical support went into this venture?

There was a lot of research and preparation required before we launched our website. None of us had any work experience in the sweets industry. So we had to ensure that every process was well-defined. We had to make the website and logistics flow, get the marketing and promotional aspect in place. We had to set up a system with the sweet shops which we'd follow every time we got an order from the shops. We had to make sure that the entire process, from the time we received an

order up to the time it was delivered to the customer(s) was smooth and well set.

2) Who did the groundwork for putting 'My Mithaiwala' together? We are talking choosing of sweetmeat shops, delivery areas, logo and website creation?

Setting up My Mithaiwala was a team effort. We've distributed work amongst ourselves; everyone has been allotted specific roles in the company. Naresh, BSc IT graduate handles the website and the entire technical side of the company. Deepak, again a BSc IT graduate, looks after sales which include choosing sweet shops, approaching them and getting them onboard. Ajinkya, who has completed double graduation in Maths and Statistics from Xavier's and MSc in Statistics from Mumbai University, looks after the operations which involves the delivery process once an order is received. Om, a BMM (Advertising) graduate manages Marketing and Communications for the company. Siddhant, who has completed his B.A. (AIC), looks after the overall business development and expansion of the company. As everyone knows their role and duties, work becomes easier and faster, since everyone has some experience in the jobs that are assigned to them. We are glad to inform everyone that the My Mithaiwala logo is designed by yet another Xavierite, Dushyant Chogle who is also a BScIT graduate.

3) Did you worry about the service not being conventionally utilitarian? In other words, fear of failure because of inadequate demand?

The idea that we are working on is quite unique. No one has sold or bought sweets online till now as a real-time, hyper local, on-demand service and so both, the shops as well as the customers are not accustomed to this concept of e-commerce in the traditional sweets sector. Hence, making the customers and the shop owners believe that something like this is really possible

was our biggest challenge. Our general tendency as Indians while buying sweets is to first see, feel and taste them before buying in larger quantities. And of course that makes it a little difficult for us to sell Indian traditional sweets online. But, with internet and e-commerce markets growing up in full swing, many people are now getting habituated to online shopping. However, the positive here is that we have all known and famous shops on the website and people trust the quality of their products or have already tried their products before. So people would not worry about those aspects while buying sweets from these shops. Also, we try to provide as much information about the product possible along with their images so that the customer gets all the knowledge about the products they're buying. Since the concept is new, in the initial span, there is a fear of insufficient demand, but we're trying to promote our product to as widely as possible.

4) The major selling point of online sites for any commodity is lower prices. Do we get to see the same with 'My Mithaiwala'?

My Mithaiwala does not want to be a discount hub and provide sweets at lesser prices. My Mithaiwala wants to be a marketplace for all sweet shops where the customers can get a large variety to choose and buy products of their choice from the shops they like. So, the focus is more on giving more options to the customers than giving choices. Although we might give some coupons and discounts in the early days to acquire customers, we are not going to be a portal offering huge discounts and cheap prices in the longer run.

5) Who are the delivery personnel and what is their mode of transport?

We five founders ourselves deliver the sweets as of now. First of all because we want to study the process of order and delivery minutely. As they say, practical aids better comprehension. We plan to have our own team of delivery boys

at a later stage, but to train them, we need first need to know the process and where things can go wrong and where we need to be extra careful. Also, since we are completely bootstrapped right now, we do not have the budget to hire delivery boys at this stage. We mostly use public transport for delivery and we also have a scooter which we use in case if the delivery has to be done at a short notice.

6) Did the concerned sweetmeat shops require any sort of incentive to come onboard?

The biggest incentive for the sweet shops was the increased reach and customer base which they would get in the market. Their products could now reach customers who were far away from the shop. They did not need any added efforts to serve these customers. Also, an online presence and the opportunity to showcase all their products to people across the city. That was also a major incentive for them to join us at My Mithaiwala.

7) Lastly, is 'My Mithaiwala' a fulltime engagement or just a step forward to

newer business ventures?

Yes, My Mithaiwala is a full time commitment for all five of us. We're working on getting investment right now and once we get our first round of funding, we plan to expand our business to other parts of the city. We also plan to come with other ventures like My Mithaiwala under our company Dream Realities Pvt. Ltd. after My Mithaiwala becomes a stable and successful brand.


A WORDY REVOLUTION.

MUMBAI LOCAL: THE STORY OF DC-AC CONVERSION

Alarm rings... Snooze... Alarm rings again...

Force yourself out of bed and groggily walk to the bathroom.

Brush, bathe, dress up, grab a bite, and leave the house.

Go to the nearest railway station and board the train.

That is the cycle that greets most Xavierites each morning. In all this has anyone ever stopped to consider **the train**, without which the daily commute would've been impossible?

Well, let me now take you on a different journey, a journey through journeys, because there are certain things you need to know, or let's say - should know.

Speaking of local trains, each train is called an **'Electric Multiple Unit'** or in short, **EMU**. The word 'Electric' because the trains run on electric power from the overhead wires, and 'multiple unit' because unlike long distance express trains, where one locomotive in the front hauls the dead weight of some twenty coaches, here each local train has multiple power cars. There is one power car for every three coaches. For example, a 9 coach train will have 3 power cars, a 12 coach train has 4, and so on. So however long the train is, the power to weight ratio will remain


constant. This improves acceleration and braking capacity, which is why EMU trains are preferred in cities and for suburban routes which have frequent starts and stops.

About fifteen to twenty years ago, the iconic symbol of the Mumbai local trains used to be those quaint looking, box shaped, brown and yellow trains. These trains were mostly manufactured by 'Jessop'. They were used extensively on all three lines of Mumbai, i.e. the Western Railway (WR), the Central Railway (CR) and the Harbour Line, which is also a part of the Central Railway. They used to run on 1,500 volts Direct Current (DC) power supply and were thus also known as DC EMUs or DC locals. Their maximum speed was 80 km/hr and the ride was quite bouncy at that speed due to poor suspension. However, they still served Mumbai faithfully for many long years. And well, we have evolved a lot since then...

While the rest of Indian Railways was running on 25,000 volts Alternating Current (AC), the Mumbai division was still working on 1,500 volts DC, which was leading to many technical issues. So slowly, Mumbai started converting its network to 25,000 volts AC. The conversion would be done in various phases, not all at once, and since the power was changing, the

trains also would have to be changed. Mumbai needed trains which would be able to run on both DC as well as AC power. So companies like 'Alstom' and 'BHEL' started manufacturing such motors for local trains. These trains were also known as AC/DC EMUs and a few of them are still running today on both the Western and Central Railway.

The conversion from DC to AC was started from the extreme suburbs and slowly worked its way towards south Mumbai. The Western Railway started with the Virar - Borivali stretch and the Central Railway started with the Kasara - Kalyan and Karjat - Kalyan sections. Thus the DC EMUs could still be used till Borivali and Kalyan on the Western and Central Railways respectively, but only the AC/DC EMUs could ply beyond. The few AC/DC locals were not enough to run the services so Western Railway sent a request to the German company 'Siemens' asking them to manufacture EMUs, which were suitable to run both on DC as well as AC. The trains arrived, many trials were conducted and in 2007, the first Siemens EMU was inaugurated on the Western Railway. These trains gave a whole new outlook to the 'Mumbai local'. Painted white with a purple band near the bottom, and the interiors made of stainless steel, these new generation EMUs created an impact on the Mumbaikars and were an immediate success. They have a top speed of 100 km/hr, they're rugged, work without many breakdowns, their acceleration is just superb, they have newer features like streamlined bodies, regenerative braking to save power, as well as GPS system with live announcements and LED indicators in each coach, and most importantly, the ride for the commuters became smoother. All these features made the Siemens EMUs a big hit and they still form a vast majority of the current day fleet of Mumbai local trains. Nine years into service, and they are still going very strong, on all the three lines of Mumbai.

The DC - AC conversion on Western Railway had progressed to Ville Parle, and finally on 5th February, 2012 the last stretch from Churchgate to Ville Parle was converted to 25,000 volts AC, thereby making Western Railway the first branch of the Mumbai network to convert fully to Alternating Current. In order to meet the demand for more trains which could run on AC, the Integral Coach Factory (ICF), Chennai started manufacturing EMUs with pure AC motors. Painted similar to the Siemens locals, these trains are also very sturdy, however their performance is not as good as their Siemens counterparts, where acceleration and braking is concerned. Also, all the DC locals on the Western Railway had to be phased out. Some were given to Central Railway and the Harbour Line (which was still fully under DC at that time), while a few others were taken to the factory, and their motors were replaced with pure AC motors. These sort of trains are known as retrofitted EMUs, but their performance is again quite poor, since after all, they were old trains, without great suspension and other systems.

In the meantime, the Central Railway had converted the Kalyan to Thane section to AC, limiting the use of the old DC locals to the CST - Thane stretch. This called for more EMUs which were compatible with both AC and DC. So Central Railway also

started retrofitting its old trains but the difference was that instead of installing new pure AC motors, they installed dual current AC/DC motors. They also procured some Siemens EMUs to run especially on the long services to Karjat and Kasara. And this continued till 8th June, 2015 when the final stretch from Mumbai CST to Thane was converted to 25,000 volts and entire Central Railway came under AC power. The only line left in Mumbai under wires carrying DC was the Harbour line.

In the last two years, two significant steps have been taken towards a better future. The Western Railway has received new EMUs made by 'Bombardier', which run purely on AC. These are similar to the Siemens EMUs with certain upgradations like a higher maximum speed of 120 km/hr. An order for 72 such trains has been given, many of which are already running on the Western Railway. They're also painted white with a bright pink band which makes them look more appealing. As a result Western Railway is giving many of its Siemens EMUs to Central Railway and Harbour Line, which in turn are phasing out their age old EMUs. The second important thing happened very recently, on the night between 9th and 10th April, 2016. The last remaining segment in entire India which was running on 1,500 volts DC, i.e. the Harbour

Line was converted to 25,000 volts AC. The last ever DC EMU made its final voyage from Kurla to Mumbai CST on the Harbour Line. This was a very significant and historic moment for Mumbaikars. A great crowd of media and rail enthusiasts gathered there to witness the emotional moment as these EMUs that served Mumbai for 30 years or more, would never ever be seen again. It was time to bid goodbye to these trains forever...

We have arrived at our destination, and the journey has ended, but in reality the journey is never going to end. Progress and evolution are an integral part of everything in life. The local train reaches Virar, terminates and come back to Churchgate, but in a deeper sense, the train will keep moving in one direction. Newer, faster, smoother, better trains are definitely going to keep coming. Brown and yellow DC locals have given way to Siemens and Bombardier locals. After some years it maybe some other company, one cannot predict from now. But the one thing that will remain constant in life is change. Change for the better, evolution towards a greater future, the journey which does not have an end. It will just go on endlessly, the one and only journey with an unknown destination...

The Syrian refugee crisis saw numerous countries around the world pledge their support to these refugees offering

them shelter in their respective countries. Countries like Germany, Lebanon, Greece, Spain, Turkey and France have extended support to these refugees, offering them a home in their country. Taking course of the situation, it became evident that pure monetary help to these refugees would not be of much help to these refugees as with the level of destruction in their homeland, they have no home to return to. Humanitarian aid now began evolving with a whole new aspect added to it, apart from funds, countries began providing the physical space of their country as well as its resources for the benefit of a people who were ethnically foreign. This response was lauded by many as for its sensitivity to the less fortunate and was viewed as the ethically rational



response.

However, this world wasn't at a consensus on this. Many residents of these countries were cynical about this move. The primary cause of concern being that Many European countries, ones part of the once prosperous European Union, now struggle with high rates of unemployment and debt. Accommodating these additional citizens would mean having to give them job opportunities to enable them to enjoy a fair standard of life. In countries like Greece and Spain already plagued by financial difficulties, the prospect of having to provide employment which they believe is rightfully theirs. However, another major concern which was looming over the acceptance of refugees all along was terrorism and elevated crime rates. Post 9/11, it is a widely accepted fact that Muslims around the world are dealt with suspiciously. As per a YouGov poll conducted in Britain, Muslims were most commonly associated with the word 'terrorist' and 'terrorism' with 12% of those interviewed responded in this manner. The fears of these countries regarding this seemed to prove itself on the ill-fated day of 13th November 2015, when a series of attacks in Paris led to the death toll of 130. The perpetrators of this attack were found to have been radicalised in Syria and took advantage of the flow of migrants to enter the country and carry

out the attacks. The suspicions and reservations held by various Europeans about the danger of enabling migrants to enter the country which at one point seemed unwarranted and based on stereotyping now suddenly seemed rational. A number of the citizens of the EU began demanding their borders be closed to migrants. Germany in particular was asked to revise its stance as the spearhead of propagating providing refuge to these migrants. At the World Economic Forum in Davos, French Prime Minister Manuel Valls claimed that the refugee crisis was destabilising Europe, and the very idea of it being one unit. His concerns are justified, with Brexit now being a very possible outcome of this destabilization. It is not to say that the refugee crisis is the sole cause of this destabilization but the barriers in the open border policy imposed after the Paris and Brussels attacks have indeed brought into question the open border policy and the relevance of the Schengen agreement.

According to RT News, a startling 64% of the French believe that the refugees are a major source of crime in the country. Hence as the world seeks an evolved form of humanitarianism, another segment of the world's population sees itself becoming more radical, both ideologically and in its actions. One man has managed to take advantage of this situation and has evolved the once tabooed

radicalism to a more accepted form of it. Donald Trump with his host of anti – Islam statements among other slews against migrants has managed to use his radical ideas to his advantage, becoming the first candidate to secure his position in the 2016 US elections. In a world that looks at the dissolution of boundaries, Trump speaks of building a wall between the US and Mexico and 'bringing jobs back to the United States'. However, what would once have been discredited as radicalism with a negative connotation is now being supported by millions of Americans. Radicalism has now evolved from being shunned to being seen as the right to protect and preserve oneself and one's community and to the countless individuals fearing attacks like 9/11 and the Paris attacks it seems like the only rational choice.

However, these contradictory ideas are in fact complementary and lead to the evolution of the other as stated above. One evolves because the other seemingly gets out of hand a section of society becomes disillusioned with the existing state of affairs. Where this constant evolution will take the world is unpredictable, but the world and everything in it is in a constant state of flux and evolution is an essential process so that we may evolve into beings that can withstand the survival of the fittest.

SOCCER IN STEEL



With diligence embodied in steel, the aspirants of the Robocup 2016 are ready to kick-start their distinctive soccer tournament at Leipzig, Germany. Its battleground will galvanize 500 teams from more than 40

countries to the ultimate showdown of artificial intelligence and automation. The idea behind this was to use a game of skill and coordination to discover developments in robots as the game proceeds. Soccer indeed met the brief and initiated applications to real-time and concurrent programming. The Robocup thus incorporated humanoid robotics into the domain of sports, creating watersheds for both, science and soccer. It has evolved from a mere soccer league to a tournament with approximately twenty varied contests, ranging from identifying victims in disasters to communicating

with people in ordinary circumstances. This year, the robots will also compete in events like the Amazon Picking challenge, the Steam exhibition, the Robocamp and the most sought, The Standard League.

There are rules that limit excess development of one's hardware for these competitions, so as to maintain a standard level of contention. Intelligent strategies are encouraged instead of physical force. Every team sends in their methodology after the finals so that the teams of the following year know the expected level of performance and seek new paths to

victory. These competitions will be held from 30th June to 3rd July followed by the symposium on 4th July 2016. The Robocup is both, a source of entertainment for about 40,000 visitors and its Youtube viewers, as well as a scientific advancement.

Currently, the soccer tournament consists of four leagues. In 2015, 'TechUnited' from China won the Middle Size League, the 'Brain Kids' from Japan won the Small Size League, while 'Parand' from Iran won the Teen Size League. However, the Robocup champions were the ones that won the Standard League, the Australian team with a score of 3-1 against Germany's 'B-Human' team. Although Australia hasn't scored the winning goal with its all human football team in recent years, it definitely did with its humanoid soccer team this time.

The concept of an all robotic soccer league was incepted by Professor Alan Mackworth from the University of British Columbia, Canada in his paper, 'On Seeing Robots' in 1992. Later in October, a team of Japanese researchers

twitched this concept into a series of prototypes, financial and technology feasibility studies and rules to test its application. The results shone green lights and Hiroaki Kitano, Minoru Asada, Yasuo Kuniyoshi and few others launched the Robot J-League in 1993. When other countries wanted a piece of the action, an international joint venture was formed, 'the Robot World Cup Initiative' known widely as the 'Robocup'.

Hiroaki noted in his work, 'RoboCup-97: Robot Soccer World Cup I' that the ultimate goal was to "develop a robot soccer team which beats Brazil world cup team". Robocup 2050 is to be the year when this vision will plunge into reality. In 1997, researchers foresaw the attainment of this goal in decades if not centuries. However, as technology began to pace up, the goal drew closer and the vision grew clearer. In 2050, if the robots prove victorious, it would validate existing automation ventures and encourage more projects in the future.

Many are unaware of this soccer

Until then, as Robocup 2016 unveils its participants, you must root for your favourite and maybe they'd be the one benchmarking history, the first to defeat an all human soccer team.

THE STRUGGLE BETWEEN THE MIND AND THE BODY

I've been involved in matters relating to the transgender population of the world, i've been doing my own research for a year or so now. It started with an article, leading to me writing one of my own on this topic. The research once begun, never stopped.

As said by Agnostic Zetetic - No one has the right to demand that your body be anything different from what it truly is. Strangely, i grew up to witness otherwise.

Somewhere along the way, the skin on our bodies, the difference in our voices and the direction our heart takes us in, decided whether or not we should be given human rights.

We are defined by our thoughts, choices and decisions that we follow, through our toughest times. However, our identification lies in aspects distinct from the ones mentioned above. Imagine being born to fly but

being placed in a cage where you could barely stretch your wings - that feeling is precisely the emotional stigma of a transgender person.

Most of the people still struggle with an exact definition of transgender. Being transgender has nothing to do with one's "confused" state of mind, sex, genitalia or sexual orientation. Transgender is an umbrella term for several kinds of gender dysphoria - a conflict between someone's internal sense of gender and their biological sex at birth, it is strictly directed towards self gender identification. Being transgender today is entirely unreasonable and unnecessarily hard. But, far from hopeless. The tide is shifting but maybe, a tad bit too slowly while lives hang in the balance.

The Struggle

From a very early age, people with the gender dysphoria confess to having a

compelling conviction of something being wrong.

Robert Ludwig, having grown up on long island, New York, knew he wanted to be a girl and often sneaked into his mother's closet to try on her dresses. But he tamped down his emotions by playing basketball, joining the Navy, getting married and becoming a father. "It was horrible," Ludwig said. "Everyday i was reminded of pretentious life, everyday i was reminded of how i couldn't be myself. You look in the mirror and you see something where your body does not match your spirit. That's an inexpressible degree of private grief." In his 40s, Ludwig got a divorce, went through a sex reassignment surgery, and is now Gabrielle. This is just one of the thousand similar stories every transgender person confesses to.

For years transgender people have struggled with protection, visibility

and acceptance even among other minorities. With a list of states legalizing gay marriage and broadening their take on gay and lesbian rights, transgender individuals continue to be neglected. The numbers are one reason. In the United States there are about 8 million who identify themselves as gay, lesbian or bisexual. According to the Williams institute of UCLA's law school, only 700,000 identify themselves as transgenders.

At least 200 cities and countries, including small towns like Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Atlanta and many more, have banned gender identity discrimination. Yet, we find a staggering 64% of the transgender population being sexually assaulted, 55% losing their jobs due to their identity and 41% attempting suicide compared to the 1.6% of the general population. I wonder, where our world's going wrong.

A major contributing factor could be the something to do with what social and religious conservatives have to say (but of course!). To them, recognizing transgender rights is a bridge too high to overcome. "In reality, humans are born as males or females", says Jeff Johnston of the group Focus on the Family. His organization opposes law that legitimize what he calls "gender confusion", saying that such laws encourage impressionable young people to believe that they can be whatever they want to be. It is not just such societal groups that go by this reasoning but also, a large majority of the public which is somehow under the impression that being transgender is a choice made by a person to escape routine difficulties faced by people all over the world. Some even go as far as blaming the parents for not implicating enough boundaries into their children's youth. Many parents of transgender children are subjected to ramifications of the decision to support their children. What you and I are unaware of, is the intensity of it all.

Another brave example would be the famous Bruce Jenner, a former track and field athlete and current television personality, who also won

the gold medal in decathlon at the 1976 summer Olympics held in Montreal. He confirmed that he is in process of transitioning to a woman in his interview with Diane Sawyer on the 24th of April. "For all intents and purposes, I am woman."

He began taking female hormones during the 1980s after feeling "uncomfortable in my own skin" for a very long time. However, he stopped, afraid of disappointing people.

He's been back on female hormones since the past year and half.

"I lived a lie my whole life and I can't do that any longer," Jenner said. "Let's take the damn ponytail out," Transgender people not only suffer through discrimination at workplaces, schools and other public podiums but are also, sometimes, rejected by their own families and friends. The allocation of friends through a tough such as this, must surely be the most painful.

I recently watched a movie called The Danish Girl that awoke my sense of humanity in ways more than one. It's a movie I wouldn't want interpret for you, I'd rather have you learn through your own experience. I do know now that I will never try contemplating another's struggle, because you possibly can't. You possibly can't "step into another one's shoes". Honestly, I was left speechless throughout the movie and after too, give your mind and soul a chance to profound thinking and feelings, go watch the movie. Also, the movie is based on the true story of Einar Wegener, or as he truly was, Lili Elbe.

Our country's take on the issue

Courts have struggled with how to protect and support the transgender community. However difficult may it be, our country is among the only few countries to recognize a third gender by introducing a gender neutral title - "Mx". Tamil Nadu was the first state to introduce a transgender welfare policy. The Tamil Nadu state in India was the first state to introduce a transgender welfare policy. According

to this policy, transgender people can avail free Sex Reassignment Surgery (SRS) in the Government Hospital (only for MTF), free housing program, various citizenship documents, admission in government colleges with full scholarship for higher studies, alternative sources of livelihood through formation of self-help groups (for savings) and initiating income-generation programs (IGP). Tamil Nadu was also the first state to form a Transgender Welfare Board with representatives from the transgender community.

The All India Hijra Kalyan Sabha fought for over a decade to achieve voting rights, which they finally did in 1994. Due to alleged legal ambiguity of the procedure, Indian transgender individuals do not have access to safe medical facilities for SRS. On 15 April 2014, Supreme court of India declared transgender people as a socially and economically backward class entitled to reservations in Education and Job. On 4th January 2015, independent candidate Madhu Bai Kinnar was elected as the Mayor of Raigarh, Chattisgarh becoming India's first openly transgender mayor. Of course we still have fights to overcome regarding social acceptance and emotional support offered by people, friends and family (for some cases), but the developing sensitivity towards the transgenders legally does ensure us to keep our hopes, of eradicating the whole "issue" eventually.

Looking ahead.

What are we aiming for?

These beautiful people deserve to come out in a nation where stories of support and compassion vastly outnumber those which end with suicide notes. Let's make sure we achieve that in not more than very few years, if not before.

As for Families, who have a transgender child? I don't have much to say, the picture should suffice.

PULSES, PATENTS AND BIO PIRACY

About 74% of the world's pulses production can be attributed to developing countries. India (with relative share of 25%) is one of the major pulse producing countries in the world, alongside China, Brazil, Canada, Myanmar and Australia. However, India's yield per hectare is less than the global average and so is the per capita availability (per day). (Martolia, Singh & Kumar, 2015, p.661) Thus, there is an urgent need to increase production and yield of pulses in order to bridge the gap between demand and supply in the domestic market and achieve self-sufficiency. Therefore, it is at an opportune moment that 2016 has been declared as the International Year of Pulses by the 68th UN General Assembly. The International Year of Pulses 2016 aims to highlight the importance of pulses in achieving sustainability in food production and food and nutritional security.

Pulses play an important role in the Indian diet as they are a vital source of proteins and amino acids, especially for vegetarians. Inclusion of pulses in everyday diet has been proven to be effective against diabetes, obesity, coronary conditions and other chronic illnesses. In addition to this, pulses increase soil fertility through crop rotation practices and are environment-friendly in nature. Therefore, they are said to act as a "panacea for problems such as unavailability of food and nutritional insecurity" and will contribute to sustainable agricultural growth in India as well as the world. (Shalendra, Gummagolmath, Sharma & Patil, 2013, p.124-129) Thus, the International Year of Pulses will mobilize governments, agricultural bodies, non-governmental organizations and other stakeholders in order to increase the global production and consumption of pulses under the leadership of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO).

The International Year of Pulses 2016 can provide a platform to discuss one of the major issues in the

agricultural domain- the implications of the interplay between indigenous knowledge, intellectual property rights and agricultural research. Let us first answer the question "What is indigenous knowledge?" According to Warren and McKiernan (1995), "Indigenous Knowledge is local knowledge- knowledge that is unique to a given culture or society". This local knowledge acquired by residents through experience helps us understand the dynamic relationship between locals and their natural environment. Indigenous knowledge



is important in maintaining biological diversity and achieving sustainable development. However, there have been several cases where indigenous knowledge (seeds and genetic material) has been patented by multinational companies. American company RiceTec's patent on Basmati rice which was challenged by the Indian government is one such example. Such instances of bio piracy (i.e. "the illegal appropriation of biological or genetic resources through the use of intellectual property systems") are a threat to most developing countries including India. In *Poverty and Globalization* (2000), Vandana Shiva points out the irony of the situation when she writes, "Patents and intellectual property rights are supposed to prevent piracy. Instead they are becoming the instruments of pirating the common traditional knowledge from the poor of the Third

World and making it the exclusive "property" of western scientists and corporations." The use of genetically modified (GM) and high yielding variety (HYV) of seeds can affect indigenous farmers varieties of pulses such as moong, tur, gahat, narrangi, rajma, urad and masur. Bio piracy is not only disadvantageous to the traditional owners of the indigenous knowledge (traditional or local variety of seeds) but also adversely affects biological diversity. (Gutierrez-Montes & Fernández-Baca, 2002) This form of 'Scientific and technological colonialism' of developing countries has led to the monopolisation of traditional knowledge and seeds. This monopolisation has threatened farmers' rights over the use of traditional seeds and methods such as seed saving and seed exchange. The monopoly control of the food system by multinational companies is not just relevant to the farming community but also affects consumers and their food and nutritional security. (Shiva, 2005)

Thus, we can see how the use of intellectual property rights in food systems endangers farmers' rights, indigenous knowledge and also harms food security and sustainability.

The International Year of Pulses 2016 will help in tackling these problems as it aims to address issues related to the international trade of pulses such as the use of indigenous knowledge, intellectual property rights and bio piracy. It will facilitate the use and protection of indigenous pulses in order to preserve indigenous knowledge and attain food sustainability. India being a germplasm owning country with a strong indigenous knowledge background should attempt to make advances in the field of biotechnology. Furthermore, with the help of biotechnology and indigenous knowledge, India can bring about major improvements in pulses where merely the use of traditional breeding methods hasn't proven to be very beneficial.

of a chance collision.


Stars flare and subside,

Les Mots Français

Le procès du singe - Une lutte cérébrale

Il était professeur de biologie depuis 24 ans à une école publique de Dayton, Tennessee. L'année est 1925, et John Thomas Scopes est incarcéré pour l'apprentissage de la théorie d'évolution humaine. Le procès suivant serait une lutte entre la religion traditionnelle et l'évolution.

Le but de ce drame était de capturer le regard d'une société. Pour représenter l'état de Tennessee et pour juger l'inculpe, la prospection appelle le candidat présidentiel de trois essais, William Jennings Bryan – un ancien ministre et un politicien formidable. La défense a un avocat fameux de gauche qui s'appelle Clarence Darrow. La défense cherchait à démontrer que l'évolution ne contredit pas les doctrines de la Bible; elle a été cependant affrontée par une dénégation de leurs témoins scientifiques. Elle avait le bon sens d'attaquer la Bible elle-même, de souligner les contradictions dans les écritures – et dans un coup de théâtre, Darrow a appelé Bryan, un spécialiste autoproclame dans les études bibliques, pour témoigner pour la défense; Bryan a accepté le défi. Dans une série de questions perçantes, Darrow a obligé

Bryan d'admettre une variété des inconstances, des invraisemblances et des erreurs de logique décrites dans les tomes chrétiens. Par exemple, comment était-il possible de mesurer les jours de 24 heures avant que le soleil soit créé le quatrième jour de la Création?

En dépit de tous ces efforts, Scopes a été déclaré coupable par la cour, et condamné à payer une amende minuscule de cent dollars. Le jugement était annulé par la Cour suprême de Tennessee pour un détail technique, et le cas était rapidement perdu dans la mémoire collective de la media. Le «Butler Act» restait en vigueur pour quatre décennies de plus.

Le contraire de l'évolution est en effet l'ignorance. M. Scopes a osé défier une telle loi pour enseigner une vérité à ses étudiants. Mais pour quel but? Afin que les élèves comprennent la progression d'une espèce vers une espèce rationnelle d'intelligence supérieure.

Au 21^e siècle, est-ce que nous nous trouvons dans un âge de rationalité?

Est-ce que nous évoluons en êtres intellectuels et progressifs ou est-ce que nous régressons à devenir des créatures mesquines et intolérantes? L'évidence est ambiguë – d'une part, on a effectué des pas extraordinaires dans les domaines de sciences, de technologie et d'art. D'autre part on se perd devant les écrans, dans les ombres d'un gratte-ciel et au centre d'une foule, une foule qui se précipite – sur le quai, dans le métro, à travers le trottoir, vers un but lointain, vague et toujours incertain.





झेवियर्स महाविद्यालयामध्ये मराठी वाङ्मय मंडळ आहे हे कळताच प्रथम वर्षात मी मंडळाचा सदस्य झालो. मार्केटिंग विभागामध्ये एक मेम्बर म्हणून सुरु झालेला हा प्रवास मंडळाच्या ९२ व्या वर्षाचा मुख्य सचिव इथपर्यंत कधी येऊन पोहोचला कळलंच नाही. ह्या आमच्या मराठी वाङ्मय मंडळाची ओढच अशी न्यारी, एकदा का मंडळात सामील झालात की ह्या मंडळींच्या आपुलकीने तुम्ही कायमस्वरूपी ह्या कुटुंबाचे भाग होऊन जाता. तसंच हे कुटुंब माझ्याही झेवियरार्ईट लाईफमधलं एक अविभाज्य घटक होऊन गेलं.

मंडळाच्या कार्यकारिणीने सुरवात केली ती आरंभोत्सव कार्यक्रमाने आणि त्यापुढे "क्लीक बाप्पा आंतरमहाविद्यालयीन छायाचित्रिकरण स्पर्धा, लघुचित्रपट प्रदर्शन, चालू घडामोडींवरील चर्चासत्रे, सलाम बॉम्बे फौंडेशनच्या सौजन्याने सामाजिक बांधिलकी जोपासण्यास आली. १४४ वर्षे जुनं असलेल्या संत झेवियर्स महाविद्यालयाच्या इतिहासात प्रथमच मराठी वाङ्मय मंडळाचा "तेजोमय" नावाचा दिवाळी अंक प्रकाशित करण्यात आला. मुंबई



विद्यापीठातील हा पहिला दिवाळी अंक जो विद्यार्थ्यांनी पुढाकार घेऊन प्रकाशित केला आणि ह्यासाठी आमच्या कार्यकारिणीचे भरपूर कौतुक देखील करण्यात आले. मंडळाचा वार्षिक महोत्सव "आमोद १४-मराठमोळा आनंद प्रथमच आंतरमहाविद्यालयीन स्पर्धा म्हाणून घोषित केला गेला. २० हून अधिक महाविद्यालयातील विद्यार्थ्यांनी सहभाग घेतला तसेच साहित्याचा वारसा जपणारा वार्षिक अंक पखरण देखील प्रकाशित करण्यात आला. स्वरधारा ही संस्था गेली कित्येक वर्षे ट्रेनमध्ये ज्या अंध व्यक्ति गाणी गातात त्यांना प्रशिक्षण देण्याचे काम करित आहे. त्यांच्या सौजन्याने मंडळाने आयोजित केलेला ऑर्केस्ट्रा आमोद १४ चे खास आकर्षण ठरण्यात आला, ज्याला लोकांचा उदंड प्रतिसाद मिळाला. प्रत्येक महिन्यात विविध कार्यक्रम आयोजित करण्यात आले आणि ह्याचा फायदा असा झाला की अवध्या २०-२५ सभासद असलेल्या मंडळात १७५ हून अधिक सभासद दाखल झाले. वाङ्मय मंडळाच्या प्रत्येक यशात मंडळाच्या कार्यकारिणीचा भरपूर मोलाचा वाटा आहे. प्रत्येकाची मेहनत ही त्यांच्या कामात दिसत होती आणि हीच मंडळाची खरी ओळख असे मला वाटते.

मराठी वाङ्मय मंडळ-एक प्रवास !

बारावी नंतर झेवियर्स कॉलेज मध्ये प्रवेश घेताना मी जरा अनिश्चित होतो ! याच कारण म्हणजे अनेक लोकांकडून या कॉलेज बद्दल ऐकलेल्या अनेक गोष्टी ! पाश्चिमात्य कॉलेज, फाड-फाड इंग्लिश, हाय-क्लास लोक आणि त्यांच्या हाय

क्लास सवयी अशी एक इमेज माझ्या मनात होती, पण BMM साठी मुंबईतील सर्वोत्कृष्ट कॉलेज म्हणून प्रसिध्द असल्यामुळे मी झेवियर्स मध्ये प्रवेश घेतला. आणि एका वेगळ्या विश्वाशी माझी ओळख झाली, आणि काही दिवसात झेवियर्सनी

मला आपलंसं केलं. नवीन कॉलेज, नवीन मित्र, नवीन अभ्यासक्रम यात मी रमू लागलो.

त्यातच काही दिवसात माझी भेट मराठी वाङ्मय मंडळाच्या काही कार्यकर्त्यांशी झाली. होस्टेल स्टेप्स किंवा फोयर बेंचेस किंवा वूड्स हा त्यांचा

अड्डा होता. BMM चा विद्यार्थी असल्यामुळे त्यांनी मला मंडळासाठी व्हिडीओ बनवशील का असे विचारले. मला विडीओ मेकिंग फारसं जमत नसूनसुद्धा, मराठी वाङ्मय मंडळाचा एक भाग होता येईल म्हणुन मी लगेच हो म्हटलं. आणि अशाप्रकारे माझा आनंददायक प्रवास सुरु झाला.

सुरवात केली तेव्हा काहीच माहीत नव्हतं, फक्त उत्साह होता मंडळासाठी काम करण्याचा. काय कार्यक्रम करायचे, त्यांची तयारी कशी करायची, खर्च कसे manage करायचे याबद्दल काहीच अंदाज नव्हता, पण शिकण्याची इच्छा होती. हळुहळू मंडळाच्या मिटींग्साचा भाग होऊ लागलो तेव्हा समजू लागलं की झेवियर्समध्ये मराठी विभाग नसल्यामुळे वाङ्मय मंडळ इतकं सक्रिय नव्हतं, मंडळात फारसे सभासद नव्हते आणि फारसे कार्यक्रमही होत नव्हते. पण मंडळातले काही हौशी कलाकार झेवियर्समध्ये मराठी झेंडा फडकवण्यासाठी प्रयत्न करू पाहत होते. आपलाही ह्या प्रवासात खारीचा वाटा असावा असं तेव्हा मला वाटलं, आणि मी देखील बघता बघता मराठी वाङ्मय मंडळाचा एक सक्रिय सदस्य झालो.

आमोद २०१३ ह्या मराठी वाङ्मय मंडळाच्या वार्षिक सोहळ्याची तयारी सुरु झाली.त्या वर्षी वेळ कमी आणि बजेट थोडकेच असल्यामुळे आम्ही नेमक्याच कार्यक्रमांचे आयोजन करायचे ठरवले. तीन दिवस तीन कार्यक्रम असा आमोद रंगणार होता. ब. न. पुरंदरे वक्तृत्व स्पर्धा, लोकनृत्य स्पर्धा आणि बालगंधर्व या चित्रपटांचे चित्रीकरण हे कार्यक्रम ठरवण्यात आले.आणि अवघ्या १५ दिवसात या कार्यक्रमांची तयारी करण्यात आली. शून्यातून एक अखंड कार्यक्रम उभा करण्याची ही माझी पहिलीच वेळ होती अर्थातच मला फारसा अनुभव नसल्यामुळे मला कुठल्याही मोठ्या जबाबदाऱ्या दिल्या नव्हत्या. पण मला भारी वाटत होतं, नकळत मी खूप काही शिकत होतो आणि वाङ्मय मंडळ माझ्या महाविद्यालयीन आयुष्यातला एक अविभाज्य घटक बनत होतं. काही दिवसात आमोद संपला, पण ही माझ्यासाठी एक नवीन सुरवात होती.अगदी थोड्या दिवसात घेतलेल्या मेहनतीला अपेक्षेपेक्षा जास्त यश मिळालं. मनात आलं तर आपण मंडळाला एका मोठ्या उंचीवर नेऊ शकतो याची खऱ्या अर्थाने खात्री पटली.

मात्र आता जबाबदारी वाढली होती. झेवियर्समध्ये मराठी वाङ्मय मंडळाचं अस्तित्व सर्वांपर्यंत पोहचवायचं होतं. माझं झेवियर्समध्ये दुसरं वर्ष आणि मराठी वाङ्मय मंडळाचा मुख्य सचिव म्हणून अजिंक्य शिंदे याची निवड झाली. मी मंडळाचा उपसचिव झालो आणि आम्ही मिळून १७



सदस्यांची कार्यकारिणी उभारली. ही कार्यकारिणी वर्षभर मंडळाचे कार्यक्रम सांभाळणार होती. मराठी वाङ्मय मंडळाचा खऱ्या अर्थाने आरंभोत्सव झाला.मागील वर्षी पर्यंत वर्षात फक्त एक सोहळा करत असलेलं वाङ्मय मंडळ, मराठी अस्मिता आणि परंपरा जपण्याकरता आता दर महिन्याला काही ना काहीतरी कार्यक्रम राबवण्याचा प्रयत्न करू पाहत होतं. मंडळाच्या व झेवियर्स कॉलेजच्या इतिहासात प्रथमच तेजोमय नामक दिवाळी अंक प्रकाशित करण्यात आला दरम्यानच्या काळात अनेक मराठी व अमराठी विद्यार्थीदेखील मंडळाचे सदस्य होऊन मंडळाच्या कार्यक्रमात सामील होते. गेल्यावर्षी पर्यंत जेमतेम २०-२५ सदस्य असणाऱ्या मंडळाला आता १५० हून अधिक सदस्य मिळाले होते ह्या वर्षी पासून "आमोद-मराठमोळा आनंद हा वार्षिक सोहळा आंतरमहाविद्यालयीन पातळीवर करण्याचे मंडळाने ठरवले.तीन दिवसांत आठ कार्यक्रम करण्याचे योजले होते. मंडळाच्या कार्यकारिणीच्या अथक प्रयत्नांचे सार्थक झाले!

पुढच्यावर्षी मंडळाचा मुख्य सचिव म्हणून माझी निवड झाली झेवियर्स मध्ये मराठी अस्मितेची मशाल तेवत ठेवण्याची आता माझ्यावर जबाबदारी होती. अपेक्षा वाढल्या होत्या. मंडळ अजून जास्तीत जास्त विद्यार्थीपर्यंत पोहचवायचे होते. नव्या वर्षात पुन्हा नव्या जोमाने काम सुरु केलं आणि एका संवागीण कार्यकारिणीची मला साथ मिळाली अधिकाधिक उपक्रम राबवत मराठी संस्कृती, रूढी परंपरा जोपासण्याचा प्रामाणिक प्रयत्न आम्ही सुरुच ठेवला. मराठी वाङ्मय मंडळाला आता कॉलेजमधली बरीचशी मंडळी ओळखू लागली होती ह्या वर्षात सुद्धा मंडळाने छायाचित्रीकरण स्पर्धा, लघुपट प्रदर्शन, दिवाळी अंक पखरण, झिंदाबाद-हा शाहिरांच्या पद्यांवर आधारित कार्यक्रम, असे अनेक कार्यक्रम राबवले. ह्या वर्षी देखील आंतरमहाविद्यालयीन स्पर्धांचा सामावेश असणारा वार्षिक सोहळा "आमोद-सोहळा आनंदाचा हा अगदी दिमाखदार पध्दतीने साकारण्यात आला. आमोदच्या शेवटच्या दिवशी डोक्यात आलेल्या आनंदाश्रूंनी मंडळासाठी आपण काहीतरी सकारात्मक बदल घडवून आणू शकलो याची खात्री पटवली. झेवियर्स च्या मराठी वाङ्मय मंडळाबद्दल फक्त झेवियर्स मध्ये नव्हे

तर इतर महाविद्यालयांमध्ये कौतुक होऊ लागलं ही आमच्या मेहनतीची सर्वात मोठी पावती होती असं मला वाटलं.



ANCIENT INDIAN HISTORY CULTURE AND ARCHAEOLOGY

Departmental Activities for the year 2015.

Looking back at another eventful year (2015) which flew by so fast, was filled with opportunities for undergraduate as well as post-graduate students. Be it climbing the high mountains, digging out ancient remains, going into the darkest crevices, exploring the most exquisitely carved temples in Karnataka and even having a ride in a coracle on the Tungabhadra, our trips have been exciting as well as an academic experience for us.

The academic year began with students from M.A .A.I.C selected to deliver research papers in the month of June, at the Bombay Local History Seminar. This included Mr. Jason Johns: 'The Pakvasa Family', Ms. Ornella Dsouza : 'Undertakers in Mumbai', etc . Dr. Anita took a fieldtrip for students of IIT, Powai with their professor Dr. Kavi Arya to Kanheri Caves, Borivali on 14th June. This was followed by a half-day exploratory session around South Bombay and the CSMVS on 21st June 2015. The M.A. students successfully conducted Surface Exploration on the Local History of Bombay, the research of which has been published in the Bombay Explorers.

The 9th Mani Kamerkar Memorial State Level Seminar was held on 1st August by the department in collaboration with the Heras Institute of Indian

History and Culture and the Museum Society of Bombay. The keynote address was delivered by Dr. Ruchira Banerjee on the theme of the seminar- 'Maritime Heritage'. A total of 77 persons presented research papers and more than 110 persons attended the seminar. The faculty and students of the department also presented papers on Maritime heritage which included Dr. Anita Rane Kothare on 'Hera - the Missing link', Dr Radha Kumar on 'Literary sources in the study of Maritime', Dr. Dileep Balsekar & Ms. Siddhi Deshpande: 'Reconstructing Maritime History through Coins', Mr. Jason Johns: 'Nestorian Monastery at Sir Bani Yas', Mrs. Vasudha Deshmukh : 'Cheul', etc.

The students of S.Y.B.A under the guidance of Dr. Anita Rane-Kothare and Dr. Hrishikesh Samant went on a field trip to Sinnar, Nasik. It included visits to Gargoti Mineral Museum, Infant Jesus Church and Gondeshwar Temple as part of their syllabus covering Museology, Tourism and Heritage Management. Another group of students from S.Y.B.A and T.Y.B.A attended the N.G.M.A workshops on "Jamini Roy" and "Clay Ganesha". The T.Y.B.A students undertook an internship at the J.B. Petit Hall, Nariman Point, wherein they received training and carried out conservation under the guidance of Mr. Anupam Sah. The students of T.Y.B.A. attended

the certificate course on Hinduism in the month of December conducted by the Inter-Religious Department, St. Xavier's College.

'The Brazilian Film week' was held in collaboration with the Consulate General of Brazil in Mumbai and the Department of English in which students submitted reviews which were judged and prizes were given to the winners. Dr. Anita Rane- Kothare conducted a 'Befriending History' workshop for teachers at St. Columba High School on 13th September, assisted by Mr. Jason Johns. On 15th September, the department in collaboration with 'MSB' and 'Times Green Ganesha' conducted an eco-friendly Ganesha workshop for the NGO children which was conducted by Dr. Anita Rane-Kothare assisted by Mr. Jason Johns, Ms. Siddhi Deshpande and team. Dr. Anita Rane- Kothare along with Mr. Jason Johns also conducted a "Befriending Coat of Arms" for the M.A. A.I.C. students, in association with the Museum Society of Bombay in the 'Indian Coat of Arms Exhibition', CSMVS which was curated by the collector, Mr. Anuj Pakvasa. It included a Curator's Walk followed by a quiz whose winners were awarded prizes in the gallery itself by Dr. Pheroza Godrej.

Students of the department attended lectures by Dr. Irving Finkel, Asst. Keeper of Mesopotamian Script, British Museum in September. Dr. Anita assisted Dr. Finkel in studying Mesopotamian seal at the Heras institute, followed by a visit to Elephanta caves. The department conducted two Paramparik Karigar Workshops from 19th -20th October wherein the artisans came and taught the students how to make leather puppets and palm leaf etchings. This served not only as a boost for the dying crafts but also as an exposure for the students to traditional arts and crafts. The department in collaboration with the Museum Society of Bombay went on a field trip to Bijapur, Aihole, Pattadakal, Badami and Hampi in the state of Karnataka which was an exciting as well as an academic delight.

FORENSIC SCIENCE

In the academic year 2015-16, the Diploma in Forensic Science and Criminal Law course had 25 fresh enrollments for the program. Students' background ranged from professionals in fields of Law, Commerce, and the IT industry.

The department facilitated lectures by practicing professionals in the fields of Cyber Crime Investigation (Mr. Sachin Dedhia - Founder of Skynet Secure, Mumbai), Mr. Ashish Chavan (Advocate), Mr. Kishu Daswani (Professor of Law- St. Xavier's College & Government Law College) and Mr. D. Sivanandan (Retired Director General of Police, Maharashtra).

The students, over the course of the program, were exposed to different areas of relevant forensic practice. Equipped with basic knowledge in the field and practical exposure, they researched and prepared extensive Crime Scene Reports in the form of 'Mock Charge-Sheets'. These were presented before professionals in the field in the form of a 'Moot Court'. This experience gave the students an overview of the process of the Indian justice delivery system from 'crime scene to courtroom'.

FRENCH

The Department of French was fraught with various activities to help the students appreciate the French - language and culture. The year began with the 14th of July celebration. It commemorated the storming of the Bastille with a Quiz on France,

The Qualifying Round of 'Idole Indienne' organised by IATF Indian Association for French Teachers was organised in September 2015. It brought out music talent of our students. The qualifiers went ahead to participate in the Zonal Round. Ms. Michele Goveia, SYBA qualified in the Western Zone Round and represented our college at the National Round held in November 2015 in Bangalore. It gave the participants an opportunity to get a hands-on feel of various analyses done in a forensic lab.

Dr. Meenakshi Wadhwa, Director, Center for Meteorite Studies, Professor, School of Earth and Space Exploration, Arizona State University, USA, delivered the annual Dr. R.N Sukheswala Memorial - TERRA Lecture on Friday, 5th February 2016. Her talk titled - 'Rocks from Space: Tales of Creation and Destruction in our Solar System' focused on the various space missions that have helped sample meteorites, the collection of meteorites and the importance of meteorites in understanding our existence on earth and why life evolved.

Winter School in Petroleum Geology:

Reliance Industries Limited (RIL), as a part of their CSR - Industry to Academia Program (ITAP), conducted

a one week winter school in petroleum geology from 23rd to 27th November 2015, for our post graduate students. Professionals from RIL conducted lecture and practical sessions on topics ranging from Well logging, seismic interpretation to shale gas exploration. Portuguese scholar, talked to the TYBA class on some issues connected with Heritage and Conservation of monuments. On January 30, 2016, the TYBA class fulfilled requirements for the Continuous Internal Assessment in Medieval India under the guidance of Dr. Fleur D'Souza and presented seminar papers at the St. Mary's Villa Khandala.

Feb 29, turned out to be an exciting day in our calendar as we navigated the Neighbourhood of Kalbadevi, Midday photographer in tow... What follows is TY student Sachaet Geeta Mantra Raj's report which featured in the MIDDAY

On Monday morning, while most classrooms in our college were filling up, our class was emptying ours. Today, the streets of Kalbadevi were to be our classroom, its sights and sounds our audio visual aids, its rich heritage and historical past the subjects of our study.

Walking through the bustling streets of Kalbadevi, on our way college every day, we slowly realised that this neighbourhood had a wealth of untold stories that were waiting to be told. Egged on by our professor Dr Fleur D'Souza, the class took up a research project that attempted to excavate some of this history.

As we began to chip away, little nuggets of the neighbourhood's history began to fall in our laps. Kalbadevi was part of the "Native Town", as it was called by the British, the unplanned settlement outside the walls of the fortified colonial city. After the fire that ravaged the fort in 1803, the colonial authorities "encouraged" the proliferation of native tenements outside the fort

walls, and the neighbourhood grew, becoming in the 19th century a collage of architectural styles, and social and ethnic groups. Peopled largely by merchants and businessmen – Parsis, as well as the Hindu and Muslim trading castes – Kalbadevi became the site of a unique, composite culture that gave it an identity distinct from the rest of the colonial city.

Having successfully completed our research, composed of oral histories, primary data collection and extensive reading, we took the streets to share with each other the fruits of our labour. But before this, Jibran Setalvad-Anand gave us a comprehensive overview of the history of the Kalbadevi in the context of the neighbourhood to augment our understanding of the walk, and Sakina Mamuwala told us about the history of one of the communities that played such an indispensable part in the development of the neighbourhood and the city as a whole, the Bohras. Leo Kallery and Omprasad Mahapatra, who studied the sports and trophy shops that litter the area, gave us a rather counterintuitive reason for their proliferation: the complete and utter absence of any such shops in the Presidency in the mid 19th century.

Stop 1: We began at Metro cinema, which, as our classmate Sneha Rego told us, was built by Metro Goldwyn Mayer in 1938 and constructed in the Art Deco style, becoming a landmark for not just luxury but for the city's urban geography.

Stop 2: Taking the subway to the Framji Cowasji Institute, Sachaet told the class about the distinct features of the building that confirmed its classical revival style. The institute stands atop what once was the famous Dhobi Talao that gives the area its name, as is commemorated by a plaque on the southern wall.

Stop 3: We took a break for tea at Kyani's, the century old Irani cafe opposite Framji Cowasji. We used the quaint, unchanged premises to discuss the history of some of the neighborhood's other iconic institutions, like Furtados, studied by Sonali Peres and Living Kashugnao, St Xavier's School (Abhilasha Singh) and Kyani's itself (Simran Galipothu and Aroma Khan), whose conversations with the owner

revealed his understanding for the decline of Irani cafes: the rise of beer bars.

Stop 4: Crossing the ride in search of some shade, we settled under a tree, taking up a vantage point that allowed us to marvel at the building that housed Kyani's. Jer Mahal, an exemplar of what is called the "Vernacular" style of architecture, forms with the Framji Cowasji Institute and Metro Cinema a unique triangle: buildings poles apart in style, but almost adjacent physically.

Jer Mahal, as Naomi Fernandes and Vanessa D'Souza found, is home to a unique socio-cultural arrangement: the Goan residential club or Kudd. These clubs provide cheap accommodation to Goan men, but what really makes them unique is their organisational structure, each kudd caters specifically to a particular village in Goa, for example, villages of Assanora and Karnala have clubs in the Mahal, each with its own patron saint, with St Lawrence for Karnala. Only male inhabitants of that village can take up residence in the corresponding kudd.

Stop 5: Priya Beck and Stacey D'Mello took us to a few shops on Dawa Bazaar, one of the first markets of medicine, both homeopathic and allopathic, and traditional, unani and ayurveda, as well as medical equipment. This antiquarian market runs the length of Princess Street, with shops right from Marine Lines to Crawford Market. On the way, Nicola Perreira had us stop at David and Company, the invitation card makers and stockists of religious goods that has draws custom from across the city.

Stop 6: The 99 year old Indian Art Studio stands at the intersection of Princess Street (now Shamaldas Gandhi Marg) and Kalbadevi Road, and is a veritable time machine, with old black and white photos, antique furniture, and a basement photo studio that brings into the same room the newest studio equipment with some of the oldest forms of lighting that are in working and workable condition.

While walking around, Prachi Bhagwat and Shaun D'Souza talked to us about the history of the streets that we tread on, some named after martyrs of the freedom movement like Babu Genu,

others after British Princesses (Princess Street), renamed later after leaders of the struggle in Junagadh (Shamaldas Gandhi).

The building in which Indian Art House stands also has an interesting story to tell, closely linked to the street on which it stands the neighbourhood it inhabits. The plague of 1803 was connected, according to the colonial administration, to the unhygienic, congested living conditions in parts of city, in which Kalbadevi fell. The City Improvement Trust, to decongest the area, demolished the first row of buildings to widen what was to be called Princess Street, constructing a building in the Gothic style to serve as a visual marker, so that future construction would not go further onto the road than the building did. This is perhaps why it stands out so much in the neighbourhood, otherwise dominated by buildings in the vernacular style. However, it would seem as though the directives of the Trust were slowly disregarded over the years, since present day buildings do in fact exceed the limits delineated by the old Gothic construction.

Stop 7: We walked down Kalbadevi road now, stopping periodically at Bhangwadi and Bhatia Mahajanwady (sic) to admire their architectural features, and then at Swadeshi Market, which Deepti Anand and Ann Peter had studied, among the other cotton textile markets in Kalbadevi, namely Mangaldas and Mulji Jetha markets. On the way, we passed the almost indistinct temple that gives Kalbadevi its name and the larger, more architecturally striking, but lesser known Dwarkadhish temple. As Ann was giving us a little lecture on Swadeshi market, she was rudely interrupted by a honking double decker bus, almost tripping over the bales of Surat cloth, cutting short both her presentation and our walkabout.

The state of repair and conservation of the built heritage of the neighbourhood surprised us sometimes, in the case of buildings like the Dwarkadhish temple and the Framji Cowasji Institute, but was quite a rude awakening in some cases, especially Jer Mahal. Some of the most intricately carved wooden balconies and railings on the front face of the building have been taken down,

making most of us fearful for the future survival of the iconic structure.

Kalbadevi, a residential, commercial and cultural hub, is in many ways, the city in microcosm.

The last neighbourhood to be studied was the heritage precinct of Khotachiwadi with Andre Baptista.

MATHEMATICS



The year 2015-16 was a very successful academic year full of achievements for the Mathematics department. Also, the department got a big blow when, in the month of October, prof. Aditya Garg had to undergo an emergency brain surgery to remove a blood clot. He has recovered remarkably since then.

Número Uno, a well known Mathematics festival of H. R College was conducted on the 21st and 22nd of August this year. Our college team consisting two TYBSc. students, Taher Habib and Shivam Agarwal, got the first position in the Classic Quiz

competition and got a Trophy for the same. The team from SYBSc. consisting of Devanshi Mittal and Sulaiman Qizilbash stood second in the event Monopolium Mathematica. Adway Gupta from SYBSc. were selected for a 4 week summer school MTTTS to be conducted in May - June 2016.

Prof. Aditya Garg conducted a “Problem of the Week” activity, in which he proposed new problems on the Mathematics notice board and gave prize for the best solution. This activity received enthusiastic response from the students. He also conducted classes for

improving Mathematical aptitude of the students and to help them perform well at various entrance examinations.

Prof. Bingi Participated in a 6-day workshop, titled “Basic Course in Algebra & Analysis” conducted and held by the Department of Mathematics, University of Mumbai, during the 14th and 19th of December-2015. Ms. Uma Tirunellai received a Bronze medal. Participation in EGMO, we hope, would provide some motivation and encouragement to girls for participating in Olympiad competitions. In last 25 years only four girls represented India in IMO.

PHYSICS



The year 2015-16 started with a great surprise and hence more enthusiasm for all the teachers of the department. This is because compared to previous year the enrollment in SY and TY classes had gone to much higher level. As our regular custom, we started the year with an exhibition displaying demonstration based on Physics concepts. Mr. Rajesh Singh managed the exhibition with the help of SY and TY students. This year for the first time we used the corridor along with the physics labs to display the exhibition.

We introduced new methods of learning for students where in, for all the theory courses from FY to TY as soon as teacher started with a specific unit in a class, students were given a set of problems/questions as take home assignments based on that unit. A deadline was given for the submission

of each assignment. All those who submitted assignments on time were given two marks per assignment in CIA-2. CIA-1 and CIA-2 exams were partially based on the assignments. It was observed in ESE that student's ability for solving problems and tackling application based questions was greatly improved. This also improved the passing percentage of students in CIA as well as ESE. At TY level, all the students were given a list of concepts to verify/learn through designing and performing home experiments with kit provided by us. This work was examined as a part of practical CIA.

Dr. Bodhane was a member of the experimental board for 46th International Physics Olympiad held in Mumbai during July 05-12, 2015. Dr. Vidasankari worked as a visiting faculty for PG courses in B. N. Bandodkar

college, Thane. Mr. Ajay Yadav and Dr. Radhekrishna Dubey attended Physics Exposure Camp, during 30th November to 3rd December 2015 at Homi Bhabha Center for Science Education (TIFR), Mumbai. The department magazine 'Celeritas' was published under the guidance of Mr. Rajesh Singh.

A One day Seminar cum workshop 'Drishyam' based on 'Digital Image Processing' was arranged by the department which was coordinated by Mr. Rajesh Singh.

Forty students of Physics were sent to attend a two day residential workshop on astronomy organized by TIFR. SY students participated in a one day workshop on Thermodynamics at HBCSE. Twenty FY students were taken to BARC as a part of international science day celebrations. TY students were taken to Khandala for two day workshop. The year ended with a live video conference with Dr. Paul Steinhardt, the Albert Einstein professor of Theoretical Physics at Princeton University, organized by 'physics circle' where students asked questions related to their understanding of 'Eternal Inflation and its merits'.

POLITICAL SCIENCE

1) Khandala Seminar – Presentations

The Third Year CIA 2 on Issues in Indian Politics, was conducted between 20th -22nd August 2015 at the Xavier's Villa in Khandala. The class of 53 students was accompanied by Dr. Pratiba Naitthani and Prof. Shazia Sheikh.

The Class presented on various issues right from Rights of Marginalized sections of the Indian society; women, children, tribal's, Dalits to Right to Education. The time at Khandala not only made the presentations more efficient and detailed due to the abundance of time on hand but also facilitated class bonding amongst students.

2) United Nations: An Insider's Perspective- Mr Kishore Mandhyan

Mr Kishore Mandhyan former Deputy Director in the cabinet and Political Advisor to the United Nations' Secretary General, delivered a talk on 4th September 2015 on "United Nations: An Insider's Perspective", with a participation of over a 120 students.

Mr. Mandhyan engaged the students in the depths of the structure and actual functioning of the United Nations. He also gave personal anecdotes of his journey to the United Nations and was inspiring for many students hoping to pursue their career in International Relations.

3) India and the United Nations Security Council

The Xavier's Political Science Association in partnership with

Gateway House conducted a discussion on 'India and the United Nations Security Council' by the Executive Director of Gateway House Ms. Neelam Deo, former diplomat and Ambassador.

The discussion explored the future potential of India's desire for a permanent seat in the United Nations Security Council. At the same time talked about the need for structural changes that were needed in the Security Council and the rise of parallel regional organizations as a result.

4) Field Visit to Drought affected Latur, Marathwada

Following the discussion with MLC Vidya tai Chavan at the Vidhan Sabha, 14 students from TYBA along with Dr. Pratiba Naitthani visited the villages of Latur, Marathwada on 12-13th September 2015. The students were exposed to the ground realities of absolute poverty and unemployment of the farmers. By visiting various villages the students got firsthand information on the problems of acute water scarcity and the drought in Marathwada. Besides water scarcity, lack of employment and failure of government schemes and initiatives also were clear to the students.

To take further action the students have decided to help raise funds for the building of Percolation Tanks which could be a scientific and efficient solution to water depletion, attempt to initiate setup of small scale businesses and industries, to generate employment and independence in the landless laborers and to take some action by

filing reports and petition regarding the ill effects of growing sugarcane, sugarcane factories lobbies and the recognition of drought prone status, to the concerned ministries.

5) Participant college to organize lecture series



She spoke on 'The Protection of the Constitution and the Qualities of a Young Professional'. The inspirational talk was attended by students from various departments in the college Hall.

7) Inter-College Youth Parliament 2016

The Inter-College Youth Parliament was our flagship event, bigger than ever, as it saw the participation of over 10 colleges across Mumbai. It was held on 9th and 10th February 2016. It emulated the functioning of the Indian Parliament and gave the participants a unique chance to be able to empower themselves and present their views on pressing matters. The Agenda 'National Security: Terrorism and Cyber Security' allowed participants to even present creative legislative solutions on matters of national importance like Terrorism. It saw the engaging participation of students across various faculties and was graced by Mr. Kishor Mandhyan (Former Political Advisor to the

The talk received overwhelming response from the students. Mr. Ambedkar explored the political and sociological views of Dr. B R Ambedkar, followed by which he engaged the crowd in a discussion on the same.

This was one of the highlights of our activities in the academic year 2015-2016. We were happy to end our activities for the year, with such a wide and overwhelming participation from the Xaviers student body and an

enthusiastic participation from various other Mumbai colleges.

The department also had a very successful publication of the magazine "Samvad". The theme of **Samvad** for this year was "State of the State". PSYCHOLOGY

The Psychology department has had an eventful year of academic achievements and co-curricular activities (2015-16), and we have chosen to associate them to some aspects of Erik Erikson's (1992-1994) psychosocial theory for this report. *Erikson had proposed that all humans confront distinct challenges at each of the eight stages of the lifespan. The crisis at each stage is represented by positive and negative components that need to be addressed. Ego development proceeds, as conflicts are resolved and virtues are incorporated into one's sense of self.* Our report unfolds along with the virtues of each stage and acknowledges the efforts of all those who have worked with and for our department (students, staff and alumni) to maintain the legacy of academic excellence, intrapersonal

insight and interpersonal growth.

Stage 1 (infancy): Basic Trust v/s Mistrust
Virtue: HOPE serves to maintain the person's belief in the meaning and trustworthiness of a common cultural world.

We began the year with a **Team Building** session for our TYBA students conducted by Fr. Tony D'Souza, which set the stage for a work culture characterized by *trust*, responsibility and accountability to the group. The TY students also attended a **Research Capacity Building** training session conducted by resource persons from Monk Prayogshala, which we hope gave them the skills and confidence to write good reports for their practical work journals.

Stage 2 (early childhood) Autonomy v/s Shame & Doubt

Virtue: WILL is the unbroken determination to exercise free choice as well as self restraint, in spite of the unavoidable experience of shame and doubt.

A range of workshops (conducted mostly by our alumni) were offered over several weekends throughout the year. Those who freely chose to participate in them, were exposed to topics and skills beyond the syllabus. Some students from other departments and disciplines were also determined to use these learning experiences as transfer credits for their honours program. **Workshops** held were:

- Qualitative Market Research by Trusha Dalal
- Gestalt Approach to self awareness by Tarana Pithawalla
- Art based Therapy by Aakriti Aggarwal
- Holistic Child Development by Deepika Aggarwal
- Quantitative Research (highlighting the use of Surveys) by Rupa Kalahasthi
- Interpersonal Communication by Anuja Deodhar, Shruti Murali, Rupa Kalahasthi
- Dance movement Psychotherapy by Devika Mehta
- Rational Emotive Therapy by Shama Shah
- Forensic Psychology by Jhanavi Doshi
- Sports Psychology by Vardayini Chitale

Stage 3 (play age) Initiative v/s Guilt

Virtue: PURPOSE is the courage to establish and pursue tangible goals.

One of the most challenging tasks for a psychology student is the writing and presentation of a seminar paper at the **annual departmental seminar** held in Khandala. It takes courage, passion and persistence to pursue this goal. This year we had 76 students in attendance, of which 30 students presented papers on various aspects of the **theme 'Learning and Memory'**. This experience was enriching not just for presenters (who had to hold the audience's attention without using PPTs) but also for the audience who learned about the topics, presentation skills as well as how to give constructive feedback. It was also one of the activities that brought together students of psychology from FY, SY and TY, giving an opportunity for bonding, mentoring, interaction and inspiration.

Stage 4 (school age) Industry v/s Inferiority

Virtue: COMPETENCE is the confidence that one can exert positive influence on the social world in quest of meaningful individual and social goals.

Another avenue for the development of knowledge, confidence and competence

is through **lectures by guest speakers**. As students listen to and interact with guest speakers they get different perspectives, ideas and even the opportunity to disagree with or debate what is being discussed, which helps in their *quest* for growth. Talks held through the course of this year were:

- Diversity & Inclusion (in the context of Gender & Leadership) by Dr. Aarti Shyamsumder, (Director Research, CATALYST)
- 'Educate to Eradicate' a talk on value based, culture specific, age appropriate sex education by Dr. Rajan Bhonsale (founder of Heart to Heart counselling centre)
- Interdisciplinary session organized by the CIP on "Psychology and Criminal Investigations" . Guest Speaker was Prof. Karl Roberts, Forensic Psychologist, Professor and Chair of Policing and Criminal Justice University of Western Sydney, Australia. (It was attended by PG students of Life Science, students of Forensic Psychology and TYBA psychology students.)

Stage 5 (adolescence) Ego identity v/s Role confusion

Virtue: FIDELITY is the adolescent's ability to sustain loyalties in spite of inevitable contradictions of value systems and the young person's capacity to perceive & abide by social mores, ethics and ideologies of society.

A core team of SYBA students was selected to take charge of the **annual department magazine 'Uncommon Sense'**. Their role in the magazine team thus became part of their identity. There were inevitable contradictions as they debated on various ideas for a theme, sources of sponsorship, design, layout etc. They chose to work with the theme **'Psychology of Food'** and ultimately published the magazine with a range of articles that were insightful, well researched and made for an enjoyable read.

Stage 6 (young adulthood) Intimacy v/s Isolation

Virtue LOVE: love is the ability to commit oneself to others and abide by

such commitments, even though they may require self-denial and compromise. It shows an attitude of care, respect & responsibility towards another.

Erikson believed that "Life does not make sense without interdependence. We need each other and the sooner we learn that, the better for us all."

In support of an **interdisciplinary** educational environment, our department offered a **Cross Faculty Course** for SYBSc students this year on the *'Psychology of Relationships'*. This helped students gain insight into areas of interpersonal communication, friendship, love and intimate relationships.

We also **collaborated with** the departments of Life Science, Zoology and Chemistry to organize a **one day symposium** on 'Behaviour and the Brain: a cognitive perspective'. The guest speaker from the psychology field, Dr. Urvasi Shah spoke about the impact of traumatic brain injury.

Stage 7 (middle adulthood) Generativity v/s Stagnation

Virtue: CARE stems from the feeling that something or someone matters (it is the opposite of apathy). It is a widening commitment to take care of the persons, products and ideas that one has learned to care for.

In order for our students to engage with the society and *care* for people, we attempted to devise **projects** that were experiential as well as academic. Some of these experiences were:

- The counselling psychology class conducted **mini-workshops** for students of Std VI at the N. M. Joshi municipal school on a specific theme of mental well being. This was also an **extension activity** supported by the SIP department of our college in collaboration with the NGO LIFE trust. The learning objectives were linked to soft skills of conducting workshops, geared towards an understanding of the population (characteristic of children as clients). It involved the identification / creation of appropriate resources and structured exercises to help

children gain insight on a specific theme for better emotional, social, personal adjustment. The four themes selected by the groups of students for their workshops were: Healthy expression of Anger, Prevention of Bullying (with emphasis on the role of the bystander), Working together as a Team, Positive Affectivity.

- For the Abnormal Psychology class, a field report was linked to a **visit to Dilkhush special school** the objective being awareness and sensitization of TY students to working with the mentally challenged.
- The Industrial-Organizational Psychology class conducted a qualitative study exploring the perceived causes and effects of **work stress** experienced in autonomous and non autonomous colleges by interviewing students, teaching staff, nonteaching staff and ex-students from St. Xavier's

and other colleges.

- Students of Social Psychology formed groups of four and undertook an **observational study** on interpersonal attraction.

Stage 8 (late adulthood) Ego integrity v/s Despair

Virtue: WISDOM is an informed & detached concern with life itself, in the face of death itself.

As we came to the end of the academic year, we arranged a special series of talks for our TY students who were reflecting on the end of their journey at Xavier's and the potential direction for their future. The resource persons who were invited, shared their insight and *wisdom* on post graduate options for students after TY psychology. The following speakers were invited for this **series of lectures titled 'The Next Step'**:

A Knowledge Café was organised by GIZ's CMPA project in collaboration with Caius Research laboratory, St Xavier's College, Mumbai, on 11th March, 2016, which provided a multi-disciplinary and cross sectoral platform to discuss future research and networking possibilities in coastal and marine biodiversity conservation and ecosystem management. The experts who shared their ideas and inputs with the participants were Mr. N. Vasudevan (Chief Conservator of Forests & Head of the Mangrove Cell, Forest Department, Government of Maharashtra), Dr. Pradeep Mehta from the Earthwatch Institute India, Dr Aeshita Mukherjee (Technical Expert, GIZ's CMPA project) and Dr Neeraj Khera (Senior Technical Expert, GIZ's CMPA project).

Twenty three faculty members from various disciplines namely science, media, arts from in house and various colleges of Mumbai, participated in the knowledge cafe. It resulted in several research ideas developed by multi-disciplinary teams of experts, which addressed the pressing issues and challenges in managing coastal and marine ecosystems, and biodiversity management. The CMPA project will facilitate further development of the research ideas by the faculty members and its application on the field. The participants found the knowledge café very innovative and enriching, and something to be carried out more often at their institutes. The ideas put forward by faculty members were truly diverse and multidisciplinary. A reference to this event has been made in the GIZ website as well as German ministry's twitter page.

The Institutional Biosafety Committee:

As per Govt. of India regulations, organizations handling genetically modified organisms (GMOs) and recombinant DNA materials for research or production should constitute an IBSC with the DBT approval. In the regulatory framework, IBSC is one of the statutory bodies which operates directly from the premises of the institution and is responsible for proper implementation of biosafety rules, regulations and guidelines. The college IBSC, constituted in 2003, approved by DBT, Govt. of India, convenes regular meetings to monitor the GMO and recombinant DNA activities of the various on-going research projects. Dr. Shobhona Sharma, Head, Department of Biological Sciences, TIFR, is the DBT nominee for the committee and Dr. Ameeta Joshi, Associate Professor and Head, Department of Microbiology, JJ Hospital is the Biosafety Officer. Two meetings of the committee were held on 15th October 2015 and 28th March, 2016 respectively. The research projects discussed in the previous year were reviewed by the committee. A total of 3 new research projects by the various investigators of Biology departments were reviewed and two proposals were passed in the two meetings.

An in-house program was held by Department of Microbiology and IBSC on "Faculty sharing on biosafety regulations in laboratory and research". Presentations were made by investigators who had submitted their proposals to the IBSC. The session was attended by faculty from various biology departments and chemistry department.

Central Instrumentation Facility

The fully air-conditioned state of the art Central Instrumentation Facility of the laboratory currently houses equipment that the college had obtained through the DST – FIST grant of the Govt. Of India, and two instruments obtained from the UGC grant. The Equipment includes the Gel Documentation system, two UV-Visible spectrophotometers, Thermal cycler, CO₂ incubator, Ultrasonicator, Lyophilizer, BOD incubator, Electroporator, Gas chromatography,

HPTLC applicator, two-dimensional gel electrophoresis system, Laminar air flow, Biosafety cabinet Class AII, Orion pH meter, Eppendorf cold centrifuge and microcentrifuge, Olympus bright field, pulse field and polarising microscope and -80° Deep freezer. An ELISA reader and a fluorescent

attachment obtained through the Lady Tata workshop grant is also housed in the CIF. A fully functional Animal Tissue Culture facility is available, where research using animal cell lines is being carried out.

The above instruments and facilities have been used by the faculty, doctoral,

post graduate and undergraduate students of Chemistry and all the Biological Sciences departments of St. Xavier's College for regular practicals, research and Honours Program work.

NADKARNI - SACASA RESEARCH LABORATORY (NSRL)

The history of NSRL dates back to 1932 when Dr. V. V. Nadkarni, an organic chemistry teacher started guiding research students. Fr. F. J. Sacasa, S.J. was an important part of this endeavor as philosopher and guide to Dr. Nadkarni. Hence, in later years the research laboratory was named after these two pioneering spirits. During this period of about forty years over 100 M.Sc. and Ph.D. degrees were awarded. The main work was on natural products, heterocyclic and synthetic organic chemistry. A second renaissance of the laboratory was ushered in by Dr. Hoshang Master, who redesigned the laboratory in 1972. In this period, on an average, 10-12 papers were published in international and national journals every year. The current guides are Dr. Hoshang Master, Dr. Zoeb Filmwala, Dr. Freddy Havaldar and Dr. Dionysia Coutinho and the Director is Dr. Roy Pereira, S.J. Today, the NSRL has also opened up to undergraduate students seeking to do research projects.

Doctorates awarded

Three NSRL students were awarded their Ph.D. degrees from the University of Mumbai. Dr. Hoshang Master guided the Ph.D thesis of Prof. Gulshan Shaikh on the topic, "A study of Nitrogen Heterocycles derived from 5-ACETAMIDO-2-HYDROXYACETOPHENONE". Dr. Shaikh received her degree this year

along with the Convocation students in June, 2015.

Dr. Freddy Havaldar guided the Ph.D thesis of Prin. Ashok Kumar Upadhyaya. Dr. Zoeb Filmwala guided the thesis of Mr. K. Venkatesh titled "Synthesis of five and six membered heterocyclic compounds and study their microbiological activity and reaction rates using microwave techniques."

Research Projects- International

Thanks to the initiative of Dr. Freddy Havaldar, we received a grant of USD 12,000/- through our alumnus Dr. Bomi Framroze, Chief Scientific Officer of Hofseth Biocare for the project "Teaching scientific skills and imparting research skills to students using Peptide Fractionation of SPH."

Research Projects- National

Prof. Ashima Aggarwal along with Prof. Gulshan Shaikh worked with a couple of students on the project, "Photocatalytic action of doped transition metal oxide nano particles on the degradation of dyes particularly textile effluents and their effect on biological system."

Profs. Abhilasha Jain, Marazban Kotwal and Pralhad Rege did a project with 6 students on "Catalytic effect of Nanoparticles on certain organic reaction using Microwave radiations".

The director, Dr. Roy, along with Dr.

Gulshan Shaikh presented a session on "Comprehending the Teaching-Learning Environment" at a one day seminar at Kalsekar College, Mumbra on 23rd June, 2014. He was a part of the team that welcomed the Deputy Prime Minister of the U.K., Nick Clegg and Mr. Ed Davey, Minister for Energy and Climate change on 26th September, 2014. He chaired the session of Mr. Ed Davey on the topic "Tackling Climate Change and Driving Growth" at St. Xavier's College, SCAVI. Dr. Roy was also the Co- Convener of the seminar organised by the Department of Chemistry in collaboration with the Royal Society of Chemistry (RSC) on "Sustainable Energy: Crisis and Management" at St Xavier's College Hall, Mumbai on 5th December, 2014. He attended the Indian Science Congress held at Mumbai University from the 3rd to 7th January, 2015. Dr. Roy also looks after the Neuroscience Programme in the college begun by him three years ago. The Neuroscience lab besides being used for the "Introduction to Neuroscience" course offered across the science disciplines is now also used for M.Sc. practicals.

The NSRL will always be happy to welcome enthusiastic teachers and students for research projects as well as M.Sc. (Research) and Ph.D. students.



The experience of being a part of the IMG, was by far one of the most fulfilling experiences of college. If I begin, I can ceaselessly rant about my emotions attached to this place. There are various things I felt and thought in this period, some of the most important of which I have penned down.

What we did this year:

1. The IMG this year has managed to work under very tight budgetary constraints, at times transforming these constraints into small budgeted new endeavours. Hence, as most of my committee members would agree, the most challenging yet fruitful deed of ours, was the launch of 2 new concerts- Aaroh and Viraasat.
2. Considering the constraints, the committee still managed to have 5 concerts (besides Janfest) viz. Aaroh, Malhar Ke Prakaar, Music Appreciation Course, Viraasat and Birthday Concert. All of these events were smoothly organised, without any hitches or flaws.
3. Our invites (something that members always complained of) were posted on time to an manually updated dataset. It reached pretty much on time too. To cut costs, like previous years, we used the post service instead of couriers. This may have led to delays, errors of sorts, but otherwise, it was very flawless.
4. The committee did its best to rectify problems that had emerged earlier. For eg: records regarding the audio CDs, data regarding membership, renewal of the library such as new carpet, new mirror, new cash box etc.
5. The committee did a commendable job in terms of getting an appreciative audience for each of its event. In fact, the introduction through Aaroh (an event that staged classical musicians of Xavier's itself) even resulted in a larger student audience for the concerts thereafter.

6. The committee made sure that all its finances were tabulated and tallied concert wise. The bills and purposes for everything was carefully monitored.
7. I think our timeline for Janfest this year was perfect. The volunteer force should be announced just before first semester exams. The work for Janfest should begin post Diwali vacations only (except marketing). There should preferably be no work given to volunteers for most of the Christmas vacation too.
8. The ticket sales method was very full proof this year. The error percentage was considerably less. The basic feature of ours was that we used stickers to keep a tally of the seats sold, to avoid double counting. If ticket sales is to be done manually, I recommend our method to all the committees.
9. Though the committee was very novice, it worked with utmost passion and love for the institution. The only strength of ours, I believe was that each of us really felt about what we were doing, enabling us to give in our best towards it.
10. We generated a full house in the quad, and created record breaking revenue from ticket sales.
11. The most fulfilling addition that our committee made to Janfest was the Exhibition. The exhibition consisted of paintings made by Xavierites, after listening to a particular Raag, and drawing their perceptions from it. It was received beautifully by the audience and the press. Also, it musically educated the young painters and got them exposed to classical music.
12. I think the committee's biggest achievement was when 65 of its volunteer force, came to witness a Sarod concert by Ayaan and Amaan Ali Khan at NCPA a month after Janfest. This just goes to show that they truly enjoyed their association with the IMG and also took with them some Classical music.

Things to improve on:

1. The Cassette book and other administrative aspects that are still done manually should be should be digitalized and consolidated.
2. The committee should be formed earlier to give it more time to settle down (atleast by the 1st week of July).
3. During the selection of the committee, there should be equal weightage given to passion for the institution, and specific skills/ experience in a particular area. A bias towards either of thee in the selection process will lead to problems in work culture and ethics.
4. Specific care should be taken for furniture and property of the library. The committee as to take responsibility whatsoever to any damage, if any.
5. Unlike other organisations like the SSL, I think the IMG looks to be a little intimidating to college students. This can be attributed even to the behaviour of the committee. The committee thinks that IMG is their home, which is a good thing, but in the process ends up getting too possessive about it. This attitude may lead to outcast the students of college. This 'homely' feeling should be transferred to IMG's non-volunteer and volunteer forces alike, and the committee should take special steps towards this.

Shyama's Takeaway:

When I was told that I was selected for this post, I was just plain nervous. I had no idea about how things had to be worked upon. It was just the love for the art, and the institution that helped me strive and sustain all through. This 43 year old institution, has a streamlined way of working. This year though, we had to abort 3 concerts from our repertoire due to lack of funds. My committee and I made sure that we have as good alternatives to them, but

with a lower cost. The introduction of Aaroh and Viraasat, was our impetus to IMG's cause of promoting classical music.

I cannot not mention the things I learnt while being in touch with Asha ma'am. I think she is a wonderful person, and there is a lot one can gather from her. She really groomed us, all around the year and got us ready for Janfest.

When it comes to Janfest, I sometimes feel that we did not do anything it make it happen. Janfest just happened because it was meant to be. The months of planning and stress is forgotten when the stage goes up and the quad rejuvenates with music. Be it mailing the artists, ideating for the exhibition (personally I think the most novel thing we did this year), corresponding

with contractors, counting ticket sales money, getting features in newspapers, dealing with sponsors etc, it taught me so many things that college lectures would never impart.



XRCVC

The Xavier's Resource Centre for the Visually Challenged (XRCVC) (www.xrcvc.org) is, arguably, one of India's best resource and advocacy centres for visually challenged persons.



A truly inclusive society is one which ensures that every member gets an opportunity to become all that they can be. Once we start seeing the real person within, ignoring perceived abilities and disabilities, ignoring all the biases and prejudices, we become better human beings and end up making the world better.

With the unstinted support of the staff and students of St Xavier's College and a small but committed team of 12 professionals, we work to empower visually impaired persons all over the country.

The year began on an auspicious note as XRCVC branched out into the suburbs of Mumbai. The XRCVC-Viviana Extension, located in Thane, was inaugurated on June 27 by Dr Fr Frazer Mascarenhas SJ, former principal of St Xavier's College. The widely-publicised event was attended by around 70 guests. The extension centre's activities got off to a rousing start with a workshop on social media for visually impaired persons, which specially focused on Twitter.

The year ended on a very promising note as well, with news filtering in that our member Pranjal Patil had cleared the prestigious UPSC exam at the first attempt and is set to join the Indian Civil Service.

During the year, we had the pleasure of welcoming on board Aurealia D'Mello, who joined as Consultant (Special Education) in July 2016.

Our membership base stood at 508 during the year. We were also able to touch—and hopefully transform—thousands of lives across the country through our advocacy work, particularly in the areas of education access, financial access, print access, and independent living (see section sub-titled 'Advocacy').

Having revamped our website (www.xrcvc.org) during the previous year and also established a robust presence on the social media with a Facebook page (XRCVC—Xavier's Resource Centre for the Visually Challenged) and Twitter handle (@XRCVC) we were able to disseminate information about our activities to members and other stakeholders on an almost real-time basis. Shriram Parthasarathy, a social media professional, continues to helm this initiative in a voluntary capacity.

Like in the previous academic year, our activities through the year were channelised through our restructured triad of work:

- Direct Support Services
- Advocacy
- Awareness

Given below is a summary of our activities in 2015-16 under each head.

Direct Support Services

The XRCVC offers a range of direct support and training services to persons with vision impairment, caregivers, educators and institutions.

1. **Volunteer Support:** Despite all the technology and advancements, human assistance cannot be eliminated completely. The XRCVC provides volunteer services for:

- Reading
- Making material into accessible formats – through typing, scanning, editing, recording
- Examination taking – scribe facilities
- Teaching – for any subject

Depending on a person's needs and requirements, XRCVC provides volunteers on an annual basis for regular support or on a one-off basis for short-term periods.

Around 80 volunteers worked with us through the year, a majority of whom were sourced from the Social Involvement Programme (SIP) of St Xavier's College (Autonomous).

Technologies

The XRCVC houses the latest and the most exhaustive list of assistive technologies (AT) to be explored by visually challenged persons as also employers, government bodies and any other group that would like to know more about AT. Anyone is welcome at XRCVC, preferably with prior appointment, to explore our full range of assistive technologies and their use.

Like every year, we procured a wide range of new technologies in 2015-16. Some of these include a handheld book reader and OCR device Blaze multiplayer, equipment for accessible science experiments such as drop counter, automatic stir station, motion detector, a special tactile graphics creation thermoforming machine imported from American Printing House for the Blind, low vision aids such as the Clearview and camera mouse. We also replaced a large number of older laptops and desktops with newer machines.

Training

The XRCVC imparts training in computers, the use of specific assistive devices, Braille, Orientation & Mobility, Maths & Science, English language and Life skills through various training programmes. These are available for diverse learner groups – visually challenged, special educators, teacher trainers and caregivers. The XRCVC offers volunteer support services for reading, making material accessible (through typing, scanning, editing, and recording) and assisting as a writer/ scribe during college/ competitive examinations. With the right skills and know-how, independent living and working is an increasing reality for persons with vision impairment.

Our comprehensive and revamped training schedule in 2015-16 ensured that our Special Educators and trainers had their hands full throughout the year. The training sessions during the year included customised workshops by various members of the XRCVC team including

Calveena D'Sylva, Rebecca Carvalho, Mimansa Vahia, Aurealia D'Mello, Vikas Dabholkar, Sushil Pandit, and Keshavan Nadar. These training sessions were held at schools as well as at XRCVC and XRCVC-Viviana Extension.

Personal and Career Guidance

Guidance services were provided to members and their families to identify needs, interests and aptitudes as also troubleshoot and cope with concerns.

Scholarships

Recognising the high costs for higher education and assistive technologies, the XRCVC provides scholarship and access technology lending schemes to deserving students. New higher education avenues have been pursued by the visually

challenged over the last decade. Along with new opportunities come new costs of higher education courses. Similarly, whilst assistive technologies and computers have provided immense aid to the visually challenged, what is often considered a luxury for sighted students is a necessity for a student with visual impairment.

The Lions Club of East Bombay Scholarship for the year was awarded to our member Shiksha Gupta, for being the most deserving visually impaired student graduating from St Xavier's College, Mumbai.

Distribution of devices

Laptops were distributed to visually challenged students under the XRCVC - Rotary Club of Bombay Hanging Garden Laptop Loan Scheme during the year. Like last year, the laptops were sponsored by Rotary Club as part of their programme titled Project Xcessworld - District Grant No 1516291, A Project to Empower the Visually Challenged.

A number of Plectalk Vachaks (a Digital Talking Book Player and Recorder) were also distributed to various visually impaired persons during the year under the Govt of India's Assistance to Disabled Persons for Purchase/Fitting of Aids/ Appliances (ADIP Scheme).

Sports and Recreation

Oftentimes, recreation and sports get left out in discussions on lives of persons with disabilities. However, these are as integral a part of life for persons with disabilities as for the non-disabled.

Recognising the value of sports and recreation, the XRCVC works on creating innovative opportunities and events. The XRCVC Recreation Club was launched during the year with continuous fitness and training sessions being held under the supervision of Dr Thomas Pires, Sports Director, St Xavier's College.

Besides, the XRCVC team organised and participated in many sports activities during the year.

These included:

- An Invitation Cricket tournament for the Visually Impaired in Mumbai
- An exhibition match of blind football in Mumbai organised by Youth United Foundation
- An All-India Invitational Blind Football Tournament in Kerala, organised by Society for Rehabilitation of the Visually Challenged.

XRCVC also collaborated with The Cubing Club of Xavier's Institute of Engineering (XIE) to conduct a Cubing workshop for its members in January.

Advocacy

Ensuring environmental access is a key factor in determining that vision loss does not result in a disability. XRCVC's advocacy initiatives work in four main areas of print access, financial access, education access and independent living to create accessible environments.

Print Access

The access to printed works for the visually challenged depends on its availability in accessible formats and the permissibility of the legal systems to convert material to accessible formats. XRCVC has been working relentlessly to overcome these challenges.

During this period, the XRCVC produced 39 DAISY books in full-text-full-audio format (comprising 8,200 pages with an audio run time of 271 hours, 50 minutes, 32 seconds. The XRCVC is preparing all its accessible DAISY titles to be ready for uploading onto a national accessible online library which it is working to roll out alongwith the Daisy Forum of India (DFI).

Some of the events that took place or were conducted under the Print Access initiative during the year are appended below.

- Dr Sam Taraporevala and Aniket Gupta participated in the Daisy Forum of India's (DFI) meeting in Patiala, Braille Council of India's meeting in Guwahati.
- During the year, XRCVC worked closely with Benetech, a global non-profit social entrepreneurial venture harnessing the power of technology for social benefit on many print access-related initiatives.
- Worked with BSE Institute Ltd in making books accessible.
- Initiated discussions to set up the online portal for the CTM library.
- Assisted a retired professor at Swami Vivekanand College, Mumbai in planning a resource centre Daisy library
- Assisted a retired judge from the Constitutional bench of South Africa, regarding designing a course in India. Being visually challenged, the judge needed help with a Hindi-English dictionary in Braille.
- XRCVC's Daisy specialist, Sushil Pandit, conducted a special DAISY training workshop in Nairobi (Kenya) in November, under the aegis of UNESCO.
- Dr Sam Taraporevala participated as a resource person in a library conference at JNU to create awareness about DFI and the online library. The subject of the special session was "Reaching the Unreached through ETDs: Research Support Services for persons with disabilities".
- Conducted regular discussions with Assistech, IIT Delhi team to evaluate the work on the Refreshable Braille Display.

Reading Without Seeing

The XRCVC had launched an extremely effective national-level awareness programme in 2012 under the banner of 'Reading Without Seeing', which takes access technologies to blind and low-vision users across locations, and ignites in its audiences the curiosity and basic knowledge to begin their journey of accessing the printed word independently. The programme equips participants with the basic knowhow of a host of assistive technologies.

The programme gained added momentum this year with 15 workshops reaching out to 321 persons (see Table 2). These workshops were conducted by the XRCVC team comprising Sushil Pandit, Keshavan Nadar, Aniket Gupta, Vikas Dabholkar and Shizanne D'Mello, along with volunteers Rajesh Mehta, Hetal Shah, Rajni Pandit and Jatin Shah.

Financial Access

The ability to independently manage, operate and execute one's financial transactions is key to independent living. Lack of effective guidelines and lack of optimum use of technology in financial instruments had traditionally denied financial access to the blind and low vision. The XRCVC has been striving to change this reality. Some of the activities under the Financial Access initiative are appended below.

- XRCVC has been working closely with a global organization, G3ict, to help promote financial inclusion in India. As part of this, an interactive meeting was organized in April in St Xavier's College between Mr James Thurston, G3ict Vice President for Global Strategy and Development, Indian Bank Association (IBA) officials and other stakeholders. Earlier, G3ict had facilitated a one-day seminar in Paris on new developments in financial services accessibility compliance and technologies for executives of international banks.
- XRCVC regularly participated in meetings organised by IBA's Working Group on Banking Facilities for Persons with Special Needs.
- Discussions were conducted with State Bank of India officials to ascertain how the bank could enhance the skills of their visually impaired employees and bring them into the mainstream.
- As part of XRCVC's ongoing work with accessible ATMs, a team from XRCVC visited the NCR office in Mumbai and shared feedback about accessibility features to be incorporated in their new cloud-based ATM. The system works on the principle that there should be minimal burden at the terminal. Since most of the intelligence remains at the central server hosted at the data centre of the respective bank, NCR believes this will offer more secure transactions. In the next phase, NCR plans to replace the physical PINPAD with a next generation encrypted touchscreen.
- Provided feedback to Reserve Bank of India on accessible currency notes.

Education Access

While Right to Education has become a fundamental right in India, for persons with disabilities, this right is far from being

actualised. During the year, XRCVC continued its work towards inclusive education practices and services at school, college and higher education levels. A series of activities were conducted during the year in this connection, which are appended below.

- Dr Sam Taraporevala and Aniket Gupta visited Tokyo from February 2 to 8 to participate in The 3rd International Workshop on "Digitization and E-Inclusion in Mathematics and Science 2016" (DEIMS2016). During the workshop, Dr Taraporevala delivered a keynote lecture on "STEM Education for Blind and Low Vision Students - The Socio-Technical Challenge: The Indian Perspective". They also paid a visit to the Japan Braille library.
- XRCVC through this year accomplished pioneering work in the area of mathematics and science education. Students were provided direct support services. XRCVC created accessible electronic textbooks, teaching learning aids (TLA), and provided conceptual training to these students. In addition XRCVC has started creating a TLA resource library for mathematics and science education, starting Std 1 onwards.
- XRCVC's team on inclusive education comprising Neha Trivedi, Calveena D'Sylva, Rebecca Carvalho, Mimansa Vahia and Aurealia D'Mello continued work on the Concept Teaching Manuals (CTMs), which have been designed for use by teachers working with blind or low vision students. Special educators or parents working on a one-on-one basis, as well as classroom teachers and tuition teachers in an inclusive classroom can incorporate the information and ideas from these manuals. These CTMs cover interactive ways to teach concepts to blind or low vision students including the use of Teaching-Learning Aids (TLAs) in the form of activities, real objects, 3D educational toys and models, 2D tactile diagrams, etc.
- XRCVC's special educators paid bi-weekly visits to Prime Academy School as part of the Individualised Education Plan (IEP) process that has been taken up for two of its primary students. We also invited the principal of the school to our centre to show her our work on Education Access, and regularly conducted training and sensitization sessions at this school, and others like Beacon High School, St John's Universal ICSE School, and Besant Montessori School.
- Worked closely with Gopi Birla School on the rules for conduct of CBSE computer – based examinations for a visually impaired student.
- Worked closely with the British Council during the year to create an accessible version of the IELTS examination.
- Worked with the NGO Masoom to help visually impaired students enrolled in night schools.
- Conducted a workshop at NAB, Worli on Accessible Technology for maths (writing and solving) beyond primary level classes.
- Offered assistance to physiotherapy student Kritika Purohit in completing her internship at KEM Hospital
- Worked closely with a team from TCS on the course content for a proposed Basic Computer training course at NAB.
- Conducted a detailed teacher's training programme 'I For Inclusion' for teachers from 6 institutes.
- Worked closely with Kendriya Vidyalaya officials on making the KV schools more inclusive and collaborated with Zonal Institute of Education and Training (ZIET), Kanjurmarg on creating a training workshop for Kendriya Vidyalaya teachers
- Dr Sam Taraporevala delivered a lecture at IDC, IIT Mumbai to design students on "Introduction to the world of blind". The subjects covered were how VIs visualize and what mental models are built when a concept has to be understood, how

do they comprehend and how comprehension differs based on age and experience of the blind person, which is the most effective medium to send messages for such an audience, and currently how do they build concepts and learn new things.

- Worked closely with the Examinations Dept of St Xavier's College to help a visually impaired SYBA student and MPP student answer his examination papers using a laptop.
- Our Coordinator, Special Education attended a workshop on "Design & Production of Perceivable & Affordable Tactile Diagrams" at IIT Delhi, and also conducted sessions on 'Simplistic Solutions for Tactile Graphics', 'Use of Alt Text for Accessible Images in MS Word', and 'Creation of Accessible MathType MS Word files'.
- Worked closely with international experts like Prof Volker Sorge from the University of Birmingham on thermoforming tactile graphics.
- XRCVC is also working closely with officials from Rashtriya Uchchar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) to take forward the mandate of RUSA in ensuring quality in higher education and achieving excellence. Equity through inclusion in higher education is one of the key components under RUSA.
- Dr Taraporevala participated in a meeting convened by the Government of Maharashtra in December to discuss how Technical Devices & Software could be disseminated to disabled persons.
- Worked with the Joint secretary, UGC to further push forward the HEPSN (Higher Education for Persons With Special Needs) scheme for various colleges and universities. This will help in capacity building so that resource centres can be widely available.

Independent Living

Each of us, as we pass through our day, interact with a range of products, environments and services from transport services, to kitchen appliances, and entertainment products. How accessible are these daily living services and products for the visually challenged? XRCVC's Independent Living initiative questions and works towards rectifying these areas. Some of the activities covered under this initiative during the year are appended below.

- Worked closely with the Government of India on its Accessible India Campaign (Sugamya Bharat Abhiyan). Regular meetings were held with senior officials in Delhi in this connection, including the Joint Secretary, Dept of Disability Affairs, Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment.
- Worked with Mumbai Transformation Support Unit (MTSU) to give inputs in the Draft Development Control Rules (DCR) and Development Plan (DP) for Bombay prepared by MCGM.
- Worked with an entrepreneur from Bangalore to provide inputs for a mobility device
- Worked with an entrepreneur from Tech Mahindra, who aims to design an ultrasound-based Smart Goggle for VI Navigation
- Continuing discussions with Assistech, IIT Delhi about OnBoard, the accessible announcement system that will help Visually Impaired persons board buses.
- Worked closely with UMOJA, a hospitality company and travel portal, on making the hotel experience accessible for visually impaired persons. XRCVC also facilitated a focus group discussion on accessibility in hotels for UMOJA.
- Worked with Zomato, the Association of Hotels and Restaurants (AHAR), and Samsung India on making the offerings of these organisations accessible.
- Worked on pilot testing of location identification signages called Beacons. The plan is to have a Mobile Application in place for indoor navigation and identification for blind users. Also coordinating with a firm called NWBT on installing Beacons at Mumbai airport. Also worked with a few engineering students on the Beacon project.
- Worked with IBM Research India on a navigation project they are promoting called NavC7og.
- Helped prepare an Access audit tool for the Accessible India Campaign
- Worked with Jet Airways to help make their website accessible.
- Worked with Lemon Tree Hotels on offering accessible services
- Collaborated with an international project, Goodfood Talks (www.goodfoodtalks.com), which is an accessible menu library for blind and low-vision persons
- Worked on the prototype design of a unique Braille identity card at the request of the Ministry of Social Justice and

Empowerment, Delhi.

- Submitted suggestions to the Ministry of Urban Development (MoUD) on Harmonized Guidelines and Space Standards for Barrier Free built environment for persons with disability and elderly persons. For this purpose, XRCVC coordinated with Mr Mukesh Jain from the ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment and Anjalee Agarwal of Samarthyam in order to integrate the VI Perspective
- Helped guide two filmmakers—one in Hindi and the other in Marathi—to incorporate visually impaired characters in their films, and provided training to the actors as well.
- Hosted a team from Shinano Kenshi Co Ltd, Japan at the centre and discussed potential areas of collaboration
- Worked with LEAF Design Pvt Ltd on accessibility initiatives with design students.
- Continued ongoing research and development work on visual / auditory / tactile teaching-learning aids and other independent living aids. We worked on integrating diverse technologies which could create a composite system to read through fingers, see through eyes, or hear through ears. This has led to the prototype of an audio / tactile / visual map of India and audio / tactile / visual menu, which found a mention in the Limca Book of Records. The research also has immense potential for the teaching-learning process as it can promote paired reading and can assist a non-Braille literate person to also function effectively.
- Worked with officials from Reliance Energy to make the company's services and billing, etc. accessible

Awareness

Creating awareness about the lives and capabilities of visually impaired persons is one of the key areas that will open doors for them in a world where the rules are made for and by sighted people. XRCVC has been working on a number of such initiatives through its awareness and sensitization workshop Antarchakshu* —The Eye Within. The title 'Antarchakshu' has been successfully registered as a trademark on behalf of the Bombay St Xavier's College Society.

In May 2016, XRCVC launched a comic strip series titled 'You & Eye' as a sensitisation and awareness initiative. Probably India's first comic strip on the lives of visually impaired persons, 'You & Eye' is a collaborative effort between XRCVC, Jagran Group publication Mid-day, and Pune-based cartoonist, Nala Ponnappa. Starting May 1, the comic strip will be published every week in the Sunday edition of Mid-day for 52 weeks.

In addition, we conducted our mega sensitisation and awareness event Antarchakshu* twice this year, the first time in St Xavier's College, and subsequently in Gurgaon. The theme at both events was "Creating An accessible World" and the events saw a combined footfall of approximately 3500 participants.

These events focused on the following six principles of accessibility:

1. Universal Design: Usable By all
2. Accepting Differences & Sensory Substitution: Different ways of reaching the same goal
3. Multi-Sensory Approach: Enriches Experiences
4. No Clutter, Clutter confuses: Clean and non-cluttered layouts aid everyone
5. No half-baked cookie: Accessibility present from beginning to end and not only in parts
6. Nothing for us without us: User inputs and feedback taken during development

During the year sit-down versions of Antarchakshu were conducted at many places and for a variety of target groups, including members of the Advertising Agencies Association of India, the Thane Ophthalmic Association, content writers in Pune, mid and senior-level managers in Deloitte, design students of IDC, IIT Mumbai, students of the IITB-Monash Research Academy, and a number of corporates in Gurgaon, including TCS, ISDI-Leaf, Pernod-Ricard, Oracle, UST Global, Capgemini, People Matters, and Agrasar (See Table 2).

A special sit-down version was also conducted in Hyderabad for the employees of Microsoft as part of Confluence, which is the company's annual Disability & Inclusion event. The event had outlined three key objectives, a) to help employees uncover unconscious bias w.r.t. to working with People with Disability, b) to educate employees about creating an environment – both physical and inter-personal where People with Disability can attain their potential and perform, and c) to share the importance of creating and supporting an inclusive workplace where everyone thrives. After the workshop, Dr Taraporevala participated in a panel discussion organised by Microsoft on how to promote inclusion, with specific reference to disability. XRCVC also put up an exhibition of access technology devices at the venue.

Dr Sam Taraporevala also addressed members of the Rotary Club of Bombay at Taj hotel on Disability and Inclusion.

Today she and more than 250 other students benefit from the classroom facility upgradation initiative of Tata Motors. Tata Motors helped him lead change by beginning a tree plantation drive. Today, Bajinathdih has a forest of income-generating trees, and a Forest Protection Group to nurture its economic turnaround.

Mr. Vinod Pachpute of Vasuli village in Pune district of Maharashtra. A diploma holder in mechanical engineering, he is also a trustee and an alumni of the Bhamchandra High School in the village – the only one in the vicinity covering seven villages. Tata Motors helped set up the school and continues to support it. About 600 students have passed through its portals till date.

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
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
